## Tariff Conferees in Session.

### Are in a More Hopeful Mood--Nominations.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The tariff conferees were in a more hopeful mood and one leading representative of the senate expressed the opinion that the Republicans would be able to conclude their labors and summon the Democratic members by Saturday. The day was spent in considering minor details of the bill, which have been passed over with an occasional reference to the difference on sugar schedule. It is believed the contending factions are very near an adjustment, which will compromise the differences in the sugar schedule.

The senate tabled the motion of Stewart to reconsider its action directing the secretary of war to execute the San Pedro harbor project, and passed the Thurston resolution, providing for participation of the United States in the Paris exposition.

On motion of Tillman, the senate passed the bill to make distilled spirits transported from one state into another subject to the state laws, the same as liquor distilled within the state.

Stewart and white had a hot controversy over the San Pedro matter. The latter plainly intimating that Mr. Stewart represented the Southern Pacific railroad, and the latter resenting it.

Joseph C. Ault, of Montana; A. R. Johnson, of Montana, and Wilson Boyle, of the District of Columbia, to be commissioners to examine and classify lands within the land grant and indemnity land grant limits of the Northern Pacific Railroad company in the Eozeman land district, Montana.

Cyrus Leland, Jr., to be pension agent at Topeka, Kan., to be receiver of public moneys. William U. Ranft, at Missoula, Mont.; Lieutenant Daniel Benham, of the Seventh infantry, to be lieutenant-colonel.

#### HOUSE.

No business was transacted by the house. Immediately after the journal was approved a recess was taken, on Cannon's motion, Cannon having given assurance to Bailey that, in his opinion, a partial or complete report of the deficiency bill would be ready by that time.

#### In the Colorado Courts.

DENVER, July 16.—A suit involving \$30,000,000 is in progress in the United States court here and today arguments were heard on a demurrer to the altered bill. The plaintiffs are Leonard S. Ballou and Alexandria McLay, of New York. The defendants are Clinton B. Reed, John F. Campion and others interested in the Ibez-Mining Co., of Leadville. The plaintiffs ask that an accounting be ordered, and name the famous sum of \$30,000,000 as the amount due them. This makes the largest lawsuit on record.

#### FROM ROSSLAND, B. C.

Believing that there are those who would be pleased to hear from Rossland, I will volunteer what information I can command in relation to our somewhat phenomenal camp.

The vicinity of Rossland within a radius of six miles is staked with about 4000 claims and is but a portion of the great Kootenah country. Of course a large number of claims are staked by people knowing nothing of their probable value and without sufficient means to develop and ascertain the same and sometimes for speculation merely. These get the name of "wild cats."

Development had brought to the front the following named claims of merit all within sight of the city. The amounts of these various payrolls and number of men employed is as follows:

Much enterprise has been shown this spring.

The streets have been improved, \$50,000 having been expended upon them and a new loan has been made of 20,000 for future work.

We are to have a new court house cost of ground \$5500; of building \$6,000. Six large new hotels grace the panorama within a block of where I live. So that from an insignificant beginning such as a prospect, had come forth a promising city, having now a claimed population of from 8000 to 10000 people.

We have two railroad here, the narrow gauge Columbia & Western railroad is to be standardized at once and it looked like direct connection was to be made with as little delay as possible with the Canadian Pacific railroad via Crow's Nest Pass.

One hundred miles of the latter is contracted for to be built at once it is currently understood.

Religious denominations are well represented, there being a Presbyterian, Methodist, Catholic, Episcopal and English Episcopal church here.

We have good schools and plenty of them, a good opera house, electric light plant, water works etc.

Building and city improvements have gone ahead of the development of new mines and it looks like they should have kept pace together.

Capital discriminating, thus in its investment, has caused a lull to come upon mining for the time being.

Times have not been as good this spring and summer as was looked for last winter, but it is hoped that last year's activity in mines will be resumed.

Of course real estate has now taken on a sympathetic movement and not much additional building is being done.

Laborers have been receiving generally \$2.50 per day for city work, \$3 until lately, it having been reduced to \$2.50. Miners receive from \$3 to \$5. Blacksmiths receive from \$4 to \$6.

There is no demand here at present for common laborers, or in fact for tradesmen, except skilled miners.

More of the latter, however, are needed and needed badly.

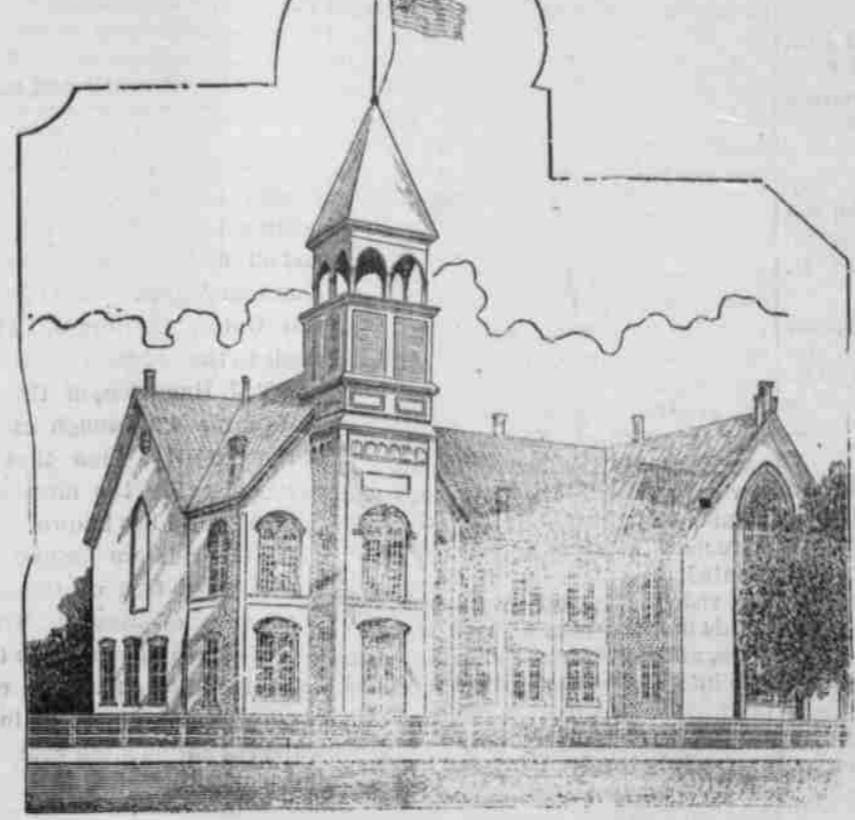
