SCHOOL POLITICS.

Movement to Make County Chairman Davis School Director.

Early Thursday the Cherrington faction in school district affairs started in with a petition to request Hon. Geo. W. Davis, late clerk of the board of School land commissioners at the state house, and present chairman of the Republican county central committee, to become candidate for school director to succeed the late Hon. E. M. Waite.

It is not understood that Mr. Davis wants the place. He lives almost adjoining Adam Ohmart, who represents the South end of the district. The Eastern part of the district has no representative on the board at present and it there is an election held that part of the district will make demands.

There is really no necessity for an election at present. The year's work is practically done, and there is almost nothing to do until the next election.

It has been hoped that the management of the Salem school district would be out of politics. The precipitation of Mr. Davis's candidacy is ill advised and in very bad taste and his friends do him an injury by pushing his name at this time which is possibly done without knowledge.
