STEAMER GYPSY RAISED.

Taken to Portland This Morning For
Repairs.

Steamer Gypsy, the O. R. & N. Co's,
light draught steamer, which was
sunk near Eola last week, passed
down the river this morning to Port-
land.

The damaged craft was raised by the
Steamer Modoc Saturday. The boat
was first beached, when the aperture
in its side was covered with canvas
and the water was pumped out of the
boat, Sunday a "false" side was con-
structed and this morning the boat
steamed away to Portland
where the craft will be sub-
stantially repaired. It will require
a week or ten days to make the neces-
sary repairs when the boat will again
resume operations on the river.

The exact damage done the boat
could not be ascertained until the
damaged craft had been raised when
it was learned that the king-post had
been broken midway between the pro-
menade and main decks, and two or
three of the keelsons had been broken.
The hole in the hull of the boat was
fully 50 feet in length with an average
width of 2 feet.

The damage done the Gypsy by the
unexpected collision with the snag
proved not nearly so serious as was at
first feared. The Steamer Modoc fol-
lowed the Gypsy down the river this
morning so as to render assistance
should another accident be experi-
enced.

state treasury, or somewhere else.

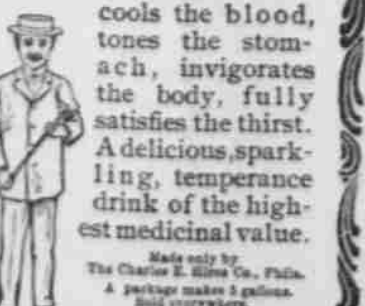

HOME FROM MT. RANIER.

Three Salemites Successfully Make the
Ascent of This Peak.

E. Lynn Woodin reached Salem Sat-
urday evening, via Steamer Ramona,
having made the ascent of Mt. Ranier
last week. There were three from
Salem who were successful in making
the ascent of this white capped
mountain to the north of us. Be-
sides Mr. Woodin, Otto Wilson and
Secretary Gruller, of the Y. M. C. A.
also made the ascent.

The party left Salem on Monday,
July 19, going to Oregon City where
they were joined by a number of other
mountain climbers and the trip to
the base of Mt. Ranier was continued.
The ascent of the mountain was be-
gun Monday morning, July 26th and
its peak was reached about 4 p. m.
Tuesday. In making the descent, Mr.
Woodin was standing within twenty
feet of Prof. McClure of the faculty of
the state university at Eugene, when
that gentleman fell over a precipice
to his death on the rocks about 300
feet below. By taking a shorter route
Mr. Woodin reached Salem in advance
of the other members of the party,
who are expected home this evening.
Mr. Woodin reports a delightful trip
and feels well repaid for making it.
