DR. LANE SPEAKS ONCE MORE.

Further Remarks on "Vermin" About the State Capital.

PORTLAND, October 5.—(To the Editor)—In looking over the state news in yesterday's Oregonian, I note the following item from Salem: "The failure of Mr. I. L. Patterson to meet the charge made against him by Dr. Harry Lane, to the effect that he attempted to defraud the state by palming off a substitute for meal furnished the insane asylum, does not pass unnoticed. It was expected Mr. Patterson would make a public explanation or begin libel proceedings. He has done neither, but is reported as saying that Dr. Lane, his accuser, as superintendent of the asylum, received what he sold for meal. If this be true, Dr. Lane also has a charge to meet; though, if true or not, it does not help Mr. Patterson's case."

Mr. Patterson is right, and his point is well taken. If I willingly accepted from him adulterated food stuffs to be used at the asylum, I am willing to allow that even a greater degree of culpability would rest upon me than upon him, for I was acting under oath to protect the state from loss, and Mr. Patterson rested upon no obligations in his dealings with the state, further than such as his honor as a man and his sense of decency would dictate. The weight with which such virtues bear down upon his conscience, I shall leave for others to estimate, after reading what follows.

Mr. Patterson has a faulty memory for deeds of the past, else he would not have forgotten that the cornmeal which he delivered at the asylum came in barrels as usual, and in the same kind of barrels as usual, with the trade marks intact, and of the exact brand called for in his contract, and that on knocking in the heads of a number of these barrels, the cornmeal was there on top smiling up into the face of man as pretty "gold dust" cornmeal as anyone ever saw.

The proof was apparently complete, and the cornmeal was accepted and paid for, and only after one former lot of meal became exhausted and we began using the Patterson meal did we discover the fraud that had been perpetrated upon us. The barrels had been opened from the bottom, the good meal extracted and the barrels refilled—with the exception of a six-inch layer of good meal—with an ash-looking mixture of God alone knows what. The matter I reported to the trustees, and there it rested. One does not look for such devices from business men.

There was a trick for you, and a bit of bunco work, which for originality and neatness of design does great credit to the ingenuity of its author. At any rate, it worked like a charm, and I am free to confess that it took

me in completely, and in consequence the poor folk at the asylum for the next six months ate some mighty poor mush. No doubt I should have shoved my arm into each barrel up to the shoulder, but never before I met Mr. Patterson, nor after I met the druggist—king of thieves—had I reason to suspect that business men would stay up nights to dope up and adulterate original packages of mercantile supplies.

As I said before, I have no ill feeling toward Mr. Patterson, personally; no grudge to work off upon him, but knowing him as I do, and as others perhaps do not, I have felt it my duty to my more decent neighbors to sound a note of warning. There is a horde of human scavengers who hang about Salem and fatten at the public expense. Mr. Patterson is but a type of the class. These gentry, not content with having escaped the official attention of the public gaolers, and having grown sleek and well fed, be-think themselves as good as honest men, and every year, from one party to another, come bobbing up for office.

These men are our curse, our shame and our crime. They do more damage to the state than all the codlins, moths, hop lice and other pests combined. They cost us more annually than do the other class of criminals who find their way into the penitentiary. They make the poor man's children to have less food to eat, and less clothing to wear, and shorten up the school days of innocent childhood.

They are a clog on our prosperity, and a dead weight that is killing off the pride and patriotism of this country; and so I say, I have felt it a duty to attempt to smoke some of this vermin out into the broad light of day that my honorable fellow-citizens might see them as they are. There is no malice in my pen, and the commentators in yesterday's Oregonian surmises that I will have had my "innings" if Mr. Patterson is defeated for the office which he seeks, does scant courtesy to my motives. I have no revenge to wreak on Mr. Patterson, I seek no "innings" at any man's expense.

A RECORD BROKEN.

The Oregon Horse Paces Two Miles in 4:19 1-4

THE GREAT GO IN DETAIL.

Lester Galbraith's Story of the Race—Other Contests.

At 1 o'clock the grand stand was full and at 1:30 o'clock it was impossible to get a seat. The weather and track was perfect for fast racing and when the first heat of the 2:33 trot was called fully 12,000 people watched the four horses which after racing for some time got off for the first heat. After this heat Mr. Frazier brought out Chehalis for a short warm up. "This first appearance for the day, when the Judge said to the crowd: "This is the great horse Chehalis," his words were approved by cheers of admiration which came from the grand stand each time he passed.

