COUNTY COURT

Disallows Mr. Hobart's Bill.

Proceedings in Department No. 2—Other News.

Answer J. W. Hobart, through his counsel, Messrs. Tilman Ford and W. E. Holmes appeared before the county court this morning and presented his claim for \$877, alleged to be due the services rendered by himself, as assessor and deputies, in making up the assessment roll for Marion county for the year 1897.

"In the matter of the claim of J. W. Hobart, assessor for compensation for the month of June, 1897."

"Now on this day comes J. W. Hobart, assessor for Marion Co., Oregon, and presents to the court an account for services rendered by himself and certain other persons, making in all 212 days, and it appearing to the court that the said account is not made out in conformity with the statute in that behalf made."

"It is therefore ordered by the court that the said J. W. Hobart be, and he is hereby allowed in full of such account, the sum of \$100, and that the remainder of said account be, and the same is hereby disallowed."

A just and reasonable settlement of the bill was then demanded by Mr. Hobart's counsel and the entire decision was taken up in discussion.

At 2 o'clock the county court rendered a decision whereby the order of the court of which the above is a copy, was sustained.

At this morning session of Department No. 2, Marion county circuit court, Judge H. H. Hewitt, made the following docket entries:

E. P. McCormick, trustee, vs. Salem Consolidated Street Railway Company receiver, cause continued.

Joseph Stocks vs. H. W. Oudle et al, equity, decree on the pleading for want of an answer.

Albany Iron Works vs. J. C. Roe, et al, foreclosure of mechanics lien, consolidated with Oudle vs. Roe.

The Enterprise Lumber Co. insolvent vs. C. E. Hawking assignee, assignment, cause continued.

A. E. La Rocque vs. James I. Dolner and Bottsville Farmers' Warehouse Association, partition, motion overruled.

S. E. Parrish, et al, vs. Mattie A. Parrish, motion to set aside costs. Costs retained at single mileage.

ROBERT'S STATEMENT. I, J. W. Hobart, being first duly sworn, say, that I am the duly elected, qualifying and acting assessor of said county of Marion; that as such assessor I undertook the performance of my duties for the current year at the time, and in the manner designated by law.

That I have at all times been cautious and careful as to the selection of my employees, and aim to employ only competent and honorable men, and I believe in that respect, at least, I have been successful, as will more fully appear by reference to the character of the work which they have done in the field and in the office up to said mentioned date, and the relative cost thereof under the fee fixed by law, as compared with previous expense for like services.

I, assent, further swear, that I believe that my employees have well earned the full consideration of \$4, fixed by the statutes of the state of Oregon, and that in no instance in selecting or employing them, or either of them have I in any manner indicated that it was my intention that they should divide their compensation with me, but on the contrary, such was not my intention. I intended they should have the compensation fixed by law, and so informed them, individually and collectively, and

selected my employees with reference to their fitness and competency believing that their services were worth the compensation fixed by law, and I further swear, that I believe that they have fully earned the same, because they have not limited themselves to working only eight hours each day, but whenever possible, acquired, they have worked from ten to twelve hours, instead of eight hours as required by law, but charging only for one day's work, in all such instances. My purpose in employing as many men as I did, was in order that the field work might be completed between the 1st Monday in March, and the 1st Monday in July of this year, for the reason that after the first Monday in July the people in the country are in many instances so busily engaged with their hay and other harvesting or other occupations, and in some cases after the 1st Monday in July many of the people go to the sea coast and the mountains, thus rendering it very difficult and in many instances absolutely impossible to obtain an accurate list of their property for assessment.

I have endeavored at all times to operate in performing the duties of my office as to secure the best and most complete services at the least possible reasonable cost to the taxpayers for efficient services so rendered.

M. Irwin, superintendent of Public Instruction, C. F. Lundquist and Rev. Grattan.

The program was passed in visiting the different industrial departments and inspecting the different buildings.

At 2.30 the large audience retired to the Chapel, where the following program was rendered:

The names of those who finished the course of study as provided at the Chemawa Indian school, and received diplomas of graduation were Lillian Larson, Nellie Reynolds, Douglas Holt, Chauncy David, Fredrick Freeman, Alpheus Dodge, Elijah Brown, Hubert Johnson and Sammie Lawrence.

In the evening the remainder of the commencement program, which consisted of songs, recitations, etc., was rendered.
