EDITORIALS WHILE YOU WAIT.

Sacramento Bee: The Bee has received from O. P. Austin, manager of Literary Bureau of the Republican National committee, a letter asking: "Could you kindly let me know by return mail whether you will desire any copies of this matter which is prepared by the editorial staff of this bureau? I would be glad to place upon them the names of all who desire any class of the matter, whether documents, Washington letters or suggestions for the political column or editorial page. The approaching political campaigns, in many states, may develop a demand among editors and readers for material bearing upon the questions at issue, and if you should desire any of these classes of matter which we have for distribution you will be welcome to them free of any charge."

"We send you enclosed copies of a Washington letter and some suggestions for the editorial page or political miscellany, which can be supplied you each week if you desire."

The Bee is not in need of literature on either side of politics or finance. Whatever it has to say on national topics, it will endeavor to say in its own crude, sledg-hammer style.

The Literary Bureau of the National Republican Committee must have considerable customers already on this coast, however, for we recognize some of the gems sent us by Mr. Austin as having appeared in California papers within a day or so. Probably we were remiss in allowing Mr. Austin's matter to lie so long upon our desk. Here are two of his editorial paragraphs, which have already been scooped up by several of our esteemed cotemporaries:

"President McKinley's signature to the Dingy bill touched the button, the provisions of that measure do the rest."

"Mr. Bryan's manipulation of the Trans-Mississippi Congress in the interests of free-silver politics is resisted vigorously by the business men of the West who had great hopes of the benefits which would result to the business interests of the country through that meeting."

This Literary Bureau should have talent enough at its disposal to send different editorial matter to different localities. It looks suspicious to see more than one of our highly-respected exchanges blossoming out with the same original editorialettes.

Really, however, this Bureau should call itself the Literary Bureau of the gold gamblers. The hand may be the hand of the Republican party, but the animating voice is certainly that of the Shylocks. The literature is not that of Republicanism, but of Wall street. It is disseminated by Wall street and for Wall street. Wall street cares no more for the old Republican party than it does for any other tool which it may be temporarily using. Wall street is the driver; the Republican party merely the horses. And Wall street is now endeavoring to lassoo the Democratic party, so that it may drive both political organizations tandem over a squeezed nation and a ruined people.

In the editorial matter sent out by this Literary Bureau—for Republican papers, mind you!—is the following: "The recent meeting of Gold Democrats in New York showed unexpected strength, and makes it perfectly apparent that that organization is gaining membership and standing, and making rapid inroads upon the ranks of the Silver wing of the party. The sound money organizations in each State where they are to be campaigns this Fall are to have substantial aid, especially with speakers, and the fight will be just as hot as it was last year."

No doubt they will have a substantial aid; the same substantial aid that was accorded last year to the Gold Democrats as well as to the Republican party; the same substantial aid which brought Bourke Cockran

back from Ireland after he had felt his chance of entering the British parliament, and was disappointed; and the same substantial aid which left the harbor of San Francisco defenseless as Naval Officer John Pie Irish assaulted the silver ranks in the east and thought Wm. J. Bryan and his friends were retreating because he followed the silver orator and spoke to comparatively few people. Undoubtedly the "sound money" organizations will make a hot campaign this fall. They will be supplied with ample money for that purpose.

Query: If the silver cause is dead, why do the gold gamblers continue to throw away such vast sums in assaulting the corpse?

UNION PARTY PLATFORM
Adopted at Albany, Oregon, June 2, 1897.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 independent of the action of any other nation.

That the government shall issue all money without the intervention of banks, and in quantity adequate to the needs of the people.

That all money issued by the government, whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal tender for all debts, public or private.

That no contract or law shall discriminate against any kind of money issued by the government.

We are opposed to the issue of United States interest-bearing bonds in time of peace.

We demand the redemption of Oregon from rings, commissions and corrupt methods, and demand honest elections and election laws, including stringent registration laws.

We demand that the people shall have the veto power over all legislative enactments by the use of the referendum.

We demand the election of all officers by a direct vote of the people.

We favor and advise that all nominations for municipal and county officers, including members of the legislature, shall be made by primary elections.

We recommend that this party shall be known as the Union party, and invite all reform forces of the state to unite with us in realizing these principles by united efforts, and we pledge ourselves to unite with such reform forces in carrying out this bond of union.
