CONGRESSIONAL.

Lively Work on the Tariff Bill.

Wool Tariff Lowered One Cent by Request.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The wool schedule was taken up in the senate. The first contest came in a motion to reduce the rate on first-class wool from 11 to 10 cents a pound. It was carried by a vote of 55 to 13.

This result was followed by a mild sensation on the Republican side. Carter said the vote disclosed a purpose to reduce the wool rates, and served notice that a day of reckoning would come, when a combination would care more about the matter. He suggested a postponement of the wool rates. Foraker vehemently reinforced Carter's remarks and announced that unless the agreement that he supposed had been reached on wool was respected, every senator must act for himself.

Allison endeavored to smooth matters and mildly resented the suggestion of a combination. He intimated a willingness to postpone the disputed rates, but, with rising temper said: "Senators cannot be driven, and this is not a good place to drive."

"And that is why I don't drive," retorted Foraker. "Nor will I," said Allison, showing great feeling. "If there had not been an insinuation of a combination," he said, "I would have moved the postponement of all paragraphs open to question, but with the senate thrown into a condition of excitement, I do not propose to submit to threats." "Therefore," said Allison, passionately, "I am not to be driven by threats from anybody. We are told that we are in a combination, and that the combination will not vote for the bill. I am for the bill and expect to vote for it, and I do not wish to be charged as a member of the finance committee with dealing with this question in a covert way."

Foraker had remained on his feet, and with biting scorn he replied to Allison:

"If anybody is excited," he said, "we will have to look about the chamber and see who the excited persons are."

He proceeded to show that entire new features had been proposed on the wool schedules, which the senators had not had an opportunity to examine.

Quay, came in to inquire as to what the agreement was to which Foraker, had referred. The Ohio senator said the agreement was informal, but Quay was informed as to it, having been invited to attend the meeting when the senators considered what could be done toward an agreement certain features of the wool schedule. The rates on third-class wools went over.

Found Guilty.

PORTLAND, OR., June 23.—Daniel Magone was this afternoon convicted of robbing the grave of the late W. S. Ladd. Magone's defense was insanity, and a large amount of expert testimony was introduced. The jury, however, found that Magone was sane and guilty as charged. The maximum penalty is two years in the penitentiary and, as the other three robbers have been given that term, it is probable Magone will receive the same sentence. This completes the trial and conviction of all the grave-robbers, who will serve their sentences in the penitentiary.

Durrant Case.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—The transcript of the record, on the record, on the appeal to the United States circuit court in the Durrant habeas corpus case, has been completed. It will be sent to the clerk of the supreme court at Washington, where the appeal will come up at the October term.

STATE HOUSE NEWS.

The Gold Hill Mercantile Co., of Gold Hill, Jackson county, filed articles of incorporation today with a capital stock of \$7,000. E. A. L. Smith, E. N. Williams and I. H. Cole, incorporators. SUPREME COURT.

In the mandamus case of E. D. Shattuck, appellant, vs. Secretary of state Kincaid, respondent, it was ordered, by the supreme court, on motion of the appellant, that time for service of his motion to advance cause for hearing and notice thereof be shortened to two days.

The case of Morris & Whitehead, appellants, vs. Frank J. Taylor, as mayor of the city of Astoria, et al, respondents, appealed from Clatsop county, was argued and submitted to the supreme court.

Pacific Packing Co., et al., appellants; appeal from Multnomah county, argued and submitted.

Joseph N. Teal, attorney for P. Selling, Allen Jory, attorney for respondent. This is a motion of P. Selling, to vacate, annul and modify certain portions of the conclusions of law and decree herein. The present number of registered pharmacists on the rolls is 507. Registered assistants 49, making a total of 556.

MT. ANGEL.

Tenth Annual Commencement

Bulwer Lytton's Great Play of "Richelieu" Presented.

A representative of THE JOURNAL attended the tenth annual commencement exercises of the Benedictine College and Seminary at Mt. Angel, Monday, June 21. The commencement program was presented in the college hall, which was crowded to its utmost capacity. The attendance was mostly ladies. Many of the men who came a long distance with their families were unable to find seats or standing room.

The Benedictine brothers own a large tract of land there and in ten years have converted it from a wilderness into valuable property, now under a high state of cultivation, and furnishing homes for hundreds of families. The organization has built up not only a large institution of learning but a four story brick academy for girls and young ladies. They have carried civilization into the depth of the wilderness and forest and have added immensely to the tax-paying wealth of Marion county. The order which they represent is in existence since fourteen hundred years. On the drop curtain of their stage in the college hall the scene painter has reproduced the Engelberg in the Canton Unterwald, Switzerland, built amid snow-capped Alps some seven hundred years ago. In the presence of such hoary tradition and historic devotion to a religious cause, the man of modern times stands aghast. Educational and economical methods which withstand the change of time and keep pace with the progress of the world and adjust themselves to the most modern demands of an enlightened age are entitled to respect.

