work at \$2 to \$2.50 per day; miners get
\$3.50 while mechanics get from \$4 to \$5

COMMUNICATION Pertaining to Forest Lands.

Commissioner of General Land
Office Writes to Judge Terrell.

Judge G. P. Terrell this morning re-
ceived the following self explanatory
communication from E. F. Best, act-
ing commissioner of the United
States general land office at Wash-
ington, D. C.:
To the Judge of Probate, Salem,
Marion county, Or.
SIR:—It is of the utmost impor-
tance to the people of the public land
states and territories that the policy
of the Land Department respecting
the preservation of the forests of the
United States should be conducted
upon broad, intelligent lines, and
with this end in view I would be
pleased if you or any association or
body of persons (in your city) inter-
ested in the subject would give me
the benefit of their experience re-
specting the policy of reserving the
timber lands of the United States
from entry or disposal, and would sug-
gest such laws and regulations, as, in
your opinion would be the most suit-
able in your region of the country for
the management of the forest re-
serves, having in view the best inter-
ests of the government as well as the
present and prospective interests of
the persons immediately or indirectly
affected in the preservation of the
forest.

I would be pleased if you would
prepare such a bill for congressional
action, as, in your judgment would
carry out the suggestions you may be
kind enough to make.
1. Give the boundary and location
of any body of timber land in your
region, that could be advantageously
reserved, and state your reasons
therefor with as full description as
you can of the topography, geology
and natural resources of the land
sought to be reserved.
2. State whether cattle, sheep or
other live stock should be permitted
to graze upon the reserve and, if so,
your reasons therefor, the number of
head per township and under what
restrictions as to time of grazing, and
whether or not a license should be
given and a tax collector for the
privilege.

3. If any of the timber on the lands
reserved could be advantageously dis-
posed of by sale, or otherwise, state
in what quantities and in what man-
ner, and the rules that would prove
salutary for the protection of the
forests from waste or destruction by
fire and insure a steady and constant
supply of timber, and the preservation
of the undergrowth essential to retain
the moisture and prevent disastrous
floods.
4. Make such other suggestions as
may occur to your mind.

I enclose circulars of this office of
March 13 and June 30, 1897.
I thank you in advance for antici-
pated courtesy.

THE FIRST FLAX FIBRE.

A Beautiful Sample Produced for Mrs.

Lord.

Mrs. W. P. Lord today secured a
magnificent sample of flax fibre, by a
hand test, taken from the first re-
sult of two acres prepared by Messrs.
Mitchell and Curry in charge of the
crop that is being brought in to the
Oregon Woman's Flax Fibre associa-
tion, at the warehouse of the big Wil-
lamette mills. This sample is 34
inches long, of fine even grain, and
shows very heavy percentage to the
amount of straw. The color of this
fibre is said, by those who know, to be
extra good, and in fact the product is
superb in every particular.

The first lot, being the product of
about two acres, has been rotted or-
retted, and is now being dried prepar-
atory to breaking and scutching.
More is in soak, and thus the process
will be repeated until the entire crop
is converted into fibre.

Mrs. Lord has received most encour-
aging news from the east, including
one offer to take the product of 1000
acres. This experiment is paving the
way to what will no doubt be a great
industry right here at Salem, in the
near future. The JOURNAL is pleased
to state that all who have raised flax
for the association so far seem highly
pleased with the results.

MARION.

Harvesting and threshing is progres-
sing finely this beautiful weather, fall
sown wheat is averaging about 15
bushels per acre. B. F. Heushaw,
threshed 14 acres of early sown spring
wheat grown on M. S. Norton's place
that threshed out 25 bushels per acre.
Oats are making a fair yield.

The hop crop in the vicinity, will
be fairly good, the yard on the Rank
Edgar place north of town is reported
as damaged by the louse other yards
almost clear of the louse with a fair
prospect of a good yield.

The two fruit dryers here are get-
ting well under way but neither of
them will be ready for business any
time soon, as the Italian prunes are ripen-
ing up already and will soon be
ready for drying and the crop is heavy
of that variety.

William Webb, who lives on the
hill west of town has traded for an
8 horse power threshing machine and
will thresh the crop on the hill and
thus save the stevedores from pulling
up there as heretofore.

Mrs. C. A. George, is reported quite
sick with bilious attack.

Mr. Frank Wiseman doesn't propose
to burn wet wood the coming winter
as he is erecting a house for the pur-
pose of keeping the wood dry.

Hadley and Kent, is getting consid-
erable wheat already and are going
to ship a car load soon. On Monday
of this week the price paid was 75c.

in carriages and several will go upon
their bicycles this evening. The oc-
casion was a pleasant one and is an-
nually given, to which the members
of the school look forward to with
pleasant anticipation.
