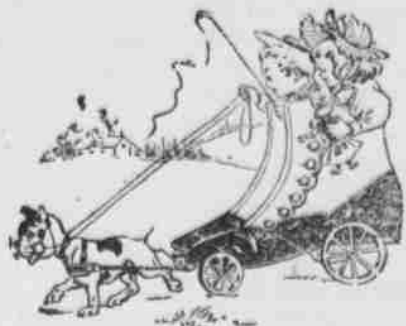

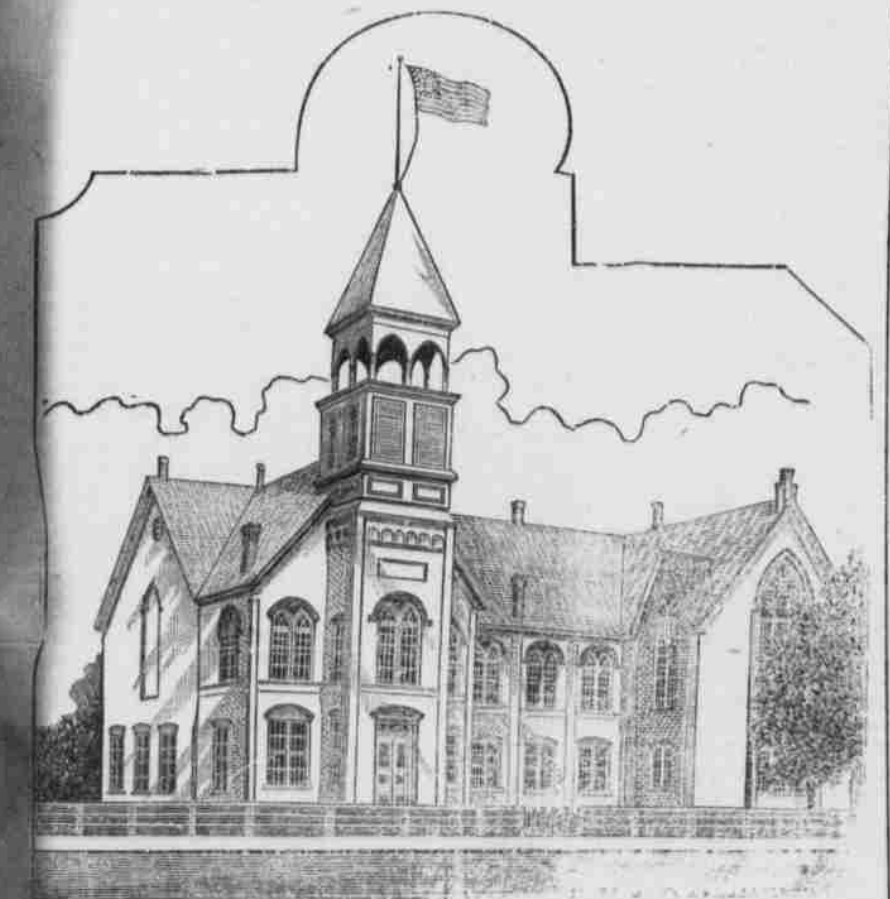

CONVENTIONS.

The Iowa Tripple Alliance.

Disciples of the People Assemble in State Convention.

DES MOINES, June 24.—Four hundred delegates were present at the Populist state convention, C. V. Holley was named for temporary chairman. His address was for the free coinage of silver at 16 to 1.

Silver Republicans.

DES MOINES, June 24.—The Free Silver Republican state convention opened with 150 delegates present. J. R. Rommans, temporary chairman arraigned the Republican party for its failure to bring the prosperity promised during the campaign. He urged a fuller consolidation of the silver element, state and national. A conference committee was appointed to meet a like committee of Democrats and Populists. The conference committee will ask the full committee to agree to the nomination of ex-Congressman Kerr for governor.