But to the entertainment. The opening number on the program was a selection by the college band, composed mostly of boys, conducted by Principal Placidus, musical director and a master of his art. The salutatory was delivered by Thomas V. Dunn, A. B., one of the graduates, after which the first scene of the drama "Richelieu" was presented by the students. They wore rich costumes, the stage was set with appropriate scenery, and they had learned their lines by heart and spoke them to perfection. The part of the "Cardinal" was a masterpiece, and the entire cast of the play as presented is given below. The one lady character, Julie de Mortimar, was taken by a beardless boy as in Shakespeare's time, but here for the very good reason that there are no young lady students in the college. The five acts were presented in full without any omission from the text to speak of, and must have involved an enormous amount of training and memorizing. Each one of the actors pronounced every word clearly and distinctly. While some of the parts were taken by young men who spoke with a strong foreign accent, we observed but one word that was mispronounced in the three hours that held the audience fascinated as in a dream. The parts of the Cardinal and De Mauprat deserve special mention, only lack of space forbids a more extended eulogy. The rest of the literary and musical program, awarding of honors, distribution of medals and premiums occupied the time until 6 o'clock. One of the musical novelties was a string quintette, four violins and basso, played by Professors Placidus, Dominick, Maurus, Dr. Schubert and John Waters. Professor Maurus is a magnificent first violinist, and it is an inspiration to see him wield the bow. The most wonderful performance of the day was the piano duet "William Tell" by the principal and Tim Baldwin. The audience was enraptured with the tinkling of the chimes in the distant convents, the call of the silver bells of the flocks from the mountains and military salutes and many other variations of that wonderful composition. The clarinet solo by Roy Russell also received an encore, when master and pupil responded with "Au Revoir, but not Goodbye." J. W. Waters was the wit and comedian of the occasion. His Irish philosophy in costume brought down the house repeatedly. Ten small boys sang a sympathetic "Farewell to Mt. Angel," music and words composed by their teachers. The "Greeting of the Jolly Good Fellows" by the college instrumental glee club was a stunner, and kept the audience laughing and applauding until they hardly knew

when to quit. Prof. Placidus played an obligato on an instrument that seemed to be a cross between a Chinese trombone and a gescrowkewool-blewinkbum. Another piece by the college band and the program was appropriately closed by a splendid valedictory address by R. Barr, A. B., of Salem.

The faculty of Mt. Angel college are very much encouraged over the past year's work. In spite of hard times their attendance has increased and the look-out for the future is very hopeful.

COMMENTED.

The Big Bridge Is Closed to Travel—Hand Ferry Being Operated

Contractor R. M. Gilbert, to whom was awarded the contract for repairing the big bridge across the Willamette river at Salem, began work this afternoon with a force of men. The contract was originally given Martin and Teal, of Polk county whose bid was \$973.50 but failing to furnish the necessary bond and to sign the contract, the job went to the next lowest bidder, R. M. Gilbert also of Polk county, who has contracted to do the work for \$1231.

The big bridge was closed to travel this afternoon and as per agreement in the contract, the contractor may keep the bridge closed to travel for thirty days at least and if necessary a longer time will be allowed.

During this period Thos. Holman was granted the privilege of operating a ferry-boat on the river. He placed the same in operation this afternoon. The ferry-boat being used is the one formerly owned by the Salem Improvement Co., who operated it between the east bank and the island just above the O. R. & N. Co.'s, dock at the foot of Trade street. The rates of transportation one way will be as follows: Saddle horse, single or double horse and buggy, 25 cents; four horse rig 40 cents.

STATE NEWS.

Work has begun on the Columbia Southern, and a large force of men and teams will push the road to completion.

The contract for the building of the new Methodist church at McMinnville, has just been let to A. D. Singleton for \$2,455.

INVESTIGATION

Of the Court House Repairs

Explanation of the Delay in Writing Up the Record.

The grand jury is still sitting on the court house investigation and Foreman Grim says he cannot tell when they will be through. Several Salem contractors will be questioned today as to the reasonableness of the bill for repairs.

THE CORRECTED RECORDS.

THE JOURNAL on Tuesday evening published the fact that the county court record of the court house repairs transaction had been ordered written up, Tuesday, June 22. County Clerk Ehlen gives the following explanation of the matter:

He supposed the records on that matter were written up, until on the 17th of June, when he was notified by Deputy Turner that the record of the court house repairs transaction, on which the warrants had been issued, was not written up.

Ehlen then on the 17th ordered Deputy Giesy to enter the transaction up properly. Tuesday (June 22,) he discovered that this had not been done and he compelled Deputy Giesy to complete the record as having taken place on June 11. Ehlen says the bill for court house repairs was brought to him on June 11, the last day of the June term of the court, endorsed "allowed" by Judge Terrell in the customary manner and it thus became his duty to issue the warrants for \$2342.65. This would seem to justify Ehlen's course in the matter.

WHAT GIESY SAYS.

Deputy Clerk Giesy told a JOURNAL reporter that the repairs bill was never before the county commissioners court at the June term, that it was not spoken of then, and was not allowed or considered. Commissioner Watson says the bill was shown him but he remarked it should be looked into before it was paid. Another witness before the grand jury will swear that when he was trying to get a copy of the bill Deputy Giesy informed him that Judge Terrell's instructions were that the bill for repairs was not to be given out for publication and was not to go on the June records. The people have watched and pursued this matter closely, and from any standpoint the conduct of the county court is inexcusable and unjustifiable. No matter what the grand jury may decide about the charges made, the people constitute a jury whose final judgment will be unbiased, although they may not be able to recover what has been unlawfully and with suspicious haste and absolute disregard of the forms of law, wrung from the taxpayers. The verdict of that jury will be at least misconduct and malfeasance.
