ties were going to meet their Waterloo. The people are tired of peanut politicians and highwayman methods of holding up the taxpayer. If the people are given an opportunity for united action they can give their foes a fall in 1898.

In spite of all predictions to the contrary, President McKinley has steadfastly refused to disturb his predecessor's application of civil service rules to varied branches of the public service. Here and there a slight modification, as the practical necessities suggested, but that is all.

The Consular Service, one which the horde of shouters at St. Louis last summer demanded should be thrown open, is sealed even tighter than Mr. Cleveland left it. Nobody can get a consulate now anywhere, unless a vacancy occurs through death, resignation or dismissal for cause. And then he can get it only after an examination as to fitness.

Consular incumbents, who have been capable and intelligent, are permitted to remain at their posts. There has not been a removal, except for cause, since the beginning of the administration, and the army of applicants, who have filed their indorsements and are awaiting the setting up of a consular guillotine, might as well cease to torture their souls.

Mr. McKinley had within his gift of appointment 163 consular places. These were posts whose salary is in excess of \$2,500 a year. Mr. Cleveland did not include these in his civil service consular order. The new president has, for the most part, filled these places, and a number of others made vacant, and he is about at the end of his tether.

Tremendous pressure has been brought to bear to have Mr. McKinley take the whole Consular Service, but he has withstood and will continue to withstand it.

FROM DYEA.

Geo. Hayne Describes the Trip to Lake Lindeman.

John Hayne, the Salem attorney, is in receipt of the following letter from his brother George, dated Dyea, September 3.

DEAR BROTHER:—I will write a few lines, it will be very short as it is late and the store will close soon.

We have all our goods over to Crater Lake. We packed our goods on our horses as far as the "Scale," which is within three fourths of a mile of the summit. It is a very rough trail and the mud is knee deep in many places. It has rained every day since we began packing. We made good time and had no bad luck. We had to pay six cents per pound to have our goods packed from the "Scale" to Crater Lake.

The price of packing has more than doubled since the rush.

Mr. Welch and I came down along the trail to sell our horses. We sold them all by noon. We got \$65 to \$75 per head. A week ago we could have sold them for \$100 each.

There are not any people getting over the White Pass, and it is a good thing we changed to the Dyea route.

Welch and I will start back to join the rest of our party tomorrow.

We have to carry our goods three miles between Crater and Long lakes, then we have two more short packs before we reach Lake Lindeman. The trail for ten miles this side of the summit is ally with people. But there are few new arrivals now, as it is far too late.

No one has any idea how hard it is to get in. Hundreds of people have turned back after getting as far as Sheep Camp. Sheep Camp is a city of tents, and it is a lively place too. It costs \$1.50 to have a shoe nailed on a horse and you turnish the shoe. And a pair of men's shoes cost \$10, and every thing else in accordance. We have sold hay at 10¢ per bale.

None of us have had to undergo anything in the way of hardships as yet. The only trouble with me is that I want to eat all the time Bacon tastes as good to me here as chicken did at home. Who would have thought I would have learned to eat bacon so soon? But I cannot drink coffee yet. You will be picking apples by the time you get this letter.

I think we will get it all right, and I feel sure we will have no hardships. Welch and Hall are good cooks and we get along fine.

I could write lots more but have no more time. I think it will take one month more to get to Dawson City.
