

**HOPS**  
The Conditions in Oregon  
The Life Blood Being Slowly Sucked Away.

S Farrar, one of Salem's buyers and also an extensive raiser, visited the north end of the county today. He was seen at the depot this morning. Mr. Farrar thinks that the extremely warm weather of the past ten days had a tendency to rapidly develop the hop lice, whereupon they left the vines. The only damage now to be feared is that the lice will enter the bur itself. Only a short time ago the New York yards were badly infested with the pest but after a season of warm and favorable weather, the yards are now practically free from all lice. This may prove the situation in the Willamette Valley also.

**HOPS IN LANE.**  
In Lane county says the Eugene Guard of August 9:  
The army of sprayers are still at work, many growers have finished the second spraying and are now started on the third round, while some have sprayed from three to four times, and one at least six times.

Some growers that sprayed, say that the newly formed hops have the pest in them, and they are fearful that they will lose their crops. Generally speaking, yards that are unsprayed will go unharvested. We believe this is conceded.

Several leading growers inform us that they believe they will be compelled to spray up to picking time to harvest even a small crop.

The situation as we view it is certainly alarming. With the best of weather, only forty per cent of a crop is expected. If rainy, foggy weather should prevail for a week or more it is doubtful if hardly any hops would be harvested.

About a dozen growers who have hopped hops commenced picking yesterday and today. They are light, but the quality will probably be up to the average.

**LICE DESTROYED.**

The Eugene Register says. Reports from a number of our most prominent hop growers are to the effect that most of the hoplice have been destroyed and there is but little danger of them doing any injury to the hop crop in Lane county. Spraying has been resorted to in nearly all yards under cultivation this year, and many growers have gone through the spraying process thoroughly three times, and nearly every yard has been sprayed twice. The prospects now are for a good crop.

A visit to Den Linton's hop yard was made by the Register reporter. The hops are looking fine and indicate a good crop this year. Mr. Linton has just finished spraying the whole yard for the third time, having

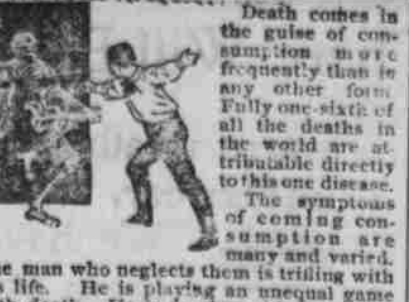

**LINN COUNTY HOPS.**

Mr. G. W. Phillips, of Selo, was in the city today. Mr. Phillips has a big yard of hops, which if saved, will mean \$6,000 or \$7,000 in cash in his pockets, and hence it is no wonder that he is after the hop louse red hot. In fact he says he is sleeping only about 15 minutes a day, spending the rest of the time after the pestiferous louse. His present program is as follows: He sprays the vines with a solution of soap and petroleum, he also is sowing with a sower, slacked lime, over the yard; besides this he has 200 head of sheep in the yard. He is satisfied that with the three devices the lice will leave; the lime rises and suffocates them, the sheep dust makes them very weary and the spray kills them. Mr. Phillips is confident he will have a good yield of hops all right.—Albany Democrat.

**POGUES' CROP BULLETIN.**

The warm, dry weather was of no injury, but on the other hand, was of great benefit to the hops. Hop lice thrive in warm, moist weather and are killed by hot, dry weather, hence the great benefit to the hops in the killing of the lice. The reports from the hopyards indicate a great improvement in conditions and prospects. The hop louse continues to be numerous, but at present no wholesale destruction is imminent; but on the other hand hopgrowers are expecting a crop greatly in excess of the total product of 1896, and fully as large as the largest output heretofore made.

**UNION PARTY PLATFORM**

Adopted at Albany, Oregon, June 2, 1897.
