An Incipient Blaze.

A spark caused an incipient blaze

In the case of the fire this morning
it was again evident that Salem has
an excellent water system, and that
all people in the suburbs who have
the use of city water are comparatively
safe from a fire if they take the
proper precaution to provide for a
hose and have it accessible at all times.
Advantage can be taken of the ex-
cellent system and the uniform high
pressure always at their service.
Many disastrous fires could be averted
and particularly in this case; had it
not been for the prompt use of the
garden hose several houses would have
been badly damaged before the alarm
would have reached the depart-
ment.

BIDS OPENED

For Repair of Big Bridge.

Contract Let to Martin & Teal of
Polk County.

County Judge Wells and Commis-
sioner Cruise, of the Polk county court,
County Judge G. P. Terrell, of the
Marion county court, and Councilman
E. P. Parkhurst, chairman of the
committee on streets and public prop-
erty of the Salem city council, met at
the office of Mr. Parkhurst, on Com-
mercial street at 11:30 p. m. today and
proceeded to open the bids that had
been submitted for the repair of the
big steel bridge. Eight bids had been
submitted, the highest one being
\$1,750 while the lowest bid was \$975.50
a difference of \$774.50.

Messrs. Martin & Teal are from
Polk county and were the successful
bidders. A contract was this after-
noon drawn up in Attorney Geo.
G. Ringham's office and duly signed
by Messrs. Martin and Teal. Mr. Mar-
tin is the gentleman who was named
early in May, by the Polk county
court to confer with Messrs. J. Gray
and W. D. Pugh in examining the
bridge and recommending improve-
ments that were deemed actually
necessary for the preservation of the
bridge. The report submitted by the
committee recommended a thorough
overhauling of the bridge at an es-
timated expense of \$2,100. Messrs. Mar-
tin and Teal are both experienced
bridge builders and expect to begin
work immediately. One-third of the
expense of repairing the bridge is to
be paid, each by Marion and Polk
counties and the city of Salem.

ACADEMY

Closing Exercises at Salem

Growing Attendance at the Pioneer Sisters' School.

The closing exercises of the Sacred
Heart academy took place at the hall
of that institution at 2:30 p. m. Fri-
day before an appreciative audience.
The opening number was a juvenile
chorus by 21 little girls, "The Rob-
bin's Chorus," with warbling accompani-
ment.

The "Camp of Glory March," was
next rendered on the piano, a six
hand piece, quite difficult on one in-
strument, by Misses Bertha Klinger,
Emma Miller and Matilda Eckerlin.
A concert recitation, "The Town of
Belleville" by the same troop of girls
was spoken in perfect unison, evincing
excellent training.

"The Sunset Glow," a duet by
Kisses Emma Miller and Lena Kight-
linger was sung with four hand piano
accompaniment. The young ladies
showed themselves possessed of strong
fresh voices and not afraid to use them.

"Something Great" was a concert
recitation by ten boys. It was spoken
with spirit and expression, and the
boys all had voices that betoken or-
atorical abilities in the years to come.
A concerto duet on piano and organ
by Miss Calmels and Ethel Kight-
linger, from Weber, came next. It is
a combination of instruments not
often heard, but the effects produced,
were agreeable and inspiring, showing
the wide range of training in classi-
cal compositions.

A little girl whose dress was draped
with marguerites now placed chairs
on the platform decorated with Ore-
gon grape.

About these kneeling and softly
slept, the representatives of the floral
kingdom, with the rose for their
queen in the center. From the
statuesquely to the tiny myopette
all were there, even the forget-me-not.
The jolly bumble-bee buzzed
among them.

The principal parts were taken as
follows: Queen, Hallie Watson;
Bumble-Bee, Bertha Klinger; Angel
of the flowers, Miss Calmels. Each
flower responded with an appropriate
sentiment, and the parts were all
taken, ending with the canticle of
the angels, sung in chorus.

The academy orchestra was next
introduced consisting of piano, organ,
guitar, mandolin and triangle, played
with good musical swing and rhythm.
The performers were all graceful, not
alone at their several instruments,
but in their entrance and exit, which
is sometimes not the case.

"The Reaper's Choice," in concert
recitation, closed the literary program.
The thirteen young ladies showed a
high degree of elocutionary training.
The concluding chorus was by all the
little boys and girls and young ladies
of the academy, and was a very ap-
propriate valedictory number.

Several of the musical recitations
were recitatives and displayed the de-
velopment of dramatic talents that
are not overlooked in this school.
The attendance the past year was as
follows: 65 girls, and 24 boys.
There was no graduating class this
year, none having finished the course.
At the conclusion Rev. J. S. White
made appropriate remarks, thanking
all the children for having taken
part so well.

The exercises were witnessed by
about 150 guests of the occasion, and
by Rev. Joseph Buchholder of Brooks
and Rev. L. Metayer, Rev. White
introduced E. Hofer of The Journal, at
who made a brief address in commen-
dation of the work of education as
carried on by the Sisters.

IMPROVEMENTS

On Marion's Court House.

Practically Reconstructed Offices and Main Entrances.

Contractors and architects Pugh &
Gray of this city last night completed
the improvements on the Marion
county court house, begun a few
weeks since, and the same was ac-
cepted by the court today.

The reconstruction plans embraced
re-arrangement of the staircases so as
to increase the safety of the valuable
public documents in the sheriff's and
county clerk's offices. The entrance
was changed to the west corner so
that the public no longer gained ad-
mittance between those officials and
their safety vaults. These offices are
enlarged and improved and are sup-
plied with plate glass doors.

The change also enlarges the county
surveyor's office so that there is room
for drafting tables. The stairways to
the attic are also made more conve-
nient so that the third story of the
court house can be utilized.

The big staircases were very steep
and winding. They have been turned
around and start with an easy plat-
form rest, go up 20 broad and easy
steps to a longitudinal platform,
whence the stairs join by a second
rest and seven steps land you on the
court room floor.

The new posts and panels are
finished in oak maple, the balustrade
of Oregon ash, the rails ebonyized
maple.

Solid brasses shield builders with
grooved brass shields complete the
entrance. The whole is painted in
soft shades, and the walls in terra
cotta. All the materials used are
first-class, no shoddy, and nothing has
been spared to make it a complete
and workmanlike job. All who see it
speak highly of the workmanship
and the promptness with which the
job was completed has inconvenienced
the public very little.

In the basement the foundations of
the building had settled so that the
door had to be raised. Iron columns
were set in and a stairway built from
the sheriff's office direct to the outer
jail door. The mail box and
water tank are placed on either side
of the main office door.

The county court has promptly
paid Pugh & Gray's bill, and ex-
pressed the highest confidence in the
integrity and in their all around
ability to carry out any public con-
tract with expedition and in the most
modern and scientific manner. A cut
of the building appears elsewhere.
