Works Tied Up Everywhere.

The Strikes Will be General—
Nearly All Miners Will be Out.

Pittsburgh, July 8.—It is safe to say that the amount of coal dug in the Wheeling division of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad would not fill one flat car. Such a complete shut-down as exists in this district since after the inauguration of the strike is admittedly a surprise to the people living in that section. A number of miners were at work yesterday, the majority of them in the pits of the Pittsburgh & Chicago Gas & Coal Co., at Bowdoin and Gastonville, but it is doubtful if the diggers at work along the whole line would number fifty, and all of these are at the Gastonville pits of the Pittsburgh & Chicago company. A careful review of the situation proves the assertion of the miners' officials that the Wheeling division is solidly advocating the strike.

Five cars were loaded at the Gastonville mine yesterday, but it was with coal that had been lying on the dump since work was suspended last Friday. There was doubt as to whether or not the mine would return to work after their holiday Tuesday, but this has been dispelled and the foreigners seem as an enthusiastic as any on the strike question.

The miners along the line have been anxiously watching the diggers of the Pittsburgh & Chicago company at Gastonville and Bowdoin. Until it was a matter of doubt whether they would come out or not. Vague rumors of the Pittsburgh diggers threatening to pull them out were floating around, but were not believed to have much foundation. The company, though, was prepared for any move of the kind and notices were posted warning all not connected with the working of the mines to keep off the property.

These men have all been working under the ironclad agreement, and as this meant a loss of 10 per cent. of their wages, held back since the first of the year by the firm, if they had quit work and the strikers were in doubt whether they could be induced to join the movement, but a meeting held and it was decided to come out. The men will lose nearly \$5,000 in percentages.

The local miners' officials, flushed with victory, are now preparing to make a move against the mines of the New York & Cleveland Gas & Coal Co. They expressed their confidence in their ability to bring these men out before the end of the week, and then the suspension in this district will be complete. Then the strike extension will proceed eastward. The mines shipping to the seaboard will be attacked. First will come a movement against the mines of the West Maryland Gas & Coal Co. and the Pennsylvania Gas & Coal Co. and then the officials will direct their attention to the Central Pennsylvania fields.

The miners think that an effort will be made among the anthracite producers to supply in part the need of coal among the bituminous consumers. They are watching this phase of the struggle with great care. Any intimation of an increased output among the anthracite mines will result in an immediate strike agitation in these fields.

Coal operators dispute the claims of the miners' officials as to the situation on the Monongahela division. "There are probably 6,000 or 7,000 idle river miners," one said, "but they cannot be called strikers, as the majority of them have had no work for several weeks. There are now at least 10,000,000 bushels of coal loaded in the harbor. There can be no coal famine in the home market with this large supply on hand. Most of the coal can be loaded in case if the strike is prolonged and used for the lake trade."

He Will Act as Arbitrator.
New York, July 8.—A dispatch to the Journal from London says: The first informant in Bishop Potter has had of the great coal strike in America and that the men desired him to act as arbitrator, was given him by a representative of the Journal. The bishop did not hesitate an instant when asked if he would act.

"I will cut my visit here very short and go back immediately," he said, "if those men really want me to act for them."

Bishop Potter refused to commit himself to any expression of opinion with regard to the merits of the controversy, on the ground that he was not sufficiently well informed as to the cause of the strike, but he said:

"I learn of this with unalloyed grief and regret, and I shall be ready to make almost any sacrifice if I can do anything to harmonize those who are at issue."

Strikes Is Spreading.

Senator John G. Harris Dead.
Washington, July 8.—Senator John G. Harris, of Tennessee, died in this city late Thursday afternoon. (John Green Harris, of Memphis, was born near Tullahoma, Franklin county, Tennessee, February 30, 1842; educated at the academy at Winchester; studied law, was admitted to the bar, and commenced to practice at Paris, Henry county, Tenn., in 1861; was elected to the state legislature as a Democrat from the counties of Henry, Weakley and Union in 1867; was a candidate for presidential elector in the ninth congressional district of Tennessee on the Democratic ticket in 1888; was elected to congress and Democrat from the ninth congressional district in 1889, re-elected in 1891, and nominated as the candidate of the Democratic party in 1892, but declined the nomination; removed to Memphis and there resumed the practice of his profession; was a presidential elector for the state at large in 1896; was elected governor of Tennessee as a Democrat in 1897 and re-elected in 1898 and again in 1899; was a volunteer aid upon the staff of the commanding staff of the Confederate army of Tennessee for the last three years of the war; returned to the practice of law at Memphis in 1867, and was engaged in it when elected to the United States senate as a Democrat, defeating Judge L. L. Hawkins, Republican, to succeed Henry Cooper, Democrat; took his seat March 1, 1897, and was re-elected in 1902, in 1898 and in 1900. His term of service would have expired March 3, 1903.)

