CORVALLIS Wins Championship Cup. One Northwest and Several I. A. A. A. Records Broken.

As a result of the Intercollegiate athletic meet held at the fair grounds Saturday afternoon, one northwest and several intercollegiate records were broken. The afternoon was a suitable one for establishing records.

In the 440 yard run, the Northwest record of 53.7-5 seconds was broken by Stiles, of the Corvallis Agricultural college who covered that distance in 51.1-5 seconds.

The entire gate receipts Saturday were \$324.25. The expenses of the meet aggregated \$215.25 and the remaining \$109.00 was divided among the five contesting teams.

That Corvallis won with such a large score is surprising. More was expected of Eugene. It was anticipated by local athletic enthusiasts that the Eugene team would crowd the "farmers" pretty closely and possibly make a large score.

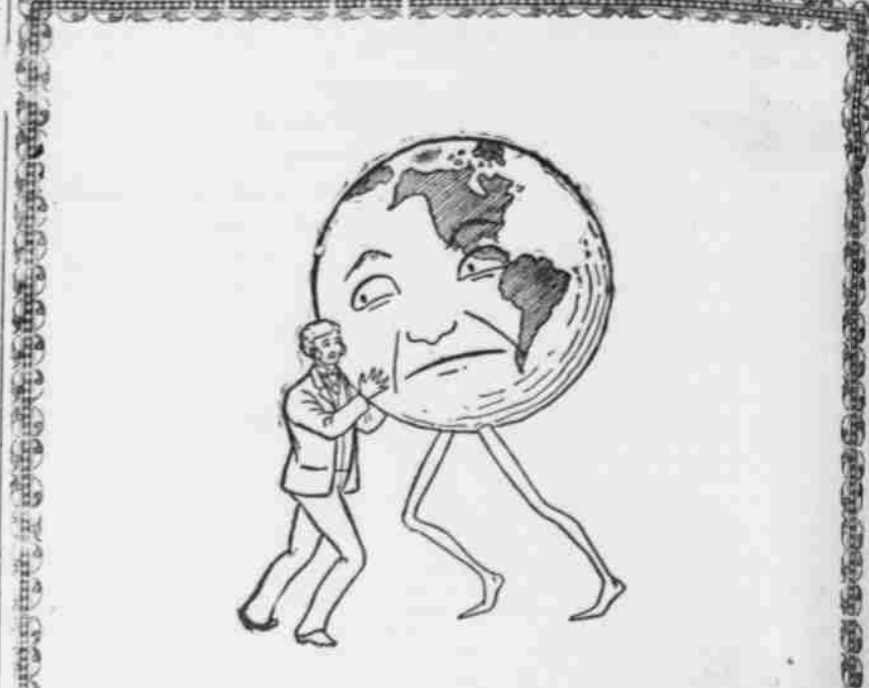
