SEVERE GRANGER RESOLUTIONS.

Condemning the actions of the County Court.

WOODBURN, July 2, 1897. DEAR EDITOR: Our tax paying members of Woodburn Grange are very indignant at the too e and unbusiness like way our county business are managed by our legal representatives, and very emphatically condemn such unbecome and dishonest management as you have reported for several weeks past. They earnestly discussed the propriety of calling a mass meeting of the tax payers of this county to ask the resignation of Judge Terrell as county judge. Had he any shame he would want to hide in the brush of the Mehama hills. The following was adopted:

Resolved by Woodburn Grange that we do unqualifiedly censure and condemn Judge Terrell wholesale and reckless squandering of the public funds, by allowing charges outrageously out of proportion to services rendered and by adding \$5 to an itemized charge of 35 cents and 20 to a like charge of about \$0 making a dishonest addition of \$25 or 250 per cent. to an original charge of about \$10.

Resolved that it is our belief that a judge who would allow a charge of \$10.00 for sawing off the legs of a table would allow the devil or any of his imps the whole county fund for a consideration.

Resolved further that since Judge Terrell has wantonly broken his oath of office and knowingly squandered the peoples money, he is worthy of the condemnation of all honest men, and unfit for any position of honor, trust or profit, and a fit subject for the states prison; and we hereby ask his resignation, but in all earnestness demand it.
