## CUBA.

Marta Esperanza Is Sacked.

Spanish Forces Were Unable to Defend the Town.

KEY WEST, Fla., Aug. 11.—Marta Esperanza, a town in Santa Clara province, was attacked again by insurgents recently, who entered the town at 3 p. m. and left at 4 a. m., sacking all the stores and taking merchandise, clothes, drugs, money, etc. The Spanish force made resistance, but the insurgents defeated them with little trouble. The Spanish loss was heavy. The Cubans lost one killed and several wounded. The forces of General Montano came to the aid of the town, arriving one day late. They took arms and ammunition from the guerrillas who remained in town although most of them had joined the insurgents. Then they burned about 30 houses belonging to Cubans.

Calixto Alvarez attacked and sacked the towns of La Encrucijada, Crucos and Placetas. The Spanish forces made no resistance. These towns are in the pacified province of Santa Clara.

Juan Anson Quintero, the insurgent leader, who surrendered lately at Pinar del Rio, was taken from his home in Cerro, Havana, to the outskirts of the city at Jesus del Monte and there murdered.

The Cubans of Key West have made no demonstration over the death of Canovas.

**SPANISH DEFEATED.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—A dispatch to the Herald from Havana says official information has reached Havana of a decisive battle between troops and insurgent forces in Matanzas. According to this information the Spanish troops were routed after a hard battle with heavy losses. This news caused a veritable sensation in Havana, as it is generally known that Captain General Weyler is now in Matanzas, and there is a belief that the Spanish troops directly under him were those which suffered defeat at the hands of the rebels. However, if this is true, the Spanish officials here have taken great pains to suppress the fact.

Then, too, the knowledge in some quarters that General Gomez is due in Matanzas at about this time with a large body of insurgents added to the interest in the battle. While there is no good cause to believe in question, there has for some time been a seemingly well-founded belief in Havana that Generals Weyler and Gomez would meet in Mantanzas.

The Spanish loss in troops and officers was greater than in any recent battle. The Spanish troops were compelled to give way before the rebels, leaving many dead upon the field.

There seems to be considerable concern in the palace here about the result of the battle. While the officials will not talk, the Herald correspondent has learned that detachments of Cuban cavalry have been pouring into Mantanzas from Santa Clara province, and, according to some reports, Major-General Francisco Carillo commander of the fourth army corps, and Brigadier-Generals Rego and Montegudo are among the invading forces. A concentration upon the Santa Clara border of all the insurgent forces in Mantanzas

was ordered some days ago by General Aveline Rojas, the insurgent commander of the province.

In view of this rebel activity and the belief at the palace that General Gomez or his lieutenant, Major General Carillo, would attempt a demonstration against Havana city large reinforcements of Spanish troops have been moved to the front from Havana and Pinar del Rio provinces. General Weyler intended to establish his headquarters in Matanzas city and then in Guines, Havana province, in case the Cubans should succeed in pushing their way through Matanzas into Havana.

A rumor reached this city last night that railroad traffic has been stopped on almost all the lines running through Matanzas province.

The excitement was added to by a later report that General Weyler has ordered the Marquis de Abumada, the acting governor-general, to send as large a force of troops as could be spared to the vicinity of Guines, near the border of Havana and Matanzas provinces. Additional artillery was shipped last night to Guines.

The situation of General Weyler is similar to that of General Martinez Campos when he tried in December, 1895, to check the famous raid of Gomez and Maceo and was compelled to fall back successively at Jovanellos and Coseo and Colon before the Cubans.

Those in a position to know hint the chief source of alarm in the palace is the recent dispatch from Matanzas. The names of Weyler and several other Spanish generals as well as those of Gomez and Carillo are often repeated in the course of the message. The alleged information in the dispatch, coupled with the demand for reinforcements at Guines and the shipment there of heavy artillery, leads many to believe that the Spanish troops will make a further stand at Guines.

Jose Guasp has been arrested for demanding money and threatening the life of Senor Sagra, a prominent Spanish millionaire, in Havana.

**UNION PARTY PLATFORM**

Adopted at Albany, Oregon, June 2, 1897.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 independent of the action of any other nation.

That the government shall issue all money without the intervention of banks, and in quantity adequate to the needs of the people.

That all money issued by the government, whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal tender for all debts, public or private.

That no contract or law shall discriminate against any kind of money issued by the government.

We are opposed to the issue of United States interest-bearing bonds in time of peace.

We demand the redemption of Oregon from rings, commissions and corrupt methods, and demand honest elections and election laws, including stringent registration laws.

We demand that the people shall have the veto power over all legislative enactments by the use of the referendum.

We demand the election of all officers by a direct vote of the people.

We favor and advise that all nominations for municipal and county officers, including members of the legislature, shall be made by primary elections.

We recommend that this party shall be known as the Union party, and invite all reform forces of the state to unite with us in realizing these principles by united efforts, and we pledge ourselves to unite with such reform forces in carrying out this bond of union.
