# ENDEAVORERS

The City Is Very Crowded.

And More Arriving on Every Train—Great Enthusiasm

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—The proceedings and attendance of the great convention have freely demonstrated the fact that never before in the history of this organization of phenomenal growth has its annual gathering been crowned with such success. It has required the efforts of a big squad of police to keep people away from the monster halls in which the meetings are held. For more than an hour before the time set for services the streets near Woodward's and Mechanics' pavilions were literally packed with men, women and children eager for admission, and almost before sundown the buildings, capable of accommodating 20,000 people were so crowded that the fire authorities positively refused to admit any more of the Endeavorers or their friends. It is to the credit of the police that admirable order was maintained and no casualty marred the enthusiastic religious demonstrations.

Thousands of people from the East poured into the city and it is estimated that not less than 35,000 visitors have already arrived, although several trains are delayed.

The arrangements for the convention, made by General Secretary Baer, aided by the local committee, are admirable and every one is pleased. Slumming parties through Chinatown are being organized and are proving a source of peculiar attraction. Today seems to have touched the high-water mark of religious fervor, but it is predicted that by Sunday a wave of even greater excitement will sweep over the city. Withal, much hard, earnest work is being done, and the practical results of the convention will be surprising when the full record is written.

Early in the morning the Christian Endeavorers crowded the various churches, where prayer meetings were to be held. The topic at all these meetings was "The Christian Endeavor Pledge." The daily hour for Bible study was conducted at the Central M. E. church by Prof. Herbert L. Willetts, of Chicago, the topic being "A Message of Warning and Hope." At the First United Presbyterian church the first daily talk on the subject of "Truth at a Glance," was conducted.

Long before the hour for calling the meetings to order in the Mechanics' and Woodward's pavilions, crowds filled every available space in the big buildings. The delegates were even more enthusiastic than on the first day of the convention, nearly all having had sufficient time to recover from the fatigue of a long journey, and more or less discomfort of a railway trip. The thousands of lady delegates, in striking toilettes and wearing badges and ribbons of bright colors, looked fresh and happy, and when the song service was announced at the opening of the meetings they responded with a will that showed that their whole spirit was in the undertaking.

The regular sessions of the convention were resumed simultaneously at the two big pavilions at 9:30 a. m. At Woodward's pavilion President Clark presided. An address on the "Senior Society of Christian Endeavor" was delivered by Rev. Barton Perry, of San Leandro, Cal., which address was followed by open parliament charge of Rev. A. B. Philpott, of Philadelphia.

In the open parliament many members participated and there was an interesting and instructive discussion. Rev. E. W. Thompson, of Patterson, N. J., then spoke on Christian Endeavor and Mid-Week prayer meeting. His address was devoted to practical church work. Another

brifa 'open parliament' was then opened by W. C. Perkins, of Baltimore. An anthem followed, and after an address by Rev. R. H. Tyler, of New York, the session was then adjourned.

The convention at Mechanics pavillion was opened by W. H. McCoy, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., this city. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. W. K. Spencer, of Adrian, Mich. The first address was delivered by Rev. G. W. Coleman, of Boston, on "International Society Christian Endeavor." Rev. E. L. Powell, of Louisville, then spoke as follows: Dr. Powell was followed by Rev. W. H. G. Temple, of Seattle, Wn, who discussed committee work, closing with an eloquent peroration of the world, singing by a Chinese quartet followed, the Oriental vocalists being accorded a warm reception. Rev. Robt. Johnson, of London, Ont., spoke on "Monthly Consecration Meeting." An adjournment was then taken.

Evangelistic meetings at noon were concluded by Rev. Robert F. Pierce, of Philadelphia, and Rev. William Patterson, of Toronto, Ont., at the Y. M. C. A. hall; Evangelist David, of South India, and Rev. J. W. Chapman, of Philadelphia, at the Chamber of Commerce, and Rev. George Pentost, of New York, at the Emporium.
