The city council met last evening with the mayor and councilmen, except Holman, present.
The committee on ordinances recommended amendment of the insurance ordinance to exempt all mutual and benevolent companies from taxation. Carried.

Under the heading of petitions, Hon Tilmon Ford presented a petition asking the reinstatement of J. W. Gamble as policeman in this city.

Upon reading of the petition the mayor stated that the council was not informed that Mr. Gamble had been suspended. Here a report was made by Marshal Dilley setting forth that he had suspended Mr. Gamble, which report was referred to the committee on health and police to report at the next regular meeting.

A new bicycle ordinance was presented and read the first time. Same was also read second time by title. Referred to committee on streets and public property.

Mr. Graham moved an amendment to the insurance ordinance fixing the tax on each company at \$18 per annum, to take effect October 1, 1897. Passed. The bill passed third reading, as amended, all voting aye except Parkhurst.

The ordinance prohibiting boarding moving railroad trains, was read third time and voted down.

After the reading of bills, the matter of repairing the bridge on Fifteenth street, was brought up. The street commissioner reported that the bridge was entirely washed out, and Chairman Parkhurst reported that the city had a bridge further down North Mill creek which could be moved to Fifteenth street, but no action was taken.

The chairman of the committee on street was empowered to employ a man to take the place of Mr. McKillop.

The street commissioner reported that many cross walks were giving out, and suggested that if some of next year's road tax could be paid ahead by the tax payers he would endeavor to put down cement crossings with such funds. A report was asked from said officer as to how many crossings he could put down in such a manner.

Mr. Parkhurst moved that all bicycle riders be invited to meet at the council chamber next Tuesday evening to consider the new bicycle ordinance.

Attempted Robbery.
Last night about 9 o'clock an attempt was made beyond a doubt to burglarize the New York Racket store. A young man passed two strangers on Cheneketa street at the rear of the store about that time, and a few moments later heard a pane of glass break after which he saw the pair run down the alley. Shortly after Chas. Atwood, who sleeps in the store, came in and discovered the glass in the back door broken out, and reported the same to Mr. Barnes, the proprietor, forthwith. This morning a pane of glass was also found to be broken out of the south window, and it looks as though the intending thieves had been frightened from their undertakings by the breaking glass. The case was reported to Chief Dilley, and a close watch since been kept. Several suspicious looking characters have been seen in town for some days, and it is believed this is the work of their class.

PETITION TO REINSTATE

John Gamble as Policeman in the City.
"To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon:—
"We the undersigned citizens and property owners within the city limits of the city of Salem, respectfully petition your honorable body, and ask that Mr. John Gamble be reinstated upon the police force of this city.
"In doing so permit us to say that Mr. John Gamble, during the two years and eight months that he has served as a policeman has contributed toward maintaining good order, without running our city government into unnecessary expense, by making uncalled for arrests. He has made arrests when necessary and, in the case of hobos, he has under the direction of a majority of the council and many of the taxpayers of the city succeeded in persuading hundreds of hobos to depart from our city and by so doing furnishing us with good government without piling up expenses against the taxpayers by arresting such hobos and filling up our jails with them, as has been too much the custom in the past.
"We further add that we do not believe in the doctrine of dismissing any man from office before the expiration of the term for which elected, until he has been duly proven guilty of neglect of duty, or conduct rendering his dismissal necessary."
