TRANSACTIONS

At "Old Marion's" Capital.

Important Order by County Court—Tax Payment.

The Marion county court convened at 9 o'clock this morning and during the forenoon the following orders were made:

"In the matter of county aid for Mrs. J. M. Hamilton, a pauper, allowed \$5 per month and D. C. Sherman was appointed disbursing agent."

"In the matter of the county bridge 30 feet in length on road from Hall's ferry to Snyder's bottom, road supervisor of district number 1 ordered to build bridge and present bill."

"In the matter of extending Marion street from Twenty-first to Twenty-fifth street in Salem, continued to August term."

The most important order made this morning and one that will be generally approved was the following pertaining to the issuing of county warrants:

"In the matter of issuing warrants by county clerk, ordered that all bills or claims against the county must be signed by at least two members of the court, before clerk can issue warrants for same."

By proper observance of the above order, there will be no "vacation" entries and warrants drawn accordingly as in the recent court house improvements. Such actions on the part of the county court will be warmly commended by all taxpayers who desire that the county's business be transacted in a business like and systematic manner, at the same time protecting them to a certain extent, at least, from tax-eaters. THE JOURNAL recently suggested the need of such an order and is pleased to note its passage by the court.

IN DEPARTMENT NO. 2.

Judge Hewitt, this morning, reconvened Department No. 2, of the Marion county circuit court, and during the forenoon the following docket entries were made:

Iver Larsen, insolvent, vs. Robert E. Flohrer, assignee, assignment; report of Robert E. Flohrer allowed except as to the claim of J. A. Van Eaton, \$20 of that claim being allowed and the said Flohrer is allowed the sum of \$100 for his services as assignee.

Mrs. Frances E. Baker vs. Wm. England, et al, foreclosure. Demurrer to answer of Marion county sustained.

In the matter of the estate of Lucinda Sweagie vs. Mrs. Nancy Bell, et al, appellant, appeal from county court; demurrer sustained.

The divorce case of Mary A. Small vs. Isham B. Small was called before Judge Hewitt at 11 o'clock; this afternoon the case was continued.

A sad scene occurred at the court house about 11 o'clock this morning just before this case was called. Mrs. Small was in the lower hall with two of her children when the husband and father appeared. He asked to have an interview with the oldest girl, and when he attempted to go with her to the upper room he was charged upon by the attorney of Mrs. Small. Fred Baker also took a hand in the melee, but the three were soon parted by Sheriff Wrightman and Deputy Wain. A little blood flowed all round, but no one was seriously hurt. It was most distressing—in fact bordering on the tragic to see the poor mother and other women scrambling for the children, while the father on the other hand was desperate to secure possession, or at least an interview. The little girl, over whom the scramble took place is wanted as a witness for the mother's side of the case. The father also had possession of two children, and it was a pitiful sight to see the innocent little tots, who probably loved the father and mother equally well, crying over the results of a disagreement which they could not understand. Many witnesses to this occurrence expressed the opinion that there should be no such institution as a divorce. The custody of the four children was granted Mrs. Small.

In the action for money case of J. H. Howell, et al vs G. W. Davis, et al, Judge Hewitt this afternoon, upon motion of Geo. G. Bingham, attorney for defendants, granted a change of venue from Marion to Lincoln county. The property involved in the suit is located in Lincoln county which made the change of venue necessary.

OREGON EXTENDS GREETINGS TO BRYAN.

[Continued from first page.]

crowd at the depot is conservatively estimated at from three to five thousand.

THE TRAIN

pulled into Salem at 12:05 and was greeted with the thundering applause of the multitude, when Mr. Bryan stepped to the rear platform accompanied by Messrs. Barkley, Hofer, Starr, Miller, Davidson and other prominent silver advocates. The speaker was presented by Mr. Hofer.

THE SPEECH.

Ladies and Gentlemen: I have but a moment to talk. In selecting the places at which I should stop on the very brief visit that I am able to make in this state now, I remembered that I spoke at Salem nearly two years ago, and that this is one of the two places at which I spoke then, and I thought that I could afford to slight Salem at this time and speak where I had not visited before.

I tried two years ago to turn public attention here to the consideration of a great question.

You will remember that these men at that time were indifferent to the money question. Since that time the interest in the money question has deepened. When the campaign opened a year after I was here, that question became the paramount issue, and when the campaign was over and the verdict rendered that question still continued to agitate the American people. (Interrupted by noisy crowd who were asked to be quiet or train would move on.) When the campaign was over the people continued to discuss the money question. When the campaign was on we insisted that the gold standard was bad, and the question was put to the American people how to get rid of it. As soon as the campaign was over we found that while we had not carried the election we had convinced the Republican party that the gold standard could not be sustained, and the new administration has sent a commission across the waters to try to get rid of the gold standard and create a double standard of gold and silver. If that commission approves of bimetallism it will advocate the proposition which I advanced when I said the gold standard was a curse to the American people. And it fails to bring it about it will convince those who favor international bimetallism that it is an impossibility, and instead of bowing down at the feet of foreign financiers, 70,000,000 of American people will rise to the full height of American citizenship and trust to the wisdom of the people of this country, themselves, regardless of what foreign nations ask or do.

Then the Republican party will have fully surrendered the right to decide this money question to the people instead of transferring that authority from Washington to London.

(At this point the applause became so great that it was impossible to secure his closing words.) At the close, the large crowd rushed up to shake hands. He shook with them, until the rush became so great that there was danger of women and children being hurt when the speaker declined very sensibly, saying the danger was liable to be greater than the pleasure derived. Then the train pulled out amid continued shouting and applause.

A large delegation of Marion county people went down on the train with Mr. Bryan and party. The Bryan ladies of Salem, presented Mr. Bryan, a fine bouquet of La France roses with 16 white ribbons and 1 gold. The latter have the inscription "From Ladies Bimetallists Union Salem Ore. July 12 1897—16 to 1."

DIED IN PORTLAND.—Mrs. N. O. Parrish this afternoon received a dispatch from Portland announcing the death of S. B. Parrish, at his home in Portland at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed but will be announced later.