Bryan Democrats.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 24.—About 1,000 delegates were present when State Chairman Healey called the Democratic convention to order. The announcement that Ex-Congressman White, the leading candidate for governor, would preside as chairman, was greeted with cheers. A large picture of W. J. Bryan was unveiled at the rear of the stage.

White, in his address, said in part: "None but veritable demagogues dissent from the statement that conditions throughout the country are not only unsatisfactory, but deplorable and actually alarming. The cause of true reform suffers, because a great many people rest secure in the belief that their freedom remains unimpaired so long as they are not actually sold upon the block."

"We concede the natural superiority of some men over others, but we never concede that Rockefeller's brain is 20,000 times bigger or 5000 times more active than other people's brains. Not content with controlling the coal fields, ore deposits, oil fields, timber supplies, provision market, labor market, transportation lines, telegraphs and telephones; not satisfied with owning the executive, judiciary, congress, most of the state legislatures, and the entire metropolitan press, these multi-millionaires have determined to possess themselves of the vast additional power of controlling the people's finances."

"The programme is to utterly destroy the use of silver for primary money. To make it artificially scarce so as to mark the price of labor and its products down, and to legislate the value of the gold dollar up, but the old Democratic ship is still afloat. This historic craft, under temporary command of a treacherous captain, was recently anchored in the mud holes of Republican landing places. But the patriotic crew unceremoniously threw the captain overboard, thoroughly renovated the old ship, and installed a new captain. He immediately weighed anchor, quit the foul waters of Republican ports, and today William J. Bryan is navigating the proud craft upon the blue waters of the high sea, with the aid of an old-fashioned Jeffersonian compass."

Bryan's picture and every mention of his name brought out tremendous applause. The state central committee created a conference committee to meet committees of the Populists and free-silver Republican convention on the ticket and other things. J. M. Parsons, was made permanent chairman.

A UNION.

The Democratic convention adjourned, having completed its work. The two allied conventions, Silver Republican and Populists, completed their work slightly in advance. The

three factions were, after much controversy, able to agree on one platform, with free silver as the main idea, and one ticket, composed of two Democrats' two Silver Republicans, and one Populist. The ticket will be placed on the official ballot under the name "Democratic." When this became known, there was a split in the Populist convention, the middle-of-the-roads faction, under the leadership of Weeks, walking out.

The seceders numbered about 100 delegates, and General J. B. Weaver's faction remained with the Democrats whereupon he was bitterly denounced. But for this rupture the union of all the free silver forces would have been complete. The ticket is composed as follows:

Governor, D. E. White, Democrat, of Keokuk; lieutenant-governor, B. A. Plummer, Silver Republican, of Winnebago county; judge of supreme court, L. G. Kinne, Democrat, of Polk county; railroad commissioner, F. B. Drain, Populist, of Dallas county; superintendent of instruction, G. F. Rhinehart, Silver Republican, of Jasper county.

Mr. White, the candidate for governor, was formerly a member of congress from the sixth district. He was defeated for re-election last year by Lacey. He is an out-and-out free silver man, and has an established reputation as a good campaigner. Mr. White's main competitor was J. R. Burgett, of Ottumwa, a Cleveland postmaster, who supported Bryan. His candidacy was pushed by the younger men. Half a dozen other candidates were placed in nomination but ex-Governor Boies' name was hardly mentioned in the convention. Judge Kinne is chief justice of the supreme court now. He supported Bryan, but under some protests. He is a prominent Democrat.

The Ohio Valley Bimetallists.

CINCINNATI, June 24.—The bimetallic convention adopted the constitution proposed by the committee. It provides that the name shall be "The League of Ohio Valley Bimetallic Clubs," to consist of clubs of West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana. The object shall be to encourage the formation of bimetallic clubs for organized work in advocating the principle of the free coinage of silver and gold upon equal terms. Clubs joining the league are to pay an initiation fee of \$1. The officers will be a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. The league pledges itself not to influence any political convention except in the matter of bimetallicism.

