J. O. Bzorth moved appointment of a committee of three to draft a form of organization. Carried and J. O. Bzorth, Wm. M. Cherington and H. D. Patton were named.

J. H. Fletcher and E. H. Flagg made brief addresses for the promotion of the enterprise.

J. G. Wright, Dan J. Fry and others spoke in behalf of the petition in favor of Yaquina bay, now circulating in this city, and the following resolution was carried:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, that the Oregon delegation in congress urge upon the secretary of war the importance of prosecuting the continuous work of improving the Yaquina harbor in accordance with the act of congress authorizing him to make contracts therefor not to exceed \$1,000,000."

The meeting adjourned for one week to hear the report on organization.