After the second heat of this race Warren Martell amused the throng which now lined the fence from the pole far up the track past the 4th pole. When the horses were called out for the third heat a slight wind was coming up and threatened to mar the event of the day which was to come next. Just here at the suggestion of President Looney the gates were thrown open and the crowd, hundreds of whom could not get a peep at the track, were allowed to go across the track and line along the fence enclosing the inside of the track. It is useless to say that this was the largest crowd that ever attended an Oregon State Fair, as nearly every one in Salem big enough to go was there, and thousands from all over the state and the north west. Del Norte, a full brother of Chehalis, made his appearance for a short "warm up" and evoked hearty cheers from the enthusiastic crowd.

The fourth heat finished and the grand stand, at the Judge's request, became almost speechless, the threatening breeze had slackened, the track had been successfully put in a record breaking condition by Mr. Derby's painstaking efforts, the sky was clear blue and the hills in the background rolling blue to the snowcapped mountains. All awaited the handsome Chehalis to complete the picture of an ideal race course. Mr. Frazier scored the beauty once and at the second score was off on his long journey, the last mile and quarter being paced by Bonbonnier ridden by Galbraith; without a skip he went the full 2 miles. The first mile was made in 2:09, very fast, almost too fast. Old horsemen expressed grave doubts and were afraid of its telling on the next mile but the coal black gentleman was more than enough for the occasion, and finished breaking the record by clipping off 34 seconds from the world's 2 mile record. The king of the west then returned to the front of the judge's stand and was crowned and bedecked with wreaths of beautiful flowers by Miss Ruth Gabrielson, the little daughter of Secretary Gabrielson. Lester Galbraith who set pace, gives the following account of the race: "On the first quarter I picked him up he was going a 2 minute clip and was fresh. Frazier from this on kept him back and asked me to keep off, at the pole Frazier called on him and he responded like a fresh horse and raised his head pulling himself together. Frazier watched his clock closely and smiled assurance that he had the world's record. He entered the stretch fast. I was right on his wheel. My horse was excited, Frazier asked me to keep back. Here Frazier gave him the word and touched him lightly with the whip for the last response, which Chehalis answered promptly and did the last quarter like a new horse."

Mr. Galbraith deserves great credit for this wonderful teasing pace which did a great deal towards establishing a world's record. The quarters were done in the following time: First quarter.....3:24

IN WINTER GRASP

Yukon Is Closed to Navigation for the Season.

NO WOOD IS TO BE HAD.

Steamers Now on the River Must Depend on Coal.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—Advices from St. Michaels under date of September 16 says:

The general impression is that the boats that leave here from this time on will not be able to get over 1000 miles up the river before they will be frozen in. All independent steamers will be compelled to carry coal, as the natives have cut up all the driftwood along the river bank for over 100 miles and have sold it to the steamers owned by the two big companies.

The new finds on Minook and Hunter creeks continue to cause excitement and there are about 600 miners on the ground.

In St. Michaels sugar is 25c a pound; bacon, 25c a pound; blanket trousers, \$8; chocolate drops, three for 25c; calico 35c a yard; cotton bandanas, \$1 each; flour, \$8 a hundred; candles, 35c a pound; small box sardines, 50.

Six men have probably lost their lives near here as a result of a fool hardy attempt to sail up the 1850 miles of the river, which in some places runs at a rate of eight miles an hour. The men, two of whom are named Arber-crombie and Tate, were last seen drifting out of the mouth of Yokon to the sea.

Three men in a sailboat started up the river last week, but have not been seen since. Their names are Mathews, Roberts and Schultz.

Mission of the Cutters.

PORT TOWNSEND, Oct. 7.—A private letter received from St. Michaels via the cutter Perry, from Dutch Harbor, explains a sensational story published some time ago about an Alaska treasure ship requesting protection by revenue cutters against the "possibility of a piratical attack."

It is not to guard against pirates that the vessels are needed. Ever since the movement to Klondike began, the cities have been dumping all sorts and conditions of men at St. Michaels. The gathering has been getting worse from month to month, and as a result the Rush and Corwin are now at St. Michaels, ready to land men at a moment's notice, and put a stop to any trouble which might, considering the fierceness of the miners, quickly spread into a riot. The cutters will remain at St. Michaels until all possibility of trouble has passed.
