The Yew Park Meeting. In the discourse at the tent in Yew Park last evening, the speaker took for his text Amos 3:7: "Surely the Lord God will do nothing but he revealeth his secret unto his servants the prophets." From this language, found in the prophets, it was concluded that God, through the prophets, has given to the world pen pictures, or prophetic photographs of last day scenery, covering the moral, ecclesiastical, political, financial, social; natural aspects of the world in its closing years. The prophecy of Joel 2:1-4 was commented upon. 2 Tim. 3:1-5 was dwelt upon as an exact picture of the moral condition of the religious world at the present time; for it refers to the last days and to people who have a form of godliness but deny the power thereof. Luke 17: 26-29 was also considered, in which is drawn a parallel between the days before the flood and those just before the coming of the Son of man. The times referred to were characterized by eating and drinking, marrying, buying and selling, planting and building; and Jesus says it will be so in the last days. The fulfillment of this prediction was shown in the overeating, and eating of dainties, which has made us a nation of dyspeptics, in our modern consumption of intoxicants, which costs more than food, clothing, education, and religion combined, in the modern speculative spirit and avarice of humanity. James fifth chapter was briefly illustrated, showing its present fulfillment in the conflict between capital and labor. Avarice and modern questionable methods of business have made many wonderfully rich in gold and silver within a very brief space of time, and they have hoarded their ill-gotten treasures. This action, together with their reduction of, and withholding of the wages of laborers, have been instrumental in bringing our present crisis of hard times. But this heaping of treasures, and the cry of the laborers is characteristic of the last days according to James; and he also introduces a third class whom he calls "brethren" and who are admonished to be patient till the coming of the Lord, for the event is drawing nigh.
