The Salem Company Opens Up in Albany.

J. M. Kyle, manager of the Oregon
Fruit & Produce Co., was called to
Albany yesterday, by some of the
leading fruit growers, and induced to
establish a branch business at that
point. A warehouse was rented, and
a large supply of boxes and other
packing material telegraphed for, as
well as a corps of expert packers to
come from California. Fruit will be
received forthwith and by next week
some shipments will be made.

This transaction speaks volumes for
the Salem company, and will no
doubt prove of mutual benefit to both
The excellent results so far achieved
by Mr. Kyle's company, for this
year's fruit has attracted the atten-
tion of wide awake growers who are
loath to take chances on turning their
crop over to irresponsible parties.
They secure in this manner the ben-
efit of continued experience with Ore-
gon fruit in the largest markets of the
land. The fact that Mr. J. Van Eaton,
who is the pioneer fruit shipper of
the Willamette valley, is right at
Chicago, looking after the shipments
made by this company, is an ad-
vantage that all who know his quali-
fications are anxious to profit by. With
Mr. Kyle to direct matters here and
supervise all packing, which is done
by experienced, trained men, and also
seeing the fruit properly stored in re-
frigerator cars, and with Mr. Van
Eaton at the other end of the line, it
looks as though the fruit from this
section was receiving about the best
handling possible.

The prices received for all ship-
ment so far made have been entirely
satisfactory to the growers, and
gratifying to Mr. Kyle. There has
been no change in the market, and it
is safe to say that the fruits now en-
route from here and being shipped
will bring good prices.

No Show for Bimetallism.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—Westminster
Gazette endorses the editorial of the
London Times on bimetallism,
and says it sees no chance of
the Indian mints being reopened to
the coinage of silver, adding:

"To fool any longer with Presi-
dent McKinley's commission is
surely unnecessary, in declining to
abide by the market value of silver
as the standard value. India has
taken a step toward demonetizing
silver. Japan and Russia have
adopted the gold standard and no one
means to go back on it. The will
soon say so and not be deterred by the
possibility of a Bryan victory and dis-
miss the question finally."

Iowa Populists.

DES MOINES, Aug. 19.—The popul-
ist state convention will meet to de-
termine a full state ticket. Senator Pe-
ffer of Kansas, will address the con-
vention. It is expected that between
200 and 300 delegates will be present.
It seems to be generally conceded
that Charles A. Lloyd, of Muscatine,
who will be presented by the second
district, will be the candidate for
governor. Lloyd was a candidate for
congress from his district in the last
campaign, and is very popular.

UNION PARTY PLATFORM

Adopted at Albany, Oregon, June 2,
1897.

We demand the free and unlimited coin-
age of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to
1 independent of the action of any other nation
without the intervention of banks, and in
quantity adequate to the needs of the people.
That all money issued by the government
whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal
tender for all debts, public or private.
That no contract or law shall discriminate
against any kind of money issued by the gov-
ernment.

We are opposed to the issue of United States
interest-bearing bonds in time of peace.
We demand the redemption of Oregon from
rings, commissions and corrupt methods, and
demand honest elections and election laws,
including stringent registration laws.

We demand that the people shall have the
vote power over all legislative enactments by
the use of the referendum.
We demand the election of all officers by a
direct vote of the people.

We favor and advise that all nominations
for municipal and county officers, including
members of the legislature, shall be made by
primary elections.
We recommend that this party shall be
known as the Union party, and invite all re-
form forces of the state to unite with us in
realizing these principles by united efforts,
and we pledge ourselves to unite with such
reform forces in carrying out this bond of
reform.
