The Candelaria Farm to Furnish a Portland Firm With Fruit. The following item regarding to shipment of Oregon fruit to eastern markets, is taken from a Portland paper:

"S. A. Clarke, representing the Candelaria fruit farm, adjoining Salem, has agreed to furnish the Earl Fruit Company 1000 cases of Bradshaw, Washington and Columbia plums, to be shipped this week.

Candelaria fruit farm furnished three-fourths of the car that was forwarded from Salem on July 15, and sold on Monday in Chicago at fairly good prices.

Advices from New York say that the growers in that state have unusually large crops of Bartlett pears, that will be in the market during September, but will this year be in shipping condition by the middle of August.

SINKS.

Steamer Gypsy Goes Down.

Runs Upon a Snag Near Eola Wednesday Afternoon.

The Gypsy, the O. R. & N. Company's light draught steamer that has been operating between Corvallis and Harrisburg, lies on the bottom of the Willamette river just above Eola.

Having a load of freight for Salem and Portland the little steamer left Corvallis Wednesday morning for a down river trip. The water being deeper than that in which the little craft was accustomed to slowly wend its way between Corvallis and Harrisburg, the boat was traveling at a rapid rate of speed when the accident occurred.

There were four passengers on board all of whom were ladies. Although badly frightened the passengers were safely brought to shore and thence to Salem by private conveyance.

Steamer Ruth arrived up from Portland last evening and proceeded at once to the scene of the accident. She returned to Salem this morning with some of the damaged freight which she removed from the injured boat. The Ruth then returned to Portland.

Master Mechanic Carson, of the O. R. & N. Company, came up from Portland on the overland last night and examined the damaged boat. He thinks it will be possible to raise the craft and take it to Portland for repairs.

Steamer Ruth returned to Portland on schedule time this morning and will continue making regular trips. The O. R. & N. Company may place another light draught steamer on the upper Willamette to take the place of the Gypsy but nothing official could be learned this morning.
