NEW YORK POLITICS.

Henry George Announces Where He Stands.

FREE TRADE TO BE ADVOCATED

Single Tax True Panacea for All Existing Ills

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—The Journal and Adviser prints an interview with Henry George, in which he says:

"I have been informed that there is a panic in Tammany camp. The leaders are alarmed at the sudden uprising of men who are tired of the despotism of the machine. According to all reports there is good cause for fear. But it is not confined to the managers of any one party. Of course, I am not speaking of my own knowledge. I only give what comes to me from trustworthy sources. According to confidential information received a hurried call was sent out by Tammany managers summoning the district leaders to immediate council. A great danger is said to be imminent. It was reported that offers of substantial aid for our movement has been made by responsible men, who said they stood ready to help the cause in all directions.

"I am willing to express myself clearly on all the questions at issue. My plan of campaign is to tell the truth, I have nothing to conceal. The fact I am a candidate for mayor will not cause me to change any of my views. My opinions are founded on principles that are not to be changed because of the campaign.

"I am a free trader. It may prevent some persons from supporting me; if so, I can't help it. I am not adjusting my views to the exigencies of a political canvass. What I believe to be for the best interests of the country and the people, I shall advocate. I recognize no difference between a national campaign, so far as honest politics are concerned. In both cases we want honest men, who believe in an honest administration of the laws. This is why I say the men are right who went before the grand jury asking for an indictment of the tax commissioners, and if they keep on fighting they will surely win.

"The Central Labor Union has assumed an impregnable position. It demands that the laws shall be enforced without respect to the wealth and position of the individual against whom the charges have been made.

And right here the principles of single tax come into play. The insurance cases are particularly pertinent just now. The Central Labor Union claims that the Equitable Life Insurance Company valued its property at \$12,000,000 in its return made to the state insurance board at Albany, but when the local New York assessor came around it put its valuable property at \$2,000,000. With single tax in force these robberies and corruption of men in office would be avoided.

"But why should I go on to illustrate these questions have been discussed and spread broadcast in our literature.

It has been shown that most of the present evils are the result of political conspiracy and crime.

"In regard to the silver question, I have nothing to conceal. I say now what I said repeatedly during the Bryan campaign: It is that, while I was supporting that gentlemen and would vote his ticket, I was not a believer in the theory that silver was a remedy for the evils that beset the

country. I shall discuss the silver question exactly as I discussed it during the presidential campaign. We have nothing to present but the truth. We have no secret political traps for our enemies; nothing but the cold, naked truth.

"I am well satisfied with the beginning we have made. The young men on our committees are able and enthusiastic. The Cooper Institute meeting will be a success, judging from the reports coming to us from our friends, coming to us from the ranks of the different committees. In my speech at Cooper Institute on Thursday evening I shall speak freely, avoiding no questions which politicians are handling so gingerly. I am a free trader and on that line I shall fight it out. I believe that the single tax will bring prosperity and equalize the burdens that now oppress humanity, bearing heavily upon the poor and lightly on the favored rich."

WRIT OF MANDAMUS ISSUED.

Effort Will Be Made to Force the Election of a Director.

There has been filed with the county clerk a petition for an alternative writ of mandamus to be issued to the members of the Board of Directors for School District No. 24. The petition was submitted to Judge H. H. Hewitt, of department No. 2, circuit court for Marion county, who ordered that a writ be issued to the defendants, the same to be returnable to him at 9 a. m. on November 1st, providing they do not cause an election to be held before that time.

The petition as filed by Carson & Fleming, attorneys for the plaintiff, is as follows: "A. H. Forstner, plaintiff, vs. A. Ohmart, W. M. Cherrington, H. A. Johnson and H. T. Bruce, as directors of school district No. 24, Oregon, defendants."

"Unto the Hon. H. H. Hewitt, judge of the above entitled court:
The petition of A. H. Forstner, the above named plaintiff, respectfully sheweth as follows:

"1st, That plaintiff is now and was at all times hereinafter mentioned a male citizen of the United States, and of the state of Oregon, over 21 years of age, and has resided in the city of Salem, in Marion county, Oregon, for more than one year last past, and is now and was at all times aforesaid a resident thereof and a legal voter therein in all elections for state, district, county and school district offices to be held therein, and is now and was the owner of real and personal property in the city of Salem, of the assessed value of \$1,512, besides other property elsewhere, and upon such assessed value of said property he did and does now pay state, county and city taxes, and also taxes levied for the purpose of maintaining the schools in school district No. 24, in Marion county, Oregon, and for the past six years or more he was and is now a legal voter at all elections held in said school district No. 24.

"2d, That the defendants are the duly elected, qualified and acting directors of school district No. 24, in Marion county, which said district includes within its boundaries the city of Salem and part of the precincts of North Salem and Yew Park, and the board of directors of said school district No. 24, by law consists of five members and as constituted after the election held in March, 1897, the said board consisted of E. M. Waite, and the said defendants, Ohmart, Cherrington, Johnson and Bruce, and ever since the said election held in March, 1897, and until on or about the 13th day of July, 1897, the said E. M. Waite and the defendants above named constituted and were the duly elected, qualified and acting directors of said school district No. 24, in Marion county, Oregon.

"3d, That on the said 13th day of July, 1897, the said E. M. Waite died, and there was and ever since has been a vacancy in office of the board of directors of school district No. 24.

"4th, That at the time of his death aforesaid, the E. M. Waite was, and for sometime prior thereto had been the chairman of said board of directors, and upon the death of said E. M. Waite a vacancy occurred in said board of directors, and it thereupon became a duty specially enjoined upon the other four directors, being the four defendants above named, by the laws of the state of Oregon, to authorize the clerk of said school district to call a special meeting and election of the voters of said district to fill such vacancy.

"5th, That on the 2d day of August, 1897, the plaintiff attended a meeting of the defendants as directors of said school district No. 24, when there were present the said four defendants and E. H. Flagg, the duly appointed, qualified and acting clerk of said district, and at that time the said defendants were holding a meeting for the purpose of transacting business relating to the said district No. 24, and thereupon the plaintiff requested the said defendants to authorize the clerk of said district to call a special meeting and election of said district for the purpose of electing a suitable and proper and competent person to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the said E. M. Waite; but the said defendants denied the said request.

"6th, That it is necessary and expedient to have a director elected to fill the said vacancy, because of the fact that supplies should be forthwith purchased for the public schools in said district No. 24, and the additional accommodation for an increased number of pupils attending the schools in said district should be provided forthwith, and I thereby it will be necessary to expend a large sum of money; but owing to the fact that said board of directors, as now constituted, is evenly divided into two opposing factions, it is impossible for any business to be done satisfactorily or with dispatch.

"7th, That the plaintiff is now and has been for six years last past a taxpayer and voter in said school district No. 24, and as such is beneficially interested in the economic and business-like management of the affairs of said school district No. 24, and in order that the affairs of said district may be so managed it is necessary that an election should be held at an early date to fill the vacancy caused by the death of said E. M. Waite.

"Wherefore, plaintiff prays that an alternative writ of mandamus shall be issued to the said defendants requiring them to cause an election to be held in said school district No. 24, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the said E. M. Waite, or show cause why they have done so, at a time to be fixed by this court or the judge thereof."

Some Salem citizens want a special election to fill the vacancy in the board, and some are opposed to it. District Attorney Hayden refused to bring the suit in his name, and the question has been raised as to whether a suit of this kind can be brought without the consent of the district attorney. After consideration of the case, Judge Hewitt issued the alternative writ.