Find His Wife.
San Francisco, July 8.—A. G. Stacey, of Topeka, Kan., a well-known newspaper man of that place, came to San Francisco looking for his wife, whom he married two years ago, and who as he expected, was among the Christian Endeavor delegates from the San Francisco state, against his will.

Mr. Stacey arrived here Tuesday morning, ahead of the Kansas delegation, and took his station at the ferry landing to watch for his wife. Not finding her among the Kansas contingent, he went sightseeing at the Cliff house. After watching the seals depart themselves for some time, he decided to take a swim at Sausalito. Great was his surprise when, plunging into one of the big tanks, he literally swam into his wife's arms. Mrs. Stacey was enjoying the swim with another man, and when Mr. Stacey announced his relationship to the lady, Mrs. Stacey's companion fled with great haste.

Mr. Stacey conducted his wife and their young daughter to the entrance of the baths, where they met a number of Kansas lady delegates to the convention, who took Mrs. Stacey with them. Despite Mr. Stacey's search through the city since then he has been unable to locate his wife.

Bryan Warning.
San Jose, Cal., July 8.—Bryan was entertained at luncheon at the Hotel Vendome and then held an informal reception. So many people filed past him that he was finally forced to cease taking the hands offered him altogether, his arms having given out.

There is no truth in the statement that Bryan was unable to shake hands with the immense crowd. He shook hands with 20,000 people.

Burned.
LOUISVILLE, Ky., July 8.—An Evening Post special from Pineville, Ky., says Hugh Jenson's family of five, living fifteen miles north of this place, were burned to death Tuesday night, being unable to escape from the house which was fired over their heads. The dead are: Hugh Jenson, Mary Jenson, Fanny Jenson, John Jenson, a daughter eight years old, and Maggie, a daughter six years old. The remains of all six were found in the debris.

Booming.
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 8.—The Mississippi river at this point is within six inches of the highest mark reached in the unprecedented floods of April last. Between 4,000 and 5,000 men are out of employment as the result of the necessity of closing down the sawmills and there will be heavy losses on logs if the rise continues.

CUBA.

Preparing to Evacuate a City.

The Spanish Forces Are to Leave
Bayamo City to Be Burned.

New York, July 8.—A Herald dispatch from Havana says: Captain-General Weyler has at last decided it is wise to evacuate Bayamo. He has already ordered the people to evacuate themselves to Manzanillo, and has asked the war department, in Spain, to authorize the withdrawal of troops and the burning of the town. The expenses of maintaining the garrison there have always been very heavy and now which the end gained did not justify.

Much sickness prevails. The insurgents are looking out for the landing of artillery along the coast of Matanzas. The Spanish army has never been so weakened by sickness before. An official estimate of the number of Spanish soldiers in hospitals throughout the island is 2500. Not long ago the Luciano battalion numbered to the front 1100 strong; today the battalion numbers 150 men.

Successful Expedition.
New York, July 8.—A special to the Journal and Advertiser from Havana says:

An expedition of Cuban filibusters from Florida is reported to have landed on Sunday in Havana province at the mouth of Jaruco bay. The Spanish garrison, Maria Christina, which was cruising about the coast, endeavored to intercept the expedition, but without success.

When the cruiser arrived at the spot and disembarked her marines, they were fired upon and driven to their boats by a strong rebel force in ambush. After a brief bombardment of the insurgent position the warship hurried to Havana for reinforcements. When she returned the filibusters had already left with their munitions and supplies for Castillo headquarters in the Yagajay hills, closely pursued by Ponce de Leon's Spanish column, which had marched overland from Minas to intercept their movements.

Dr. Auguste Clemente Betancourt, an American citizen, after years of incarceration as a military prisoner in Pinar del Rio and in Cabañas castle as a political suspect, has been liberated and ordered to leave the island, no proofs to substantiate the charges against him having been found.

