SPECIFICATIONS

For Repairs of Big Bridge.

Contract Under Which Messrs. Martin & Teal Will Labor.

Messrs. Martin & Teal, of Polk county, who have been awarded the contract for repairing the big steel bridge that spans the Willamette river at Salem, signed the following agreement Saturday afternoon:

"That the parties of the second part, for and in consideration of the sum of \$973,50, to be paid in the manner hereafter provided by the parties of the first part, agree to and with the said parties of the first part to furnish all of the labor and materials of every kind, for the purpose of making the repairs on the bridge across the Willamette river at Salem, such repairs to consist of planing the driveway on the three steel spans of the bridge, putting in new stringers on such spans, painting the iron work of such spans, and adjusting the tension of the rods, braces and bars of the spans.

"Planing—The driveway on the three steel spans of the bridge is to be planed the entire width with good, sound 3x12 red or yellow fir plank, well spiked down with 60 penny spikes, with two spikes at each end and one in each stringer diagonally. All the old stringers in these three spans to be replaced with new stringers, to be of good, sound red or yellow fir, free from pitch seams or shake, 3x14 inches. All the old timbers taken from the bridge are to be piled on the ground on the Marion county side of the river.

"Painting—All the iron work that is now painted is to be repainted with two good coats of Prince Metallic paint and boiled linseed oil. Where rust appears the scale shall be carefully scraped off. All the steel parts of the bridge, including the iron rivets, are to be painted, excepting those portions of the iron rivets which have been tarred, and those are to be tarred the same as before.

"Adjusting of the tension—The three steel spans shall be carefully adjusted by a thoroughly competent and reliable steel bridge man, so that the tension shall be so adjusted as to secure the best results.

"The parties of the second part agree that all of the materials and workmanship shall be of the best character and quality.

"The parties of the second part agree to commence the aforesaid repairs on Monday, the 21st day of June, 1897, and that they will complete the same so far as not to interfere with the traveling public on or before the 21st day of July, 1897, and that they will complete this entire contract on or before the 10th day of August, 1897. They further agree that in the making of such repairs that they will not obstruct the traveling public for any longer time than is necessary, but they are given the privilege, under the terms of this contract, to close the bridge for the passage of teams from the 21st day of June until the 21st day of July.

"That during the progress of the making of the repairs as above provided the said S. Martin, and J. B. Teal promise and agrees that they will at all times maintain the necessary guards, barriers and lights so as to protect the traveling public from any injury which might result to any person from the doing of such work; and they also agree that they will protect the said parties of the first part against all claims for damages which may be made by any person for injuries claimed to have been sustained by reason of the making of such repairs.

"The said sum of \$973,50, or any additional sum that may be due to the contractors, shall be paid to the parties of the second part in the following manner: One-third thereof to be paid by the county of Polk by county warrants drawn on the county treasurer of Polk county, Oregon; one-third thereof to be paid by the county of Marion by county warrant drawn on the county treasurer of Marion county, Oregon; and one-third thereof to be paid by the city of Salem by city warrants drawn on the city treasurer of Salem, neither of the parties of the first part to be responsible for more than one-third of the entire cost of repairs; all of which payments are to be made upon the completion and acceptance of the work herein provided for by the parties of the first part, or a committee of three, one of which to be appointed by each party of the first part.

"During the progress of the work it shall be the privilege of the parties of the first part to inspect the same by themselves, or by a superintendent to be appointed by one or both of the above named counties, and should any dispute arise concerning the quality of the materials used, or the character of the workmanship employed in making such repairs, the same shall be submitted to the county courts of Polk and Marion counties for the adjustment, and their decision shall be binding.

"It shall not be in the power of the parties of the second part to claim for any extra work done, or materials furnished, or alleged to be done, or furnished, unless an order in writing is produced as authority therefor, signed by the county judges of Polk and Marion counties and by the chairman of the committee on streets and public property of the city of Salem.

"Should the parties of the first part at any time during the progress of such repairs request, in writing, any additions of the work above specified, the same shall be made, and shall in no way affect or void this agreement, but the same shall be added to or deducted from the amount of the contract price, as herein specified, by a fair and reasonable valuation.

"Should any dispute arise concerning the value of the extra work done, or material furnished, same shall be valued by two competent persons, one to be selected by the parties of the first part and one to be selected by the parties of the second part, they having power to choose an umpire whose decision shall be binding and final."

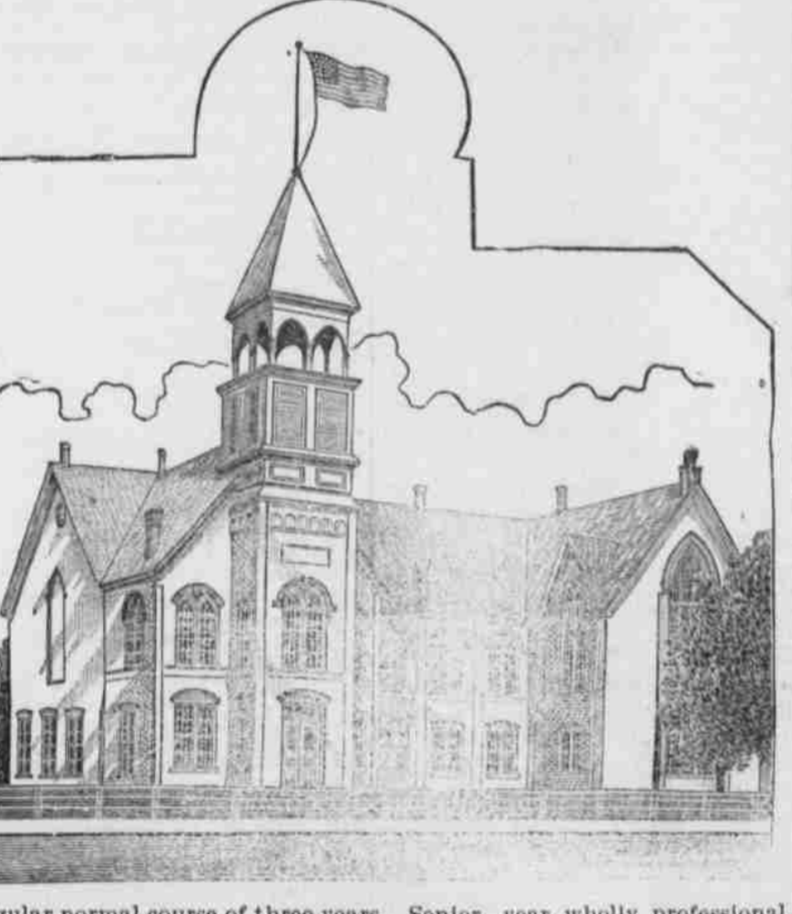
