CONGRESSIONAL.

Tariff Conference Report.

Agreed to and Signed--Dingley
Presents It to Hanse.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—The republic-
an members of the tariff conference
committee called in the Democratic
members. Among the Democrats
there was a disposition to allow the
Republicans to have their way and
make a report at once, so that the de-
bate in the lower branch of congress
could proceed.

Before the full committee met the
Republican members held an hour's
consultation at which they affixed
their signatures to the conference re-
port. When the bill was submitted
to the Democrats the Republicans
said they would report the bill today.

The Democrats were given an op-
portunity to sign the conference re-
port and withdrew for consultation
among themselves as to whether or
not they would sign. After the con-
sultation, the Democratic conferees
signed the report, which was soon
afterwards sent to the house.

The paragraph in relation to sugar
is Dutch standard, in color tank bot-
toms, syrups of cane juice, melada,
concentrated melada, concrete and
concentrated molasses, testing by
polariscope not above 75 degrees .95
of a cent per pound, and every ad-
ditional degree shown in polariscope
test .035 of a cent per pound addi-
tional, and for fractions of degrees in
proportion, and on sugar above 16
Dutch standard in color and on all
sugars which has gone through pro-
cess of refining, 1.95 cent per pound;
provided, that nothing herein con-
tained shall be construed as to abro-
gate or in any manner impair or affect
provisions of treaty of commercial
reciprocity concluded between United
States and king of Hawaiian Islands
on January 30, 1875, or provisions of
any act of congress heretofore passed
for execution of same."

The conference restored house rate
of 20 per cent, on sugar cane. Lead
ore remains at one and one-half cent
per pound. Lead bullion and pig lead
two and one-half cent per pound.

On hides, cattle, raw or uncured,
dry, salted or pickled, duty is 15 per
cent, ad valorem, provided that upon
all leather exported made from im-
ported hides, there shall be allowed a
drawback equal to amount of duty
paid on such hides, to be paid under
such regulations as secretary of treas-
ury may prescribe.

REVENUE PRODUCER.
In the debate on the tariff bill in
the house Dingley said the bill, as re-
ported by the conference committee,
would produce next year \$225,000,000,
\$25,000,000 more than the present law.
Over \$40,000,000 had been lost in this
year's revenue by importations of wool
and sugar and other things, the duty
on which was raised in the bill. For
all that he calculated the bill this
year would raise \$185,000,000. One of
the greatest demonstrations of the
debate occurred when Lanham paid a
tribute to W. J. Bryan. The Demo-
crats cheered for several minutes, and
many of the spectators joined in the
demonstrations.

FOR DEBATE.
The house was crowded early with
members, who animatedly discussed
the new tariff schedules. Soon after
assembling, Dingley submitted the
conference report on the tariff bill,
and made an effort to get the Demo-
crats to agree to a vote last evening,
but they insisted on two days for de-
bate and without reaching an agree-
ment as to when the vote should be
taken, Dingley took the floor and
opened the debate in favor of the
adoption of the conference report.

TO BE FORCED.

The impression in the house based
on statements made by house leaders,
is that the tariff debate will extend
late in the night, the Republicans in-
tending to force a vote before adjourn-
ment.

NOMINATED.
The president has sent the following
nominations to the senate: Charles
H. Isham, of Maryland, to be com-
missioner in and for the district of
Alaska; Alpheus P. Hanson, surveyor-
general of Wyoming.

OFF FOR THE POLE.

BOSTON, July 20.—The steam seal-
ing bark Hope, with Lieutenant R.
E. Peary and party on board, bound
for North Greenland, left this port at
daybreak. The object of this voyage
is to establish a station at the north-
ern point in Greenland which shall
be used as a base of supplies for an ex-
pedition in search of the North Pole
under Lieutenant Peary in 1898. To
this end a party of Esquimaux will
be established at the new settlement,
and will during the next year be en-
gaged in making preparations for
Lieutenant Peary's expedition.

In the party which left here are 43
persons, including besides Lieutenant
and Mrs. Peary, and their daughter,
their servants and the crew; Mr. and
Mrs. H. J. Lee, of Meriden, Conn;
Robert Stein, of the United States
geological survey; Albert Oertel, the
famous Arctic scenic artist, J. D.
Wiggins, of Falls Church, Va., a tax-
idermist; Dr. Frederick Schwen, a sur-
geon, of Washington, D. C.; several
investigating parties under the di-
rection of C. H. Hitchcock, of
Dartmouth, who will study the
glaciers and relics of the old Norse
colonists from Iceland, and another
from the Massachusetts institute of
technology, under W. R. Porter, who
will remain in the North through
next winter to hunt the big game of
the country and bring back zoological
specimens. There are also on board
two representatives of the national
museum, who are expected to bring
home several tons of fossil flora for
several museums.