Meeting of Friends.

NEWBERG, Or., June 24.—Oregon yearly meeting of Friends' church met June 22, at 2 p. m., at Newberg Or., with an unusual large attendance, and great interest manifested in the work of the church. Rev. John Hadley and wife, of La Grand, Iowa, is in attendance. Rev. Hadley took charge of the devotional meeting. After a short devotional service, the names of the delegates of different churches were called, showing an unusual good attendance.

Standing committees were then appointed, and their duties assigned. Adjourned until Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 23.

The devotional meeting at 8 a. m., was led by Marion George, of Rose-dale, Or.

Business session opened at 10 a. m. Devotional service led by Rev. Hinshaw, of Marion.

CONGRESSIONAL.

Republican Tariff Makers.

The Hawaiian Treaty--Bill Introduced Favoring It

WASHINGTON, June 24.—After a contest lasting through the day the senate completed the paragraphs of the wool schedule relating to raw wool and advanced in the features relating to manufactured woolen goods. The day was devoted largely to a discussion of the effect of the rates on the price of wool, and the speeches were on technical lines in the main.

Quay made a strong effort to have wool ad valorem rates on third-class wool adopted; but he was defeated 19 to 1.

The committee rates were agreed to, viz: 4 cents per pound on third-class wool valued at 10 cents or less per pound, and 7 cents per pound on third-class wool valued at 10 cents per pound. The schedule was completed up to paragraph 364, relating to cloths, knit fabrics, etc.

Early in the day Allen, rising to a question of personal privileges, made a sweeping denial of the public charges that W. J. Bryan had contributed \$1,500 to the Populist cause, in order to effect fusion, made by L. C. Bateman, late Populist candidate for governor of Maine. Allen made a sweeping denial. He said Mr. Bryan had determined to divide the royalties on his book, and in doing allotted \$1,500 to the Populist party. The draft was sent to Mr. Allen, but the chairman of the Populist national committee (Senator Butler) declined to accept it. Thereupon, at the suggestion of Mr. Bryan, Allen invested the amount to be used in the interest of bimetallicism. Allen declared that the statement that an agreement existed as to fusion in connection with the gift was "an absolute and unqualified falsehood." There had never been, he declared, an attempt to fuse the parties, either nationally or locally.

Allen also specifically denied the statement that Bryan forged his (Allen's) name to the list appended to the letter of notification. The senator closed with a high tribute to Mr. Bryan and an arraignment of Prof. Bateman.

Senator Quay moved to restore the house rate of 32 per cent ad valorem on third-class wool, valued at 13 cents or less. The western senators combatted it. Quay also moved to lay on the table the amendments of the finance committee to paragraph 337 (wool), the effect being to restore the house rates, and the motion was lost by a vote of 19 to 11.

Teller made a vigorous speech, in which he charged the Republicans with having no desire to push the tariff bill. Replying to the remarks of Hoar to the effect that Bryan would have vetoed the tariff bill for the duty on wool, while some of his supporters now urged a higher rate. Teller stated that if Hoar was going to bring the last campaign into the debate the bill would be delayed indefinitely, as silver men would not allow such assertions to go unchallenged.

HAWAII.

Senator Morgan introduced a bill for the annexation of the Hawaiian islands. The bill provides that the island shall become a territory of the United States, in accordance with the terms of the recently negotiated treaty. The day set for the extension of the laws of this country over the islands, is the 4th of March, 1898, but it is especially provided that they may be put in force at an earlier date if congress so directs.

It is also directed that the five commissioners, provided for the treaty to make the recommendations to congress in matters pertaining to Hawaii shall be confirmed by the senate. The bill appropriates \$1,000,000 for the ex-

ception of its provision. Out of this sum the interest on the Hawaiian debt is to be paid, but provision for the payment of the principal of this debt is deferred.

