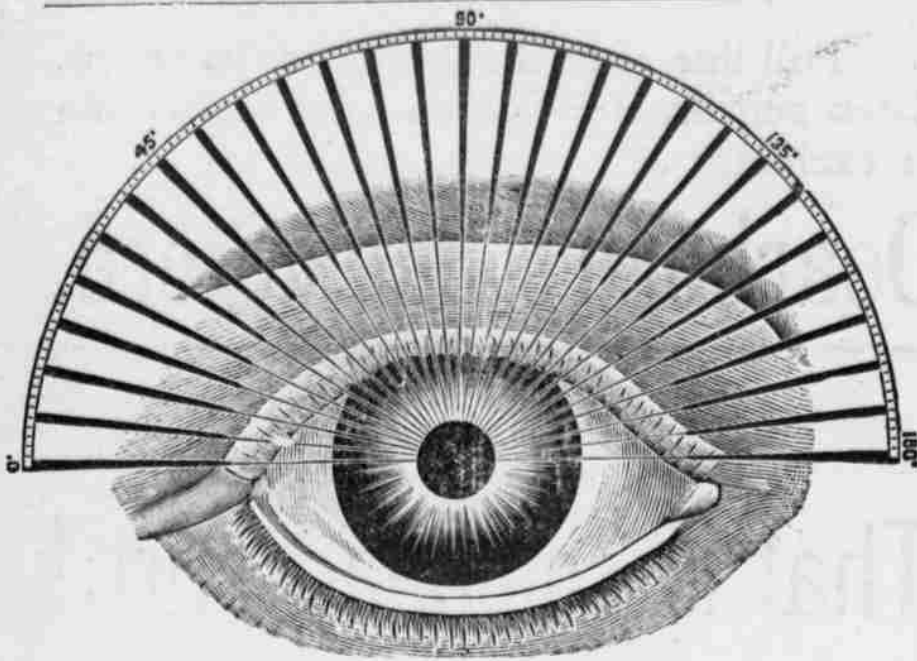

STATE FAIR PROGRAMS.

Speed Contests for Each Day of the Great Fair.

Race No. 1. Pacing—Two thirty class; purse \$250.

Race No. 2. Trotting—Two twenty-seven class; purse \$250.

Race No. 3. Running—Three quarters mile dash in introductory series; winner of one race this year to carry five pounds penalty; two or more races seven pounds; non-winners this year allowed seven pounds; maidens allowed ten pounds; purse \$200.

Race No. 4. Running—Five eighths mile dash; two-year-olds; stake, added \$150.

Second Day—Friday, October 1:

Race No. 5. Pacing—Two twenty-seven class; purse \$250.

Race No. 6. Trotting—Three-year-olds; stake, added \$250.

Race No. 7. Running—One mile; three-year-olds; stake \$200.

Race No. 8. Running—Three eighths mile dash; all ages; purse \$150.

Third Day—Saturday, October 2:

Race No. 9. Pacing—Two twenty-five class; purse \$250.

Race No. 10. Trotting—Two eighteen class; purse \$250.

Race No. 11. Trotting—Two-year-olds; stake; purse \$150.

Race No. 12. Running—Half mile; selling; winner to be sold at auction for \$400; if for less, two pounds allowed for each \$50 to \$200; purse \$150.

Race No. 13. Running—One and one eighth mile hurdle; over five hurdles, horses to carry one hundred and thirty-five pounds; purse \$250.

Fourth Day—Monday, October 4:

Race No. 14. Pacing—Three minute class; purse \$250.

Race No. 15. Trotting—Three minute class; purse \$250.

Race No. 16. Running—Three quarters mile dash; handicap; purse \$175.

Race No. 17. Running—Five eighths mile dash; selling; winner to be sold at auction for \$400; if for less, two pounds allowed for each \$100 to \$200; three pounds for each \$50 to \$100; purse \$150.

Race No. 18. Running—One mile handicap; for three-year-olds and over; purse \$250.

Sixth Day—Wednesday, October 6:

Race No. 19. Trotting—Two twenty-three class; purse \$250.

Race No. 20. Running—Half mile; selling; for two-year-olds; winners to be sold at auction for \$500; if for less two pounds allowed for each \$100 to \$200; three pounds for each \$50 to \$100; purse \$200.

Race No. 21. Running—One mile handicap; for three-year-olds and over; purse \$250.

Seventh Day—Thursday, October 7:

Race No. 22. Pacing—Two forty class; purse \$250.

Race No. 23. Trotting—Two forty class; purse \$250.

Race No. 24. Running—Three quarters mile dash; selling; winner to be sold at auction for \$400; if for less, three pounds allowed for each \$50 to \$200; purse \$200.

