GRADUATING RECITAL

W. U. School of Expression.

Annual Meeting Board of Trustees --Oregon Institute Tonight.

Reed's opera house was crowded last evening with an appreciative audience who had gathered to witness the second annual graduating exercises of the School of Expression of Willamette university. Before the opening hour had arrived all seats in the auditorium and in the gallery were taken and standing room was at a premium. There were two graduates, Misses Mabel Scott Creighton and Esther Mae Collins, who had successfully and very creditably completed the course as prescribed in the course in the college of oratory. Messrs. B. E. Haney, Carl G. Morris, Ralph A. Watson and Carl Griffith, served the occasion as ushers, seating the immense audience in a manner that indicated some experience in that line.

The stage, by means of young evergreen trees in addition to suitable scenery, had been transformed into a beautiful forest scene.

The excellent program of the evening opened with an instrumental solo by Prof. Leathers, of W. U. college of music. The selection was given a hearty encore to which the gifted performer gracefully responded.

Miss Mabel Scott Creighton, a graduate, recited "My Double and How He Udded Me"—by Edward Everett Hale, in a manner that merited the hearty and prolonged encore that followed its presentation. The talented young elocutionist responded to the encore with a bow.

The Cardinal quartette, which consists of Misses Genevieve Hughes, Oskie Matthews, Ethel Hughes and Esther Collins, appeared in a number entitled "Welcome Pretty Primrose," and responded to a hearty encore that was accorded them.

The scene from Celine by Miss Collins, who assumed the difficult role of Celine, and Miss Creighton who represented Aurelia, was well given. Prof. J. Carley Denton contributed a beautiful violin solo and responded to the encore that was given him.

The Cymal drill by nine young ladies in Grecian costumes was a very beautiful exercise performed to music Miss Lucia Cochran, presiding at the piano. The graceful figures and lovely costumes formed a pretty sight and the evident appreciation of the drill by the audience was unmistakably exhibited at the conclusion thereof. The ladies taking part were: Misses Esther Collins, Mabel Creighton, Ethel Hughes, Jessie Settlemyer, Oskie Matthews, Myra Raymond, Dean Kitchen, Rita Bakestraw and Neva Griswold. Prof. R. A. Heritage's, rich baritone voice was heard in "The White Squall," that was very beautifully and expressively sung. The professor would not be allowed to retreat until he had favored the immense audience with a second selection.

In her recitation of "The Chariot Race" Miss Esther Collins, the other member of the graduating class, was afforded a splendid opportunity for exhibiting her elocutionary powers. While the recitation had probably either been read or heard by every one present, yet Miss Collins recited the thrilling incidents occasioned with the wonderful chariot race in such a manner as to arouse the keenest interest in her auditors which she kept until the last lines had been recited. The recitation itself indicated a wonderful memory while its delivery was exceptionally good. Miss Collins was well worthy the hearty and prolonged applause that was accorded her.

Mrs. Carey F. Martin sang "Asthore" in a manner that won for her a warm encore to which she responded. Mrs. Martin is one of Salem's sweetest singers and her selections are ever appreciated. She was accompanied on the piano by Miss Alice Davenport.

The pantomime, "Lotus Eaters" from Tennyson, by Misses Mabel Creighton, Esther Collins and Jessie Settlemyer, was a series of graceful gestures and posings, carried out to music on the piano by Miss Genevieve Hughes, Miss Ethel Hughes acting as reader.

Pres. W. C. Hawley, by the authority vested in him as the president of the university, after a short address commending the work of the graduates and bespeaking for them a successful future presented the graduates with diplomas after which the immense audience wended its way homeward, feeling eminently well pleased with the exercises of the evening.

Election of officers was then proceeded with and resulted: Gen. W. H. Odell, president, F. B. Smith, vice-president. Further elections were postponed until the afternoon session. F. B. Smith, Dr. J. Reynolds, and A. N. Bush were elected as directors to succeed themselves. The resignation of Mrs. G. W. Gray, was received and accepted and Judge F. A. Moore was named to serve the unexpired term. Adjournment was then taken until 2 p. m.

At today's session of the board of directors, without a single exception the present faculty of the university was engaged for another year. Thus the work of next year will be prosecuted without any hesitancy or confusion usually attendant in the change of management.

Independent Comment on People in State and Nation.

The resolution of the Salem school board, to employ but one of a family in the public schools does not distress the Hon. State Superintendent Irwin. He settles the problem of employing relatives in the public offices within his gift by employing none but relations. The only clerk in his department not kith or kin to the superintendent was employed by the State Board of Education. If Irwin were a Mormon and a younger man he could officer a state government and found a patriarchy.
