For the benefit of those interested
it should be stated that the present
duty on prunes is 25 cents per pound,
whereas the Wilson tariff was 15 cents
per pound. The old McKinley bill
gave prunes 2 cents duty.

The Yaguia Bay News prints the
long string of resolutions adopted by
the state teachers' association, and
says: "The unusually successful gather-
ing terminated with a beautiful
solo." This reminds us of a fellow
who started out with a theater com-
pany to present Shakespeare's plays.
The players all quit except the star,

public school charts endorsed and that
was all he wanted. If there were any
teachers there they did not show up.

If Governor Lord wants to make a
ten-strike let him give the public the
semi-annual report of the condition of
the state treasury and force a show-
down as to where the money is. Does
anyone imagine that, if the state
treasury was compelled to make an
accounting and was \$300,000 to
\$500,000 short, the result would be any
more satisfactory than the Oregon
national, the Williams & England
bank, or any other financial institu-
tion with which Treasurer Metcahan
was personally or officially interest-
ed as a depositor or otherwise? We do
not say this to hurt his feelings or call
in question his integrity. But poli-

tics and banking are such a bad
partnership, and politicians are such
poor businessmen that the public has no
protection whatever. The situation
in Oregon is favorable to an enormous
defalcation. The state credit is good;
there is a large surplus of funds; there
has been no accounting since years,
hauling the financial legislative invest-
igation every two years; there is no law
to protect the people, as the old law
requiring quarterly newspaper pub-
lication was repealed; besides the
state treasurer is so universally popu-
lar and such a good fellow that he is
a dangerous man in a public treas-
ury.
