Afridas on the Aggressive.

A Large Force Preparing to Attack Michni and Shab.

SIMLA, Aug. 24.—A large force of Afridas has just been reported to be advancing down to Khyber pass and the so-called Mad Mullah, or fanatical priest, who is inciting the natives of that territory against the British, is said to have collected the Mohamads for an attack upon Michni and Shab. The Royal Irish and representatives of the native infantry with a battery of mountain artillery, have been ordered to Kohat.

Fighting is reported at Murjeda between Afridas and the British garrison at that place.

Kailulani's Ambition. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—Princess Kailulani, who has just attained her majority, will return to Hawaii in October after an absence of 10 years spent in England and on the continent. She has hopes of being made queen of the present island republic if annexation fails. She is watching for a chance. When it comes she looks for a compromise between the Republicans and the royalists in favor of herself for the chances of her aunt, ex-Queen Liliuokalani, being restored to power are generally conceded to be slim in any event.

The princess will arrive in New York about September 25, from England. She will probably stay for a short time in this city, visiting with ex-Queen Liliuokalani, who will then be residing here temporarily while congress is not in session. Kailulani's father will accompany her.

Finest Leading Rebels.

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LONDON, Aug. 24.—An official dispatch from Peshwar announces that the Afridas attacked All Musjed, and adds they were attacking Fort Maude. The enemy's line is a mile and a half long. All the Afridas are said to have joined in the uprising.

Mine Discovered.

REDDING, Cal., Aug. 24.—With her own hands Mrs. Annie Glud, of Oakland, uncovered a vein of gold in the heart of the Shasta mountains. She is preparing now to head an expedition of women to develop what she believes is a rich store house of the yellow metal.

It was by merest accident that the hidden wealth was revealed to her, and she kept the secret for nearly a year. A serious illness prevented her from delving further for the gold. Now she has regained her health and is ready to start for the claim, which is registered under her own name in the United States Land Office at Redding. Twelve miles from there in the Shasta mountains is Stillwater creek, running through the gulch where Mrs. Glud and her husband had pre-empted a quarter section of land.

STATE NEWS

Another new vein of the richest ore struck yet is reported from the Quartzville mines.

Dr. Tape, of Sumpter, Or., came near losing his life by being thrown from a wagon in a runaway.

The work of straightening the Grande Ronde river has been suspended until after harvest.

Geo. W. Smith, of Ashland, was overcome by heat. He was unconscious for some time but is recovering now.

The young ladies of The Dalles have arranged an entertainment for the benefit of The Dalles hose team to be given in the near future.

The Weston Leader says 80 acres of the Ginn place, near Weston, which was threshed last week, averaged 62 bushels to the acre.

James Stewart, of Arlington, was killed by the cars running over him, cutting off his head. He was intoxicated and fell upon the track in a drunken condition.

From 426 acres of land near Kingsley, in Wasco county, belonging to M. A. Moody, 60 tons of hay were cut, and more than 9000 bushels of grain threshed this season.

But 23 of the 39 applicants were successful in the county teachers' examination at Oregon City. Five first grade, seven second grade and eleven third grade certificates were granted.

A 10-year-old son of Elvin Witham, living near Corvallis, fell from a pear tree severely injuring himself. He was unconscious for several days. Recovery is probable.

Geo. Starr, while out threshing near Corvallis, was run over with a wagon and severely injured. He fell asleep while lying in the shade under a wagon, the wagon passing over his hip.

Perry Houser had 30 acres of alfalfa in on McKay creek, which proved a favorable pasture for the grasshoppers. Mr. Houser obtained but five small loads of hay off of the whole field where he last season cut several hundred tons.

UNION PARTY PLATFORM

Adopted at Albany, Oregon, June 2, 1897.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 independent of the action of any other nation.

That the government shall issue all money without the intervention of banks, and in quantity adequate to the needs of the people.

That all money issued by the government, whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal tender for all debts, public or private.

That no contract or law shall discriminate against any kind of money issued by the government.

We are opposed to the issue of United States interest-bearing bonds in time of peace.

We demand the redemption of Oregon from rings, commissions and corrupt methods, and demand honest elections and election laws, including stringent registration laws.

We demand that the people shall have the veto power over all legislative enactments by the use of the referendum.

We demand the election of all officers by a direct vote of the people.

We favor and advise that all nominations for municipal and county officers, including members of the legislature, shall be made by primary elections.

We recommend that this party shall be known as the Union party, and invite all reform forces of the state to unite with us in realizing these principles by united efforts, and we pledge ourselves to unite with such reform forces in carrying out this bond of union.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

Prof. E. C. Loomis, after whom the great lake in Alaska was named, in talking of his recent trip there, said the other day: "In I wore silk underwear and red flannels, which I steeped in lard oil. The German agricultural papers make the remarkable statement that the imports of American apples into the German empire last year were more than 20 times as large as in any previous season, the shipments in 1896 having amounted to no less than 6,000,000 center—the center being equal to a hundred weight.

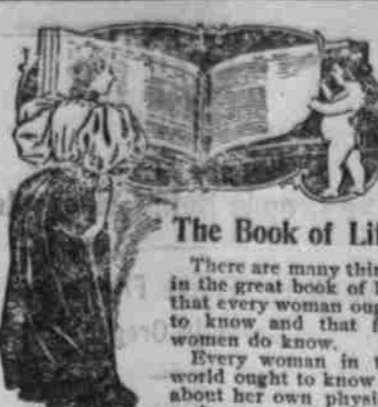
