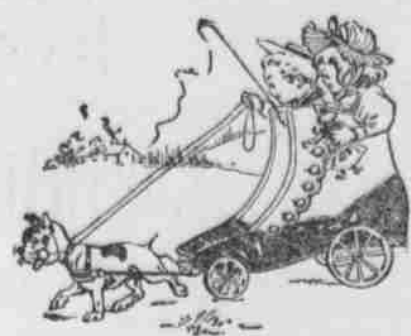

The wonderful educational opportunities of the present time were touched in grateful terms by the reverend gentlemen.

The fan drill by thirty-eight girls from the Park school was a beautiful exercise. The girls were attired in dresses of white, red, yellow, blue and pink. The exercise concluded with a tableau in which the stars and stripes were the central figure. The exercise was arranged by Mrs. Earl Race and Miss Ella Phole, of the corps of teachers of the Park school and its successful presentation last evening indicated not a little practice and preparation. The company was captained by little Miss May Savage, who served in that capacity very acceptably.

To music by the orchestra, the class numbering 44, preceded by City Superintendent G. A. Peebles and President P. L. Campbell, of the Monmouth State Normal school, marched upon the stage and took their places. The ladies, dressed in white, occupied the front seats, while the boys, in their dark suits, formed the background.

From the moment Miss Lesley Campbell recited the initial lines of "The New Lochinvar," her ability as an excellent elocutionist was quite evident. Her recitation was warmly applauded.

"Bill Nye's Spartacus," as presented by Claude Moran, was indeed a humorous declamation. The horrors of the arena were outlined in a humorous vein and Mr. Moran received a warm applause.

The next number was a vocal solo, "Spring Song," by Miss Constance Holland, who exhibited a great deal of talent for one so young. She has an unusually sweet voice and the prolonged applause that followed the selection, showed how well it was appreciated by the audience. She was accompanied on the piano by Miss Carrie Willis, while Miss Lelo Nicklin gave the violin obligato.

Miss Marian Hetric in her recitation "How He Saved St. Michaels" acquitted herself very creditably and her efforts were heartily applauded.

Howard Damon afforded considerable amusement for the auditors in his declamation, "How Jimmie Tended the Baby," in which trouble experienced by a boy in looking after the baby were enumerated.

An instrumental duet by Misses Carrie Willis and Cora Blosser was the next number on the program, but owing to the sickness of Miss Blosser the number had to be omitted, a fact that was sincerely regretted. At a late hour Miss Willis consented to supply the vacancy with a vocal solo, entitled "The Angels' Serenade."

The selection was sung with expression and the young vocalist was given an ovation.

"The Sioux Chief's Daughter" was the title of the recitation by Miss Frankie Wagon, and its presentation was well received.

Owing to a severe cold Miss Mattie Southwick was unable to sing the solo, "Only a Song of Long Ago." The many friends of the young lady regretted that it was impossible for her to render the selection.

At this point on the program the orchestra gave another selection, during the rendering of which flowers were distributed among the graduates.

In conclusion Prof. Campbell, president of the Monmouth State Normal school, was introduced by City Superintendent Geo. A. Peebles, and delivered the address to the class. President Campbell is an extremely interesting speaker and his address last evening along education was a most practical one. Having briefly referred to the wonderful resources of Oregon, minerals, etc., the speaker mentioned in grateful terms the wonderful educational opportunities of the present. Provision should be made by more advanced work in the public schools that any faculty with which a student may be endowed, may be thoroughly developed. The responsibility resting upon each member of the class as graduates was great. In return for the excellent opportunities placed at their disposal, they should strive for the further development of the state and its interests by good citizenship. The speaker concluded with a few practical suggestions to the class, exhorting them to be earnest and courageous, cheerful and to look for the good, the true and the beautiful. While the address was quite brief, it was an excellent one.

Director E. M. Waite, chairman of the board of directors, ascended the platform and as names of the happy graduates were called, presented each with the diploma for which they had earnestly labored. CONGRESSIONAL.

The Sugar Tariff Test Vote

Speeches by Prominent Senators
on Both Sides.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The first test vote on the sugar schedule was taken late resulting in the adoption of the republican caucus amendment, increasing the duty on refined sugar from 1,875 cents to 1.65 cents per pound, by the close vote of, yeas, 32 to nays 31. The affirmative vote was made up of twenty-nine republicans; one Democrat, McEnery; one silver republican, Jones (Nevado), and one populist, Stewart. The negative vote was made up of twenty-five Democrats, three populists and two silver republicans.

It was the closest vote so far taken, on any issue of importance, and was accepted as showing that any amendment, having the sanction of the caucus, were assured of adoption. The vote was taken after a day spent in speeches on the effect of the sugar schedule. The main speech of the day came from Mr. Allison, in charge of the bill, and was in the nature of an answer to the charges, made against the sugar schedule as a whole, and a defense of it.

Gorman spoke against the schedule and the entire bill; pointing out that its effect was to burden the people without opening to us new markets. Mr. White reviewed the records of the republican senators on the sugar schedule, during the debate on the Wilson bill, arraigning them for inconsistency. Caffery and Stewart also spoke the former against and the latter for the sugar schedule.

The first paragraph of the sugar schedule was not finally disposed of up to the time of adjournment.

STATE HOUSE ITEMS.

The state weather bureau predicted occasional rain for Saturday and Sunday.

There were signed up by the state board of education, 43 state teachers diplomas today. That means \$258 in the pocket of the state school superintendent which is not bad for one day's receipts. Governor Lord and Secretary of State Kincaid have been trying to get Mr. Irwin to turn this money into the state treasury but he refused to do it and claims that because his predecessor collected and retained these fees he is entitled to them. Governor Lord reviewed the entire matter in his message and recommended that the legislature pass a law compelling the turning of these into a fund to pay the expenses of teachers institute or other educational expenses.

The East Side Annie Creek Ditch company, of Port Klamath, Klamath county, filed articles of incorporation today.

I. M. Long, of Astoria, received a notarial commission, from the governor, today.

President D. H. Looney, of the State Fair board, was a state house caller today. He says a heavy rain fell at Seilo, Friday, so that the roads are quite muddy.

Secretary Kincaid and Assistant Secretary Lockwood have gone to Eugene to spend Sunday.

By an executive order of Governor Lord, today, E. A. Zuidell, and Frank Sturgill, committed in 1894 for larceny are restored to citizenship, on recommendation of Governor Rogers of Washington.

CORRECTION.—In the JOURNAL's commencement supplement today the name of H. A. Johnson appears as chairman of the school board, while that honor belongs to E. M. Waite. Mr. Johnson was chairman of the board last year.



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