"The treaty," said Senator Morgan, "can be ratified in this form by a majority vote in each of the two houses, thus avoiding the necessity for securing two thirds of the senate, as would be required if the matter should be passed upon by the body alone."

One Snake to Many

LOS ANGELES, June 24.—A rattlesnake charmer, Leroy George, who is known in various parts of the state, has been bitten by one of his pets, and is now at the hospital in a precarious condition.

Blew Up.

PITTSBURG, June 24.—An Italian laborer's shanty near Brilliant station was blown up by dynamite last night. Goetus Antoniolli was instantly killed and Tignorin Satorianalla fatally injured. It is believed the explosion was the result of a plot.

Want the Cubans Recognized.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The general executive board of the Knights of Labor has adopted a resolution requesting the president and house of representatives to take immediate action recognizing the belligerency of Cuba.

Beginning of a Revolution.

MADRID, June 24.—Disturbances have taken place at Oyiedo, capital of the Spanish province of that name. The gendarmes who were detailed to suppress the disorders fired upon the rioters, killing two workmen and wounding five others. A renewal of the disturbance is feared.

Papers Pleased.

LONDON, June 24.—All the London newspapers express gratification at the kindly comments of the American papers on the queen's jubilee and at the vivid accounts of the celebration contained in the newspapers of the United States.

Could Not Bear Adversity.

LOS ANGELES, June 24.—Frank D. Fish, a real estate man, who has met with business reverses of late, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself in the head. He leaves a wife.

Election Frauds.

DENVER, June 23.—The special grand jury investigating the alleged frauds in the city election returned 38 indictments against 19 election officers. The names have not been made public.

Out on Bonds

ST. LOUIS, June 24.—Martin Ensley, who is charged with assaulting and robbing D. Collins of \$6000 and Mer-rimac Heights, was this evening released on bond in the sum of \$6000. His bondsmen are secured by \$6000, which was deposited by Ensley's friends in the St. Louis county bank, at Clayton.

Favors Bergan.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—The suit of T. L. Bergan, against Florence Blythe Hinkley to recover \$50,000, alleged to be due for legal services rendered in the Blythe case, has been concluded in Judge Hunt's court. After being out six hours the jury was unable to agree and was discharged. They stood eight to three for defendant.

PRESENTMENTS.

Are Filed by the Grand jury.

Judge Burnett Will Construe the Law in Court House Frauds.

At 1:30 p. m. today the grand jury of Marion county filed its presentments in the court house investigation and ask for construction of the law in such cases.

A jury was being drawn in a criminal case as the jurors filed in and presented and extended document to Judge Burnett, who paused long enough to inform them that he would have to consider the matter before directing them how to proceed. The jury walked back to its room, but soon adjourned for lack of something to work on until they have the court's instructions.

PRESENTMENT.

Is a very cautious proceeding by Foreman Grim, and it is proper and right under the circumstances for the jury to be advised by the court whether certain facts constitute a crime, and if there has been a crime committed to segregate the indictments and name the offences correctly.

An immense crowd gathered in a few minutes but were disappointed at an order immediately issued to clear the court room for the trial of the Craven-Rennie adultery case. It is doubtful if the court can find time to instruct the jury as to their duty before Friday morning when he will probably do so. According to law a presentment is an indictment setting forth facts but concealing the name of the individual.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS.

Code Sec. 1265: "A presentment is made to the court, by the foreman in the presence of the grand jury, and with the concurrence of five of their number; but being a mere informal statement of facts, for the purpose of obtaining the advice of the court as to the law arising thereon, is not to be filed in court or preserved beyond the grand jury."

Sec. 1242, 1244, 1245, declare that the grand jury shall present all crimes to the court "by presentment or indictment."

Sec. 1245 says when a presentment is "so formed and presented, the court shall give such instructions to the grand jury concerning the law of the case as it may think proper and necessary."
