In Circuit Court Departments.

Important Writ of Review Case Dismissed.

The damage suit of the Butterville Farmers' Warehouse association et al. vs. A. E. LaRoque occupied all of Wednesday afternoon at Judge Burnett's court...

Judge Burnett made the following docket entries this morning: Samuel Herz vs. W. W. Giesy et al. action for money, attachment; Journal entries of the 7th ordered corrected to show total recovery of \$89.80 exclusive of costs and disbursements.

The taking of testimony in the damage case of the Butterville farmers' warehouse association vs. A. E. LaRoque was completed in Judge Burnett's court this morning.

Upon removing court at 2 o'clock this afternoon, further argument on the part of the defense for a new trial in the case of state vs. L. F. Gardner, continued. Messrs. Tillman Ford and R. J. Hendricks, counsel for the defendant appeared and cited numerous authorities favorable to granting a new trial.

The Longmiller divorce case was concluded before Judge Hewitt about 1:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon when it was taken under advisement. Docket entries made by Judge Hewitt are as follows: M. M. Ellis vs. T. J. Ford, continued.

White roses, sweet peas, honeysuckles, candytuft, smilax, myrtle, laurel, ferns and other flowers and vines were banked about the grave inside and out, making it a veritable bower, a most appropriate resting place for one who loved all flowers.

The funeral was a large one and impressive throughout, and a fitting close for a life that had indeed become part of the life of the community.
