COURT HOUSE NEWS.

County Judge G. P. Terrell returned last night from a bridge inspection tour of northern half of Marion county. He was accompanied by Martin Maglin, county commissioner from Hamilton, Ohio, who expressed himself well pleased with the condition of the county's bridges and highways, over which their journey took them. The Dimick bridge east of Hubbard, is being rebuilt by contractor J. E. McCoy at an estimated cost of \$850. The "Jack" bridge near Marquam and connecting Clackamas and Marion counties is being re-roofed and a new approach is being constructed therefor.

The injunction case of Geo. W. Hundsaker vs. County Treasurer G. L. Brown to enjoin the payment of certain warrants issued Pugh & Gray for repairs made on the court house, was first called. The motion of the defendant to dismiss the petition recently made that seeks to make Marion county a party to the suit is being argued. C. M. Charlton appears for Mr. Hundsaker; Mr. Brown has retained Messrs. Sherman, Condit & Park for his counsel while Geo. G. Bingham and J. A. Carson represent the county. The motion to dismiss the petition is being argued at press hour.

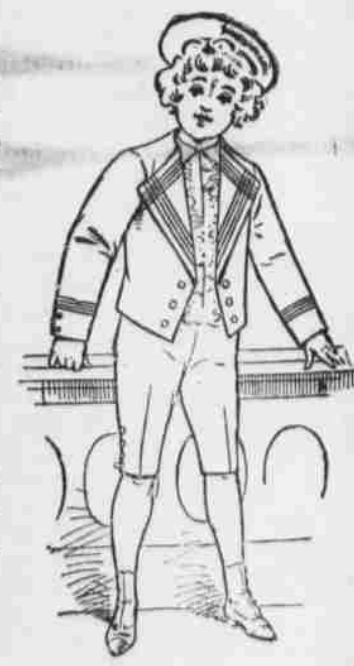
