REPORTS

Of the Marion Co. Grand Jury

On Reckless and Star Chamber County Court Proceedings.

The Marion county grand jury this
morning filed two reports on the
charges of malfeasance and miscon-
duct of County Judge Terrell, both
condemning that official's methods of
transacting public business and in all
material points sustaining THE JOUR-
NAL.

THE MAJORITY REPORT.

SALEM, Marion Co., Or.,
June 25, 1897.
To Hon. Geo. H. Burnett, Judge of
circuit court.

We, your grand jury, drawn for June
term of court, beg leave to submit the
following report.

We have examined all cases that
have been bound over, and in each
case have returned a true bill, or not
a true bill as the case may be.

We have examined the various of-
fices and find the books kept in sys-
tematic order. We also examined the
county jail and find everything neat
and orderly.

We have examined the improve-
ments made in the court house and
numerous expenditures, as to the true
value of said improvements, also the
county commissioners as to the agree-
ment between the county court and
said contractors; have extended nu-
merous invitations to Judge Terrell,
inviting him to come before the grand
jury and to make a statement, excul-
pating himself from the charge of
jobbery, and said invitation was uni-
formly declined. The grand jury
have concluded as follows:

1. That scarcely any of these im-
provements made were necessary.
2. That it is our opinion that the
entire improvement could have been
done for \$150 and leave a fair profit
to the contractors.
3. That it is our opinion the busi-
ness of the county is conducted in a
very loose and unsystematic manner.
4. That Judge Terrell has ordered
bills paid, without sanction of and
under protest from the county com-
missioners.

5. We find the county judge of this
county is guilty of criminal negli-
gence in allowing exorbitant charges
to be made against the county, we
also find that said judge altered the
bill presented by Pugh & Gray
for courthouse improvements by in-
serting the figure 2 before \$9.89 in one
item, making it read \$29.89; also in-
serting the figure 5 before the figures
65c in another item, making it read
\$5.65 instead of 65 cents; also for
raising the bill of one A. A. Mason for
improving a road East of Gervais
from \$250 to \$325.

6. That the county commissioners
while not criminally culpable, have
shown a lamentable want of firmness
in opposing the extravagant ideas of
the judge.

7. That in view of the existing
hard times and the scarcity of
money we utterly condemn the action
of Judge Terrell.

8. That before arriving at these con-
clusions, we have carefully examined
all witnesses who knew anything per-
taining to said charges, we have also
examined all records of various im-
provements and find these matters to
exist as above stated, and we have
presented all the facts relative to the
court house improvements and altera-
tion of records to the circuit judge by
way of presentment and find from the
facts and law given to us by said
court that crime was committed in
altering and forging the records of
the county. In conclusion we cannot
but praise District Attorney
S. L. Hayden and his deputy John
H. McNary for their able assistance,
and uniform courtesy to the grand
jury in assisting in the various inves-
tigations. We also consider it a
deplorable state of affairs that the
people of this county have no protection.

MINORITY REPORT.

To the Hon. Geo. H. Burnett, judge
of the circuit court of Marion Co.
We the undersigned grand jurors
beg leave to report that we concur
in the report of the majority of the
grand jury, except as to that portion
thereof relating to the management
of the county business by the clerk
and judge and commissioners of the
county court.

As to the charge of the squander-
ing of county funds and mismanage-
ment of the county business, we are
of opinion that all evidence produced
showed nothing more blameworthy
than injudicious action and want of
discretion on the part of those offi-
cials. We do not censure the clerk for
failing to put the proper date of
filing upon bills when pre-
sented, and we think the
county judge is censurable for
transacting county business as if
it were his own private affairs, with-
out consulting the county commis-
sioners. We do specifically find from
the evidence produced before us that
neither the clerk nor judge has perpe-
trated any fraud, and we do hereby
exonerate both of them from the
charge.

We recommend that no county busi-
ness be transacted except in open
court before a majority of the mem-
bers of the court and that all bills be
first read in open court, and on a sub-
sequent day audited and the order of
allowance or rejection thereof signed
by at least two of the members of the
court, and that the clerk should not
draw any warrants except upon or-
ders of the court first duly entered of
record in the journals of the court.

JURY TAKE A VOTE.

After receiving the court's inter-
pretation the jury retired and pro-
ceeded to take a vote on the question

of reporting an indictment and, it is
understood, the vote was 4 to 3 in
the affirmative; but before an indict-
ment can be found, five of the jurors
must vote for it. So far as could be
learned those opposed to indicting
Judge Terrell were H. Helmke,
Daniel Humphreys and Thos. Town-
send.

A JUROR "HILL."

About 7 o'clock the jury met for
final deliberation and one juror,
Humphrey, wanted further light on
the meaning of "intent" and Judge
Burnett gave it.

Humphrey created a scene and
broke down and cried like a child
when he reappeared and seemed to be
acting under a deep sense of convic-
tion. In reply Judge Burnett ex-
plained clearly the character and re-
lation of intent to the act accompa-
nying it and gave illustrations to empha-
size his instructions. These seemed
satisfactory to Mr. Humphrey and the
jury was excused for the night, ad-
journing until 8 o'clock this morn-
ing.

In the course of his explanation to
Juror Humphrey, the court reiterated
the statement contained in his charge
upon the jury's presentation during
the afternoon, that "there was no
doubt their presentation established a
wrongful act in making a record of
something the county court did not
do, but it rested solely with the jury
to determine the nature of the intent
prompting such wrongful act." Con-
tinuing, the court made use of the
further statement that "this bill, not
being a public record within the
meaning of the statute, was not sub-
ject to forgery," a declaration at var-
iance with the instruction given in
the afternoon upon the same matter.

ADULTERY.

Few Cases Are Disposed Of.

Roy Craven Acquitted, but Mrs. Rennie's Case Goes Over.

The case of State vs. Roy Craven,
indicted for adultery with Mrs. O. D.
Rennie, was tried to a jury Thurs-
day evening.

J. Harding, W. W. Hall, D. S. Cain,
H. Brown, L. C. Russell, Earl Race,
J. P. Ledgewood and J. R. Colman,
were among the jurors drawn but
challenged. The witnesses sworn for
the prosecution were Jacob Ashen-
felder, O. D. Rennie, D. W. Gibson
and Rev. Osborne and those for the
defendant were Dr. C. H. Hall, C. M.
Lockwood, Z. Craven and Grant Kight-
linger; Judge Burnett ordered the
court room cleared of all spectators,
attorneys, etc.—the latter referring to
reporters, and it was 4:20 before the
locks were again turned to admit the
general public. At 4:20 o'clock the
jury was sent to its room to deliberate
on a verdict which was rendered at
7:45 o'clock of not guilty.

The case was contested very vigo-
rously and every inch of ground was
fought over. District Attorney Hay-
den represented the state well. Wm.
M. Kaiser made the opening speech
for the defense and John W. D'Arcy
closed in a brilliant effort, having
displayed marked ability as a crimi-
nal lawyer in handling the case, he
being the counsel for the defend-
ant and joined with Mr. Kaiser, who was
counsel for Mrs. Rennie