The Hope will make direct for Syd-
ney, C. B., where she will take on coal
for the remainder of the voyage. The
ship will skirt the coast of Greenland,
dropping scientific parties at various
points, and taking Lieutenant Peary
to Whale sound, where his plans for
establishing a settlement will be car-
ried out.

The return voyage will be begun, it
is expected, in about five weeks after
the Hope arrives, and parties will be
picked up on the way back.

COMPLICATIONS.

The Plots Are Thickening

Between England and America--
Naval Vessels Made Ready.

LONDON, July 19.—In the house of
commons, in the course of a debate on
the foreign office vote, Sir Charles
Dike, radical, said:

"The gravest foreign question at
the present moment grows out of our
relations with the United States, and
if the matter is not dwelt upon, it is
because the government is conscious
that in these difficult matters it can-
not count on the support of the en-
tire house."

SERIOUS COMPLICATIONS.

NEW YORK, July 20.—A special to
the World from Washington says:

The possibility of serious interna-
tional complications between the
United States and Great Britain as
the result of the recent gold discover-
ies in Alaska has become apparent to
the state department. Senator Davis,
of the senate foreign relations com-
mittee, has been requested to secure
the immediate ratification of a treaty
for determining the boundary line
between Canada and Alaska in order
to lessen the probable difficulty.

Chairman Davis has announced his
intention of calling this treaty up for
action at the next executive session
of the senate. There is said to be no
objection, and prompt ratification is
expected.

VESSELS TO BE MADE AVAILABLE.

NEW YORK, July 20.—A special to
the Herald from Washington says:

With a view to making available for
immediate service as many of the
ships of the navy as possible, Secre-
tary Long is considering the advan-
tage of placing the monitor Mian-
tomoh in the reserve.

The Miantomoh was laid up in
ordinary at League Island in 1895 and
since that time but little attention
has been paid to the ship except to
make repairs from time to time. Sec-
retary Long now intends to have the
vessel put in thorough condition so
that she can be ordered into reserve
with the Columbia and Minneapolis.
This means that a "short crew" with
a full supply of stores and coal will be
kept on board and that she can be
made ready for sea service within five
days if the necessity arises.

While department officials declare
there is no significance in this move,
the attitude of Japan with respect to
Hawaii and Cuban troubles are suf-
ficient to make the administration de-
sire to be in good shape to meet any
emergency that may arise.

IN DEMAND.

NEW YORK, July 20.—The Herald's
correspondent in Rio de Janeiro tele-
graphs that the United States and
Japan have communicated with the
government of Brazil with the idea of
the possible purchase of warships now
building for Brazil in England and
Germany.

Owing to Brazil's financial plight
at this time it was recently decided
to sell, before completion, if possible,
all the war vessels being built for
Brazil in the two countries named.
These are principally small boats.

ALASKA.

Excitement Greater in Alaska Than
Anywhere.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., July 20.—
The excursion steamer Queen ar-
rived from Alaska with 170 passen-
gers, principally tourists.

If reports be not overdrawn by the
officers of the Queen, the excitement
at Juneau over the rich gold finds in
the Klondyke country is much more
intense than here in the Pacific states.
Merchants and tradesmen in both
Juneau and Sitka are closing their
stores and shops and hastening to the
new Eldorado.

Fifty business men left Juneau for
Dawson City on the Klondyke July 12,
and 150 would leave on the 16th, two
days after the Queen sailed. The of-
ficers said that by the time the Queen
returns to Juneau on her regular trip,
nine days hence, there will not be an
able-bodied man left in town. Many
men are leaving Juneau for the gold
fields without provisions or means to
buy them.

The few Alaskans who came down
on the Queen were greatly gratified to
learn of the appointment of C. S.
Johnson, of Juneau, to the position of
United States attorney for that dis-
trict. Johnson was appointed to the
same position in 1890, going north
from Nebraska. His prosecutions
were so vigorous as to win for him an
enviable reputation, hence the ex-
ulting of the Alaskans at the present
appointment.

