EDITORIAL.

Hon. Phil Metschan is a candidate for governor and at the same time he refuses to let the public know what funds he holds in his hands.

When a man gets bigger than the state and bigger than his party he needs looking after. If there is no other way to compel a public showing of Oregon state treasury financing, then the people of Oregon might as well be ruled by a despot.

Did not Mr. Metschan report to the legislature that \$25,000 had been paid out for land for the site of the Eastern Oregon asylum? Afterwards it transpired that not a dollar had ever been paid. But it had been levied and collected.

His first assistant state treasurer, when engaged in a not very friendly altercation with the writer, declared that he did not owe his position to the people and that the people had no strings on him whatever. This is the boldest assertion of imperialism yet made by a public servant, but it is characteristic of the entire management of the Oregon state treasury. It is characteristic of Mr. Metschan's un-American ideas of office holding.

It was supposed that when the push brought suit to compel Mr. Kincaid, as secretary of state, to audit bills and issue warrants, that it was for the purpose of preventing a million dollars or more from lying idle in the treasury. Now that Mr. Kincaid under mandate of the Court issues warrants, Treasurer Metschan coolly stamps them not paid for want of funds. Kincaid was not right when he said that there were no appropriations to warrants against, so the court said. Now Metschan stamps these same warrants not paid for want of appropriations when the court says the money has been appropriated, and it has been paid over to Mr. Metschan. We have been unable to get the exact details of the condition of the treasury, and it may be that Mr. Metschan has no funds to pay warrants with. But there is a belief that he holds over a million dollars of state money.

It is but fair to say that probably Mr. Metschan is not alone responsible for his state treasury management. He is but the tool of a political and financial ring that is dictating to him what he shall do. Does the Republican party wish to face the people of Oregon with the responsibility of such a record and such a policy? We believe intelligent and business like men in any party will not want to assume it.

Our opinion regarding the case of Mr. Geer and the Oregon Delegation, is not in accord with those who wish to make Mr. Geer the cat's paw to secure political chesnuts. There will always be a difference of opinion about the rights of Mr. Geer, but those who are honest in thinking the delegation did not do quite right in recommending him for the land office, do not carry their opposition to the extremes of injuring the Oregon Delegation. But those pretended foil friends who are acting for self and not for Mr. Geer, are very likely to kill an honest man and republican.

The above from Col. Alley's paper clearly indicates that it is not the desire of the Miles-McBride faction that Mr. Geer shall win, too high.

It is positively asserted in some quarters that a special session of the legislature, to meet January, will be called after a while by Gov. Lord, but The Portland Welcome doubts the reliability of the information. There is urgent need of some legislation, but the state can get along another year; all the more contentedly when it is considered that the special session would be called only to serve the interests of certain politicians, and not to do the work needed by the people. At least no beneficial results could be expected from the same men who wrangled and flunked for forty days last winter, and refused to even organize. There is no positive evidence

that they would do any better next winter.

Minister Sewall's latest report to the state department with regard to the situation in Hawaii is altogether reassuring. He indicates that the difficulty between that country and Japan may be presently settled by the payment of \$100,000 in gold to the latter, that the Japanese subjects in the islands are peaceably disposed and that the danger of any serious international trouble is steadily diminishing. It is fortunate, however, that in spite of this encouraging intelligence our government is still pursuing a policy of ceaseless vigilance in guarding American interests in these islands. Neither Japan nor any other foreign power will be permitted to take snap judgment against the United States by massing a superior naval force, or by any other strategic measure at Honolulu. The purpose of the government at Washington is not only that the Hawaiian annexation shall be accomplished, but that it shall be done peaceably, promptly and without giving offense to other nations.

The people of Salem did themselves great credit by the observance of Salem Day at the State Fair.
