MARION COUNTY COURT.

At this morning's session of the
Marion county court bids for the re-
pair of the Melama bridge were
opened. Five bids were submitted
there being a difference of \$112.50
between the highest and the lowest
bid.

THE BIG BRIDGE.

Contractor Gilbert Will Have It Open
in Travel, Saturday Afternoon.

The big bridge was not completed
as it was at first thought
probable, but Contractor R. M. Gil-
bert announces that all the plank-
ing will have been laid by 4 o'clock
Saturday afternoon, when the bridge
will again be thrown open to travel.

The contract allowed the bridge to
be closed to travel for a period of 30
days, but the repairs and the improve-
ments did not require that length of
time. Mr. Gilbert began work on
Thursday morning, June 24, and has
taken but 14 days to do the work. Mr.
Gilbert was delayed for about four
days by not having sufficient material
on hand to continue the work.

This morning there remained about
200 feet of the bridge to plank which
will be completed by 4 o'clock tomor-
row afternoon. The painting is pro-
ceeding quite rapidly but will require
about four days yet to complete the
work.

Contractor Gilbert, says he will send
word to the Statesman "bridge re-
porter" tomorrow afternoon that all
repairs to the bridge have been com-
pleted with the exception of "rolling
the gearing" and if that gentleman
would come down and superintend
that part of the work, the bridge
would be immediately thrown open to
travel.

THE SOCIETY NOTEBOOK.

Mr. and Mrs. John Minto yesterday
celebrated the 50th anniversary of
their marriage. A reception was given
in the afternoon at their home, which
is surrounded by shrubbery and flow-
ers of their own planting. Many citi-
zens and old pioneers paid their re-
spects to the venerable couple, and
were entertained with a vivaciously
seldom found in host and hostess of
that age.

Mr. Minto is one of the most widely
known of living Oregon pioneers. He
is a man of mental and moral force,
and has contributed largely to the
development of Oregon. He is in his
50th year, having been born October
10, 1822, in the town of Wylam, near
Newcastle-on-Tyne, England. Emi-
grating to the United States while
quite young, he located first in Pen-
nsylvania, and then came to Oregon,
crossing the plains to 1844. In his
company across the plains was Miss
Martha A. Harrison, to whom he was
married July 8, 1847, the event was
commemorated.

Mr. Minto has always taken a deep
interest in sheep, timber, agri-
cultural and horticultural interests
of the state. He is now secretary of
the state board of horticulture, and has
served as director on the state board
of agriculture. He it was, who named
the pass, now known as Minto's pass,
across the Cascade mountains. Mrs.
Minto, has been a public-spirited
woman. Since the establishment of
the Orphan's Home at Salem, she has
been a member of the board of control,
being now president of the board.

AT LEBANON.

LEBANON, July 9.—Special Prepa-
rations are made for next Monday on a
large scale. Four large beautifully
decorated arches have been built over
the streets through which the pro-
cession at 7:30 a. m. Monday July 12,
will pass. Bryan's picture stands are
placed from each. A magnificent
platform on wheels has been built on
which Bryan will ride in the parade
drawn by sixteen white horses and one
golden sorrel. The American flag
will lead the procession. Bryan's
wagon will be followed by an immense
parade of prominent citizens in car-
riages, bays and farmers in wagons.
The town begins to wear a holiday
appearance, campers from a distance
are arriving.

Melama bridge. The specifications
require all new timbers above the
floor beams, and the replacing of one
of several bents below. Judge Bar-

Curt of Linn county were present.

Coy, \$37; J. B. Thibouton, \$60; R. M.
Gilbert, \$44.50; E. L. Bentley, \$845
C. F. Royal & Son, \$2160.

He is the contractor who is repairing
the big Salem bridge, and will have
completed his work sooner and better
than was expected.
