**STOLEN BICYCLES RECOVERED:**

A Wheel Taken From Barlow Monday Is Found in Salem Wednesday.

A Crown bicycle, 97 model, No 10, 855 was one of the articles placed aboard the afternoon local for Barlow station, Clackamas county. It was sent by the Wells Fargo & Co's express and was consigned to R. E. Irwin, who resides at Barlow station from whom the wheel was stolen on Monday of this week.

Chief of Police Dilley, of this city, was notified of the theft of the bicycle about 11 p. m. Monday and was also furnished a description of the wheel. Himself and associates closely observed all wheels corresponding with the description of the one reported stolen but were unsuccessful in discovering the missing bicycle. Among those to whom the police officers made known the news of the theft and to whom was furnished a description of the stolen wheel, were the Postal Telegraph messengers whose business calls them to all parts of the city, and who frequently discover at least a clew that leads to arrest and detention of some culprit.

About 2 o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, Johnnie Porter, one of the messenger boys, observed a bicycle, whose general appearance corresponded with the description of the missing wheel, stationed on the north side of the Eldridge block on Chemeck street. He promptly notified Chief of Police Dilley, who stationed Officer Hutton in that vicinity, in hopes that the bicyclist might return and take the wheel. Mr. Hutton remained until 6 o'clock, when he took the wheel to the city hall. It is more than probable that the wrongful possessor of the wheel "smelled a mouse" and did not think it best to return for his wheel.

**FOUND IN PORTLAND.**

The Royal Blue Field bicycle, No. 34,015, belonging to A. C. Hopf, which was stolen in this city on Saturday evening the 9th inst., was found at a Portland cigar store, where only a few days before, a stranger had disposed of it for only \$10. The wheel was shipped to this city by the overland train last night. The recovery of the wheel was effected by Chief Dilley through the faithful co-operation of the police officers of the metropolis.

**GUARDIAN DISCHARGED.**

Late Wednesday afternoon, J. T. Beckwith, guardian of the person and estate of Wm. Hogg, filed his final account with the county clerk. The report shows the receipts to have been \$2,159.75, while the disbursements were \$418.06 leaving a balance of \$1741.68. Wm. Hogg having reached his majority on the 8th inst, the guardian asked that he be discharged. The report was confirmed, the guardian was discharged and his bondsmen were released from further responsibility.
