Circuit Court.

Of Marion county before Burnett,
judge, following docket, entries were
made.

E. S. Eller vs. Talkington &
Bottger, action for money, jury
verdict for defendant. Ford and Hen-
dricks for defense, D'Arcy and Rich-
ardson for plaintiff.

Butteville Farmer's Warehouse as-
sociation vs. A. E. La Roque, action
for damages, plaintiff's demurrer to
part of defendant's answer argued
and sustained. Carson and Fleming
for plaintiff, Kaiser and Slater for
defendant.

Court adjourned to July 6, in
Marion county. Judge Burnett holds
court in Linn county next week.

New Suits.

Samuel Herzog has instituted in
Department No. 1, of the Marion
county circuit court, two actions, for
money against W. W. Giesy et al., of
Gervais. He demands judgment for
\$700 with interest from Feb. 10, 1896
at the rate of 8 per cent, less \$5.00
that was paid May 24, 1897, and \$75.00
attorney's fees. This amount is al-
leged to be due on a promissory note
executed by defendant in February
1894. Plaintiff also seeks judg-
ment for \$200 alleged to be due
him for services as labor
rendered between November 9, 1894
and November 9, 1895. A compensa-
tion agreed upon was \$350 per year on
which amount \$150 has been paid,
leaving a balance due of \$200. Hence
the suit. Plaintiff demands judg-
ment for \$200 with interest at the
rate of 8 per cent from November
1895. Geo. G. Bingham is attorney
for the plaintiff.

To the Poor Farm.

Mrs. Eugene Neff is the name of a
very quiet and unassuming little wo-
man, probably 22 years old, who called
at "Hotel Salem" Thursday afternoon,
and in a legible hand, placed her
name upon the hotel register. Being
left destitute and in a strange place
the woman applied for admission to
the poor farm which was granted.
Her case is a sad one. She hails from
Portland, where only recently she was
married to a man who promised to
provide for and protect her but has
since proven himself unworthy of the
confidence placed in him by the un-
suspecting woman. About three
months ago he suddenly deserted the
wife and since then nothing has been
heard of him. The woman is soon to
become a mother and the man who
has so cruelly deserted her with no
provision whatever for her comfort
should be brought to justice.