Reports from the various salmon
fisheries in Alaska are that fish are
very scarce. The fishing season at
Oreca has been very poor so far and a
small pack will be made. The Pacific
Steam Whaling company has packed
to date 15,000 cases of red salmon and
the Alaska Packers' association about
8000 cases. The prospect for the pack
at Cook Inlet is very good, fish having
commenced to run fairly well. At
Karluk, the salmon have just com-
menced to run and the outlook is not
encouraging for the spring run.

The Pacific Steam Whaling com-
pany and Hume brothers have built
two large cannery plants at Karluk
this season. The Pacific Steam Whal-
ing company is at the present time
building a large cannery at Kenai
river, Cook Inlet.

The manager of the Oceanic Pack-
ing company at Point Roberts in-
formed the Associated Press corres-
pondent today that from the com-
pany's four traps near San Juan pass
an average of 20,000 sockeye salmon
are being taken daily. Such a heavy
run is unprecedented.

STATE HOUSE NEWS.

The Tillamook Tug company, with
Messrs. A. H. and John Malaney and
W. H. Johnson as incorporators, filed
articles in the office of the secretary
of state, today. The capital stock, of
the corporation, is \$10,000, and the ob-
ject is to operate steamboats on Tillamook
bay and the Pacific ocean.

The governor today granted a full
pardon and restoration to citizenship
to Joseph W. Allen, a Multnomah
county man, who was sent up three
years for larceny. He has been serv-
ing as assistant engineer.

Peter Snellback, represented as be-
ing mustered out to fight the Indians
in 1865, has through his representa-
tive, Peter Snellback, presented to
the state department certificate No.
537, for \$50, and dated March 21, 1865.
It is claimed that Snellback was
mustered out and enlisted in company
G, First Oregon infantry. Accord-
ing to the act of October 24, 1864, each
soldier was entitled to \$50 when mus-
tered, \$50 when half of the enlistment
was served, and \$50 upon discharge.

According to the reports of the
state treasurer, there are 40 soldier
bounty bonds, of \$50 each, exclusive
of interest, uncalled for.

The executive committee of the
Soldiers' Home board audited the ex-
pense bills of the home for June.
The total expenditures allowed
amounted to \$1187. Of this \$748 will
be paid in state vouchers and \$439
from the national fund.

STRIKE.

The Virginia Miners Are Out.

Debs at Fairmount--More Illinois
Miners Strike.

FAIRMOUNT, W. Va., July 20.—As a
result of yesterday's meeting at Wil-
low Tree Grove, near Mononagh, 225
miners refused to work. The drivers
being in sympathy with the miners,
refused to haul, and consequently the
rest of the miners who had gone to
work were compelled to come out.
About 60 miners at Pritchard, after
hearing the news from Mononagh,
came out and the rest will follow.

The Hutchinson, Luther & Palatin
miners were the next to come, and all
the men with the exception of those
at the Hite & Shaft mine will soon be
out.

Eugene V. Debs arrived here and
will hold a meeting at Mononagh at
2 o'clock returning here for a large
meeting, when it is thought nearly
all the miners will follow the lead of
the Mononagh men.

CONFERENCE.

COLUMBUS, O., July 20.—The ex-
ecutive committee of the United
Mineworkers is in session here. The
consultation is private.

DEMONSTRATION BY STRIKERS.

CANONSBURG, Pa., July 20.—About
500 striking miners from the Millers'
Run district passed through town
headed by a brass band and a drum
corps. A halt was made at the mines
of the Canonsburg Coal Company,
where they were met by armed depu-
ties and ordered to keep off the com-
pany's property. They halted in a
vacant lot near by and sent commit-
tees over to the mines to gather to-
gether the miners. The mines of the
company closed down today to await
the decision of the miners employed
here.

ILLINOIS MINERS OUT.

ST. LOUIS, July 20.—Information
has been received to the effect that
450 men employed in the shafts of the
St. Louis Consolidated Coal Company,
at Collinsville, Ill., went out at the
request of the marching delegation.

Excitement at Port Townsend.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wn., July 20.—
The excitement here in regard to the
fabulous richness of the Klondyke
mines is on the increase although
only a few of the most enthusiastic
will start the present season for the
famous fields.

To start now a person cannot pos-
sibly reach the Yukon or Klondyke
region before from the middle to the
25th of August, and those who have
been there assert the working season
closes never later than the first of
September, nor opens before the mid-
dle of June.

Those who start north not later
than May 1 will stand as good a
show for "striking good things" as
those who go now and live nine
months on " grub."

The cost of living may be safely es-
timated at \$5 per day, and those
who go north must figure on that ba-
sis. There is good game to be had.