Manned Ferdinand Canabiquio, an American citizen, captured with the insurgents near Jaruco, 12 months ago, and since then confined in Cabañas fortress, has been notified to prepare for an early trial.

A Rumor.
HAVANA, July 8.—The report is current that Weyler had been recalled by the central government on account of the failure of his campaign in Santiago de Cuba province. The report of Weyler's recall is semi-officially denied, but he has probably been asked to tender his resignation.

Ground Under the Wheels.
SEATTLE, July 8.—The mutilated body of James Padden, formerly a freight train brakeman, was found on the Seattle & International railway track near Lakona, a suburb of Seattle. The man was evidently leaving town with W. L. Main's circus, and it is believed the two circus trains passed over him. One leg was found 100 feet from the rest of the body.

Padden came to Seattle a few weeks ago from Helena, having been employed on the Montana Central. He was broke. He was 34 years old, and as far as known had no friends.

Murder and Suicide.
CINCINNATI, July 8.—William Deere found the bodies of a man and woman apparently dying, lying side by side on a raft of logs floated to the shore a few miles above this city. Near the raft the dead body of an infant was taken from the water. The man and woman were alive, but were unable to speak. Wounds indicate attempts at suicide.

At Tangier.
TANGIER, Morocco, July 8.—The United States cruiser San Francisco has arrived here and the United States cruiser Raleigh is expected. The cruisers have been sent to Tangier to support the protest of United States Consul-General Burke against discrimination of the authorities of Morocco against Americans in refusing to permit them to employ native help. A privilege which is allowed Europeans.

Stuart's Carnival.
DALLAS, Tex., July 8.—W. H. Wheelock, representative of Dan Stuart, has departed for San Francisco to make arrangements for the pugilistic carnival in Nevada in September or October. The principal events will be finish fights between Maher and Sharkey and McCoy and Creedon.

A Hero.

ROCKAWAY BEACH, N. Y., July 8.—One of the most heroic rescues that ever took place along this beach occurred when Captain McEnroe, of the volunteer lifesaving corps, swam a mile out to sea and returned, bearing the unconscious form of Michael Collins, who had been 100 venturesome. The rescue was witnessed by more than 3000 people who cheered Captain McEnroe heartily for his display of strength and courage as, exhausted by his efforts, he lay unconscious on the sand.

Collins, who lives at 100 West Forty-third street, New York, swam out half a mile and was caught by the undertow and drawn still further out. His pelt for help were heard by Captain McEnroe. There was no time to launch the boat if the man was to be saved, so McEnroe plunged into the water and with skilled strokes swam swiftly toward the drowning man. Such was the distance that rescuer and rescued were mere black specks to those on shore.

When McEnroe began to return to the beach, it was slow and hard. Collins had become unconscious and was a dead weight. Once McEnroe and the man he was trying so hard to save sank out of sight, and it was thought that both were drowned. There were heavy cheers when the lifesaver was seen on the surface again, and at last completely exhausted, McEnroe landed the man on the beach and sank beside him unconscious.

Dr. Lusk was present and soon resuscitated both men. Collins was grateful. He took a big bunch of bills out of his pocket and stuffed them into the bag placed to receive donations for the lifesavers fund.

Eligement.
CHICAGO, July 8.—A special to the Tribune from Auburn, N. Y., says:

Lewis and Auburn are surprised over the announcement of the marriage of Miss Lou Dingley, daughter of Jerry Dingley, of Auburn, and niece of Congressman Nelson Dingley. Miss Dingley is about 20. She was married to W. E. Hadley, of San Diego, Cal., at the Parker house in Boston, last Thursday. It has been understood generally in Lewis and Auburn that Miss Dingley was to marry Arthur S. Meicher, of Auburn. Arrangements had gone so far that Mr. Meicher had his home entirely renovated.

Several weeks ago Mr. Hadley came East. Miss Dingley had met Mr. Hadley six years ago when he was stopping at Poland Springs, and when he visited Rock Hill this summer the acquaintance was renewed. It ripened into a determination to wed.

Miss Dingley's departure from Boston without apparent cause aroused the suspicions of her parents and of Mr. Meicher, for on the afternoon of the day Miss Dingley went away her mother and Mr. Meicher left for Boston, but returned several days afterwards without her. Mr. Meicher admitted today that Miss Dingley had been engaged to marry him for some time.
