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AT MARION'S CAPITOL.

Proceedings in the Various Departments
at the Court House.

There are other than the Clondyke
Gold fields that are receiving the at-
tention of gold seekers. In fact, sec-
tions of Marion county promise satis-
factory returns. While many are
seeking a fortune in the Alaska and
British Columbia gold fields, a great
many are turning their attention to
the further development of mines
nearer home.

The Gold Creek mining section, lo-
cated on the north fork of the Sant-
iam, promises a satisfactory yield of
yellow metal and as a result, every
foot of that section of the county is
being staked off into claims.

Albert Ridgely today filed with the
county clerk notices of the location
of six mines, located by himself and
five associates. The names by which
the new mines are to be known and
the locator of each are as follows:

The Blue Bird mine by F. F. Reiner;
St. Paul mine by L. C. Garrigue; The

A. C. Sloan; Gray Eagle mine, by A.
T. Huggins; The Black Horse mine,
by Albert Ridgely. The mines are all
located in the Gold Creek mining dis-
trict and were located between July
20 and July 30.

DIED.
BUNCE.—At the Salem hospital at
12 o'clock noon, Saturday, August
14, 1897, George Bunce, aged about
24 years, of brain fever.

For several years the deceased has
been engaged in the barber business
in this city. He was taken ill about
two weeks ago with what appeared to
be pleurisy but was out on the streets
again within about two days. On
Friday last he was again obliged to
take to his bed and the attending
physician pronounced his ailment
brain fever. On Monday of this week
his condition became so serious he
was removed to the Salem hospital,
where despite the best of medical at-
tendance, he died as stated above.

His parents Mr. and Mrs. J. B.
Bunce, of Vancouver, were present at
his bedside when death occurred.

Funeral arrangements have not yet
been completed but in all probability
the funeral will be held Sunday under
the auspices of the A. O. U. W. of
which order deceased was a member.
