There were some smaller items of expense in each county which did not occur in the other county and they were omitted:

Linn county is much larger in area than Marion. Outside of their principal cities the two counties have about the same population. Linn county has more streams to bridge than Marion and more miles of highway to keep up. The county for the past year has been very economically governed in the hands of the People's party, which has reduced county expenses over \$10,000. In Marion county the county government have been increased from \$66,507.17 for 1895-6 to \$80,024.50 for 1896-7. The greater items of increase in Marion have been for roads and bridges, paupers, military, indigent soldiers, bounties and criminal expenses. It should be stated in justice to Marion county that the salaries of officials are fixed by the legislature at a higher figure than in Linn county. But this does not explain it all. Linn county maintains no military companies. The county judge of Linn county cuts down fees and discourages criminal prosecutions in the justice courts, an enormous field for expenditure in Marion county. We do not believe that Marion county has enough better government to justify the higher taxes collected from the people than in Linn.

Charlotte Smith, president of the New York Women's Rescue League, claims to have statistics to prove that there is an intimate connection between the labor question and her scheme for compelling marriageable bachelors to become benefactors. The great competition of the sexes in the world of labor is, she declares, because 60 per cent of the men refuse to marry, and as a consequence 60 per cent of the women are forced to support themselves by work. So she is prepared to show that if bachelors were compelled to marry and the army of unmarried women were to become house-wives and mothers, wages would go up.

Mrs. Lord has sacrificed a large portion of her summer outing with her children to devote herself to the details of making the first flax crop. She has now men at work rotting, retting and getting ready the first lots for market. Of course, this is almost entirely experimental, and will be subject to some failures and disappointments. But these first efforts are historical and deserve more than passing mention.

It is announced by the London Times that "the numbers of the Indian famine relief list are steadily decreasing and evidences of famine are rapidly disappearing." In other words, the work of depopulation goes grimly on.

Fisheries Combine. LONDON, Aug. 25.—Edwin Corwin, of Chicago, has closed a deal amalgamating the United States and Canadian Lakes Fisheries Companies, whereby the control of 20 companies, passed into the hands of the British company with \$5,000,000 capital. Boston's big subway is about finished. It cost \$5,000,000. An elevated railroad is now proposed.

All Gambling Games Warned Off the Grounds.

Besides the educational exhibit that is being worked up for the State Fair, the State insane asylum, farm will have an unusual display of fine stock of all kinds. The state prison and reform school will also exhibit cattle and products.

STATE FAIR ATTRACTIONS continue to multiply and each day adds something new. Many requests come for permits to run gambling games, but the lines are very strictly drawn against wheels of fortune and other devices. The gamblers have evaded the law in the past by buying their way into the grace of the officials. Wm. Ayres, of Portland, wants the usual pool selling privilege that is rented at the grand stand in connection with the races, but it is not certain that he will get it. The privileges at the fair are not going begging at all this year.

Arnold, the merry-go-round man, will delight the children again. The Christian church has rented a restaurant privilege on the grounds. Mrs. E. H. Flagg, has leased the Southwest dining hall, and will serve meals. If she would show Mr. Flagg, as a sample of a well-fed subject of her skill, she would have a full house all the time.

Stoltz, the "Spa" man has put up a new building on the grounds. Westcott & Irwin will erect a stand near the race-tracks. All persons wanting space in the pavilion or on the grounds should apply at once to Secretary C. D. Gabrielson.

ASYLUM EXHIBIT. A big oat yield is reported by Steward Handsaker at the state insane asylum for the insane. Thirty-five acres were thrashed out Wednesday that yielded 63 bushels to the acre, machine measure. Eleven acres spring White side oats went better and yielded 75 bushels to the acre. We would like to hear of any records that beat the asylum farm.

Superintendent Paine is preparing an exhibit for the state fair that will be of interest as showing the state farming operations. There is to be generous rivalry among the state institutions for supremacy at the big fair, and Farmer Andy Gilbert, of the pen is liable to give the other farmers an eye-opener.

UNION PARTY PLATFORM

Adopted at Albany, Oregon, June 2, 1897.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 independent of the action of any other nation. That the government shall issue all money without the intervention of banks, and in quantity adequate to the needs of the people. That all money issued by the government, whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal tender, public or private.

We are opposed to the issue of United States interest-bearing bonds in time of peace. We demand the redemption of Oregon from rings, commissions and corrupt methods, and demand honest elections and election laws, including stringent registration laws.

We demand that the people shall have the veto power over all legislative enactments by the use of the referendum. We demand the election of all officers by a direct vote of the people. We favor and advise that all nominations for municipal and county officers, including members of the legislature, shall be made by primary elections.

We recommend that this party shall be known as the Union party, and invite all reform forces of the state to unite with us in realizing these principles by united efforts, and we pledge ourselves to unite with such reform forces in carrying out this bond of union.
