EDITORIAL.

It seems to us there is grave inconsistency in the conduct of our state affairs, when the secretary is mandamus'd by the supreme court to audit claims and issue warrants to pay bills out of the state treasury, and then have the state treasurer stamp them not paid for want of funds. Either Mr. Kincaid was wrong in his contention that he could not issue warrants on the treasury in the absence of specific appropriations, or the supreme court was wrong in saying he could.

If the supreme court is right in saying that warrants should issue and claims shall be paid out of the general funds in the treasury, in the absence of specific legislation creating separate funds, then the treasurer ought to pay the warrants so issued. If the treasurer stamps the warrants "not paid for want of funds," he sustains Mr. Kincaid's contention, and belies the mandate of the supreme court, which said they could and should be paid. We confess we are unable to distinguish clearly who is wrong in the matter.

If the treasurer continues to refuse to pay warrants, there will be a million dollars or over drawing 8 per cent interest, \$80,000 a year going into the pockets of the bankers, while the money is supposed to lie idle in the treasury.

If the politicians and bankers are playing a double game of forcing the people to pay interest on warrants and at the same time using the public money to buy warrants with, as has been done, it is the most damnable speculation ever invented.

If the supreme court lent itself to such a scheme it ought to be taught a severe lesson by the people. Their decision will be regarded as a license to rob the people and gamble with state finances. It was supposed that their decision would settle this matter and that the issuing and payment of warrants would proceed without any further difficulty. Now it looks as if the Treasurer would have to be mandamus'd to compel him to do that which his failing to do makes the whole proceeding and decision against Kincaid appear facial.

Senator McBride is interviewed in the morning paper to the effect that there is little likelihood of the Nicaragua canal being built, and that the Oregon delegation secured \$131,000 for improvement of the Willamette river. It is not surprising that the Senator sees little hope for the Nicaragua Canal, as there is no measure before congress more bitterly opposed by the great corporation interests than the canal, or of more vital importance to the coast. We do not mean by this that the senator from Oregon is at all controlled by the corporations but his action in several important matters of this kind leave the people little to hope for from him when it comes to a showdown. As to the Willamette river appropriations it is creditable to the Oregon delegation that they have paid any attention to the matter.

With the big Columbia river improvements completed, there is no reason why the Willamette should not be made navigable to Eugene the year around, and the few harbors of Oregon opened. The Senator does not say a word about the one million dollars also appropriated for continuing the improvements at Yaquina Bay. That money, like the appropriation for the Willamette, is also in the treasury, but there is a general impression that the State corporations have successfully employed influences to delay, if not prevent, its expenditure. Time will tell whether this is true or not. The delegation are workers to secure appropriations but there is little satisfaction in parading them, only as a tantalizing possibility that don't materialize.

Tommy Tongue is in a state of mental perturbation. He is afraid that Mr. Geer is in training for governor. He whispers it with wise emphasis and solemn looks to everyone he meets, and wants to know what the governor thinks of it. Well, Tommy, if that matter gave you no more concern than it does the governor, you would not be talking about it. You cannot make Mr. Geer a candidate for governor, nor can you prevent him from being a candidate for congress from the second district.

There were some people silly enough to think that you were really friendly to Mr. Geer, while there are others who thought that you would, "for looks sake," give him apparent support, but since you have become hypnotized by the "magnetic statesman" they all realize the nonsense of their expectations. The public were not surprised that Ellis and McBride should have been first charmed and then swallowed by the "magnetic statesman," but they were disappointed that you were gulped with so little resistance.

Knowing as you do that Mr. Geer is a popular man, a forceful stump-speaker, and with excellent qualifications for congress and congressional duties, you realize that it is probable that he will be a candidate for congress, as the price of your bungling, and you deceive yourself if you think you can throw him off the track by circulating a report that he is in training for the governorship. Tommy, you are not fooling anybody but yourself, while you are adding to the list of your disgusted friends.

THE FLAX EXHIBIT.

From the Raw Material to the Finest Laces.

THE CENTER OF ATTRACTION.

Opinions of an Expert From Scotland on Oregon Flax.

The Oregon Women's Flax association has the satisfaction of having taken up a new and unknown industry for Oregon and inside of one year making it the most interesting and attractive exhibit at the Oregon State Fair. Most of this work was accomplished by the perseverance, patriotism and intelligence of Mrs. W. P. Lord.