Race No. 25. Running—Half mile; selling; winner to be sold at auction for \$500; if for less, three pounds allowed for each \$100 to \$200; purse \$150.

Race No. 26. Running—Seven eighths mile handicap; purse \$200.

Race No. 27. Running—Five eighths mile; all ages; winner of one race this year to carry five pounds penalty; two races, seven pounds; three or more, ten pounds; non-winners allowed seven pounds; maidens, ten pounds; purse \$150.

Eight Day—Friday, October 8:

Race No. 28. Pacing—Free for all; purse \$300.

Race No. 29. Trotting—Free for all; purse \$300.

Race No. 30. Running—Three quarters mile dash; consolation purse for beaten horses at this meeting; horses beaten once allowed five pounds; twice, seven pounds; three times or more, ten pounds; purse \$200.

Race No. 31. Running—Hurdle race, handicap, over five hurdles, one and one eighth miles; purse \$250.

Conditions as to running races:

Entries to running races close at four p. m. the day preceding the race. Declaration must be made in writing with the secretary by eleven a. m. the day of the race.

Entrance fee, ten per cent. of purse. Money divided seventy per cent. to first, twenty per cent. to second, and ten per cent. to third. Five to enter and three to start, but the board reserves the right to hold a less number than five to fill by the deductions of the entrance money from the purse for each horse less than five.

Other than specified rules of the Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association to govern.

Conditions as to harness race:

Entries close September 1, 1897.

Entrance fee, ten per cent. of purse. Purse divided seventy per cent. to first, twenty per cent. to second, and ten per cent. to third. Declaration must be made with the secretary in writing by six o'clock p. m. on the day preceding the race.

A horse winning a race will be entitled to first money only, making a walk-over entitled to entrance money paid in. When less than the required number of starters appear they may contest for the entrance money paid in divided sixty-five per cent. to first horse, and thirty-five per cent. to second horse.

All trotting and pacing races to be mile heats, three best in five, except the two-year-old and three-year-old races, which shall be mile heats, two best in three. Five to enter and three to start, but the board reserves the right to hold a less number than five to fill by the deduction from the purse the entrance money of each horse less than five.

Other than specified rules of the National Trotting Association to govern.

General Conditions—color of rider

All entries must be allowed or driver, and color. The association to start with the right to alter, amend or change any or all races, should or board in their judgment, and for cause, deem it expedient so to do.

Any race that cannot, in the opinion of the judges, be finished on the last day of the meeting may be continued or declared off.

All two-year-old and three-year-old races are for colts owned in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and British Columbia prior to January 1, 1897.

SALEM FOOTBALL TEAM.

A Movement is on Foot to Effect and Maintain a Strong Local Team.

As the winter season approaches the attention of local admirers of athletic sports naturally is directed towards the popular and exciting game of football. At present there is available material in Salem for the organization of a team that, with the services of an experienced coach, who can be obtained at a small expense, would make a creditable showing on the gridiron. A number of local business men have signified their willingness to subscribe \$10 each that a coach may be secured and the organization of a strong team, assured.

In conversation with a number of the prospective "kickers" today, JOURNAL reporter found much interest and enthusiasm among those seen and, if the business men of the city will financially aid the boys, Salem can be handsomely represented on the gridiron during the 1897-8 season.

A local admirer of this sport, which is rapidly growing in popularity, yesterday suggested the following players as possible candidates for the respective positions indicated in case a local team be organized: Downs and Coleman, ends; Macey, Olinger and Chase, tackles; Seeley, Truitt and Judd, guard; Webb and Terrell, center; Miller, Guiss, Evans, Bishop, Legg, Moir and McCormick, backs.

Downs played end for the Forest Grove team for two years, and Coleman, who has won honors on the State University team, would make strong and effective players on a local team. Macey, Olinger and Chase have also played for a number of seasons and would acceptably fill any position. For guards there are already three available candidates, viz. Seeley, Truitt and Judd, either two of whom would make creditable players. Seeley is a new man having just entered the medical college but has the physical build and rugged constitution requisite of a successful footballist. Truitt and Judd both played well last year.

There are two candidates for center, the selection of either of whom would meet with hearty approval: Webb, who played in that position last year on the local university team, and Ralph Terrell, who did good work for the Corvallis team last season.

For backs there are several candidates; either Miller, Guiss or Moir, who played last year, would make a good quarter back; Evans, Bishop or Legg would make splendid half backs and McCormick would be hard to beat for full back. Bishop did excellent work on the state university team last year and would be a strong member on a local team.

The boys at Chemawa Indian Training school have already organized and will have an unusually strong team this year. They will have not only last year's players from which to select but a number of promising players have only recently entered the school.

It is hoped the local business men will give the matter careful consideration and let us have a team from the Capital City, before whom all would-be aspirants for honors on the gridiron, must surely go down.
