LATER ELECTRIC CARS.

Salem Assumes More Metropolitan Air.

In the Operation of Electric Railway.

F. B. Anson, Receiver of the Salem
Consolidated Street Railway Com-
pany, announces that in response to
repeated requests, he has decided to
run a late car as follows:

For South Salem, leaving Hotel
Williamette at 10:45 p. m.; returning,
leaving cemetery for the city at 10:50
p. m.

For Insane Asylum, leaving Hotel
Williamette at 11 p. m.; returning,
leaving asylum at 11:15 p. m. for the
city.

For State street, leaving corner at
Gray Bros, at 11:30 p. m., running to
Twentieth street only.

The Salem & Suburban Railway will
run a car to the Fair Grounds, leav-
ing the corner at Court House at 10:30
p. m., and returning, leaving the Fair
Grounds for the city at 10:45 p. m.,
passing State Insurance building at
11 p. m., for Morning side.

These are the latest cars that will
be run by the street car companies but
later cars can be had by making pri-
vate arrangement at the office as hereto-
fore.

These changes in the operation of
the electric railway cars of our city
will be generally appreciated by the
patrons of the road. With the con-
solidation of the two competitive lines
under one management and the sub-
sequent remodeling of and furnishing
the companies' cars with all modern
improvements, Salem possesses an elec-
tric railway service second to none
in the state.

CLONDIKE NUGGETS.—One of Mar-
ion County's Deputies Sheriff, of a
sarcastic turn of mind, has placed
upon one of the counters in the Sher-
iff's office a pile of molten lead beside
which he has placed a piece of writ-
ing paper bearing words printed in

time. The second section arrived
about 40 minutes later.

two weeks, closing just before August exam-

Oregon's Wheat.

Little county expects to harvest 14
million bushels of wheat this year.
Benton county expects a surplus of
600,000. An conservative estimate of
Yamhill puts the figures at 475,000
bushels, wheat. Lane, comes in with
estimates of about one million bush-
els. Conservative estimates for Polk
and Marion foot up to about two mil-
lion and a half bushels. This is a
fair showing for the valley counties
though many place the figures much
higher. The quality of the grain
harvested is very good, plump and
of fine color. The oat crop will be enor-
mous. All late grain is maturing and
is in the best condition possible.

There are many fields of late
sown grain that are looking very fine
and a good crop from them is certain.

In Eastern Oregon the crop situa-
tion is fine, but in some localities it
has been much damaged by grasshop-
pers. Umatilla county being the
largest yielder. It is expected about
5,200,000 bushels will be marketed
from there while Sherman, Gilliam
and Wasco counties will turn out be-
tween six and seven million bushels
of wheat.

WENT TO THE HOSPITAL.

A Man With a Wounded Arm Relates
Many Stories.

A man giving the name of Henry
Franklin and claiming to have come
from Roseburg called on local doctors
Friday afternoon for treatment. He
had been shot through the right fore-
arm and the wound had not been
given proper medical attention. He
was sent to the Salem hospital, as it
is invariably done by the Marion court
when application is made by strangers,
that a bill for medical services from
some Salem physician may be pre-
sented the county for payment of
such services.

The man tells a number of conflict-
ing stories that have aroused the sus-
picion of Chief of Police Dilley, who
is in correspondence with the Rose-
burg authorities. He told the physi-
cian he was a prospector. The wound
he said, was caused by the accidental
discharge of a revolver while in camp
near Roseburg seven weeks ago. His
arm, he claimed, had been treated by
doctors in Roseburg, but it showed
no evidence of a physician's care.

He was interviewed by Chief of Po-
lice Dilley. His story to the officer
was that he met with his misfortune
in Cow creek canyon; while attempt-
ing to enter a vacant cabin to seek
shelter from rain. A gun had been
set to fire at the opening of the door,
and it caught him. He is 25 years old
and of respectable appearance.

A Salem physician this morning
stated that it might be necessary to
amputate the injured member in or-
der to save the man's life.