The exhibit embraced flax in the straw, including samples of twelve different crops. The flax grown at Barlow, Clackamas county, by Full & Baty, averaged 40 inches in the straw. The crop is considered worth \$500 a ton in the fiber. It yields about 30 per cent of fiber and that is considered a large yield. Mr. Crawford, of Scotland, said on Wednesday that 20 per cent is considered a large yield. He said he could pick fibre out of the samples in the booth that would bring \$1,000 a pound—a marvelous statement. But there is some of the fibre there that is used to make the famous cobweb laces, and it was to that he referred. He did not hesitate to say that the Oregon fibre was unquestionably a profitable crop.

Samples of retted straw are shown, that is all ready for the machinery that does the scutching. This is the first step in the progress of manufacture, and to illustrate this a primitive flaxbake, scutchboard and hackle are there to show people how the work is done.

The scutching takes the tow out of the fibre and the visitor from Scotland did not hesitate to say that what was cast aside here as tow was as good as some of the flax out of which fine linen cambric is made in the old country. Samples of flax fibre are next to be looked at. They vary in length from 36 to 42 inches and varying in color. The flax that is put to rot in ponds dug out of blue clay, has the desirable "blue" tint, so much prized in the markets.

The next process is spinning the fibre and tow into thread. This is carried on at the exhibit each day before admiring crowds by three venerable dames of the old school who became familiar with the song of the spinning wheel in their younger days, and both the love for the music and the art itself has remained with them. They are Mrs. Mitchell of Fairfield, Mrs. Kinsey of Aumsville, and Mrs. Quinn of Salem. One learned to spin in Scotland, one in America, and the latter in Ireland. Mrs. Kinsey uses a large wheel, Mrs. Mitchell uses a Scotch wheel, and the Irish lady uses a comical little quab of a Dutch wheel from Holland. It is not over a foot and a half high, a perfect little model of the antique manufacture that many a person would consider a treasure of bric-a-brac.

LINEN FABRICS.

The scheme of color is gray and red—the red cheese cloth is used as a foil to show the exquisite texture of the linen fabrics. The sign—Oregon Women's Flax Fibers Association, has a border of antique squares which are made of nitted linen threads, darned and embroidered in intricate designs. An elaborate pattern represents several days work. These were made by French nuns. Artistically draped linen grenadine, with long loops of gray pillow lace insertions interspersed with white lace and gray and red lace, festooned together and hung with huge bunches of scutched flax composed this decoration. There are 6 dozen of the antique lace squares of various designs and over 100 yards of lace.

The side drapings are hand woven linen curtains, with pillow lace insertions, six in number. These are overdraped with three remarkable pieces. A hand woven linen table cloth with cherry lace insertions woven with the cloth. A heavy Russian and a linen sheet woven before Revolutionary war by old Major Maulagan, who served also in the French and Indian war.

This sheet was in family use 50 years. A pyramid formed of flax is placed at one side on which are hung specimens of new lace, the property of Mrs. Lord. These are Point d'Alencon, Point Duchesse, needle point, Point applique, chentially or English thread and valenciennes. Flax thread to make such lace costs over \$1000 a pound Oregon can grow the fiber.

Chief amongst the attractions is a hand woven linen over dress—worn by Mrs. Lord 25 years ago—the insertions are gray pillow lace.

Mrs. Wands furnished a table set with a history. During the rebellion when cotton-cloth became so costly, 50 to 75 cents per yard—Mrs. Wands' mother, living in the state of New Jersey, decided to revive the old time industry of flax growing and weaving. The flax was prepared precisely as ours has been and spun in the old wheels, and woven in a hand loom. Since the interest in flax culture has been aroused in Oregon Mrs. Wands sent for this linen, which was serving for a bed tick still, and has made it into a neat table set.

THE JOURNAL Thursday evening sold nearly 500 copies at the State Fair, breaking the record of paper sales this season. Its pages contained nearly ten columns about the fair, including full reports of the baseball game, the sword fight, and the latest awards in the art department—all afternoon events. The papers reached the fair grounds at 4:30 p. m. and sold fast.

Mrs. R. A. Miller, judge and superintendent of the art department, performed her task with more tact and skill than is generally the lot of this brand of exhibits. Generally there has been a wrangle over the awards, or the selection of the judges, and more or less dissatisfaction with the awards. But Mrs. Miller avoided this almost entirely. The pictures were classified in groups according to the catalog entries. Fruits in oil, landscapes, marines, portraits, water colors, and ink drawings were grouped together. The pictures were correctly entered as a rule, nicely framed, and each picture was hung to the best possible advantage. Mrs. Miller did not remain in evidence much after she had her pictures hung.

But she thoroughly studied them and when she had analyzed the merits of the competing works, she quietly ordered the ribbons placed on the winning picture. Time was taken to notice the composition, the drawing, the coloring and the appropriateness of the treatment had to be considered and noticed. Mrs. Miller had a difficult task before her and has performed it unusually well.
