EDITORIAL.

The postmaster general's report has this on rural free delivery, which has been established in this country: "Rural free delivery has been put to the test of practical experiment in 29 states and over 44 different routes. The cooperation of the communities served has in every instance been effectively given. The general satisfactory results suggest the feasibility of making rural delivery a permanent feature of postal administration in the United States; not immediately or in all districts at once, but in some gradual and graduated form regulated by the present experiments. Public policy requires some advancement to be made, and that the postal service should be brought more into line with advancing prosperity and increasing population. Sooner or later the United States will have to follow the lead of the more densely populated countries and establish a delivery service over all the settled portions of its vast territory. Under wise restrictions it can be extended with great advantage to a class of our citizens, who rightly or wrongly deem themselves neglected in legislation—the agricultural class—and without serious detriment to the revenues."

Just one more word of protest we want to enter before the Union Pacific property is sold and a great part of the nation's interest in that property irretrievably lost. There is a first mortgage of \$33,000,000 ahead of the government's claim of \$58,000,000. On the first mortgage bonds default in interest was purposely made, so that the property might be sold on the foreclosure of a lien ahead of the government. There was never any good honest reason for the default of interest on those bonds. The road, even in the years of the receivership, years when it has been systematically bled instead of fed by its feeders, has earned more than three times the interest charges on those bonds. The roads, conveniently bankrupted in order that the claim of the government might be compromised, has now, at this time, \$3,000,000 of cash in its treasury; it is, even now, bled as it is, earning enough to pay 5 per cent interest on the first mortgage and the claim of the government. The reorganizers count on the road earning 4 per cent interest on \$150,000,000 of capital, count on the road earning interest on an amount \$60,000,000 in excess of the first mortgage and the government's claim, and yet the government proposes to sell its claim for 60 cents on the dollar, to give away 40 cents on each dollar of its claim. If the president did his duty he would pay off the first mortgage, as he is authorized, aye, directed by law, and thus protect the government's interest—Philadelphia American.

Though Literature will consist mainly of reviews of books, it will in-

clude correspondence on and will itself deal with any literary subject of permanent or of current interest to the writing, publishing, or reading world. The record of new publications will be made complete but in the selections of books for review the editor will be guided solely by his judgment of their literary value. Instead of giving to books which are unworthy of any notice at all the help of even a scathing criticism. Literature will apply to them the far more effective treatment of neglect. Every important work is to be reviewed within three weeks after its publication.

Evidently Literature, by virtue of its definite and undeviating aim, has a field all its own—a very useful and a liberal field to work in and to prosper in. And not less evidently it has that indispensable thing—the positive character which appears to be a prime condition of success in the equipment of a publication not less, or scarcely less, than in the career of an individual.

H. D. Traill will edit Literature and Mr. Barrett Wendell, assistant Professor of English at Harvard College, will contribute a weekly letter upon topics of literary interest in America.

NEW YORK CAMPAIGN

A Great Meeting Voicing the Republican Protest.

JOSEPH H. CHOAT'S SPEECH.

He Builds a Hot Fire On Platt and Machine Politics.

Mr. Choate said: "Mr. Chairman and Ladies and Gentlemen:

"It always seems to be my luck at these meetings to be called upon after the previous speakers have exhausted the subject and the audience. (Laughter and applause.) But if you will lengthen out your ears a little and lend them to me for a few minutes, I will let you off very easy. (A voice, 'we will.') When our distinguished senator (laughter) (a voice 'me too'), whose name is ever on our lips (laughter), emerged from his momentary residence in Tioga (laughter) to visit the city of New York, to which he does not belong (laughter and applause), and which, thank God, does not belong to him (prolonged applause); when he opened his eversilent lips and said that he hoped—he wished he was as sure of his own salvation (laughter), as he was of the election of Gen. Tracy, surely he never counted upon Republican meetings like this. (Laughter and applause.) Already he must begin to feel a fearful fire in his rear (laughter and prolonged applause); and if he really means to save himself from that day of wrath (laughter) 'that awful day, when man to judgment wakes from clay,' why, I should advise him that he would not find his gates ajar quite so wide open as he anticipates, unless he abandons his machine and enrolls himself as a member of the Salvation Army. (Laughter and applause.)

"Take the great leader of Tammany Hall, whose name is so familiar that it does not even need to be whispered. (Laughter.) I understand that he has won great credit for his country on the English turf (laughter), but he does not seem really to have won many prizes, although, if rumor tells truth, he has met with a checked career of gains and losses, and has now come home to replenish his exchequer. (Laughter and applause.) I could give him a hint (laughter) by which his successes abroad would be greatly increased. I think if he would name his horses that he takes abroad a little more properly, he would have much greater success. Let him name one of them Tammany and the other Tioga and let him enter one of them in his own name and the other in the name of his partner, and then no matter which one of them won—it would make no difference.

"Now, I stand here tonight as a very antiquated Republican. I went in with Fremont, in 1856, and have voted faithfully for every Republican candidate from that day to this, casting my vote twice for Harrison and once for McKinley, and I hope to live long enough to cast it for that excellent statesman again. Now, let me tell you why. Because he had the heroic courage, in the face of the spoilsman of his own party—in the face of all those bosses and their machines, to advance the cause of Civil Service one step further forward than even its most faithful advocates had ever anticipated.

these, and I will call a spade a spade or a boss a boss, or a machine a machine. You will all understand very well that I say exactly what I mean. Now that non-partisanship in municipal affairs, that is to say, the treatment of municipal affairs as a matter of pure business, just as our private affairs or our corporate affairs would be treated by us in private corporations—if this is the fundamental principle of the Republican party as a principle, I do not need to say another word to you. If you have not been well enough informed about that by what has fallen from Mr. Low and Mr. Root, nothing I could do would emphasize at all that fact. It is a fact that the great crying evil in this country in the mismanagement and corruption and demoralization that has prevailed throughout almost all the States of the Union. The Republican party could adopt, no better plank in its platform than to put itself boldly and strongly, as it has for the last three years, before the emergency of this campaign came up, upon that very position. People of this city must be left to govern their own affairs. Now, my friends, this is a controversy and a fight between the people of this city and those who seek to deprive them of their franchise to exercise their own management and their control of their own business.

IS THE PEOPLE'S FIGHT. "When you Republicans are determining whether you stand on that old constraint that rests upon us all to stand by our party, or whether you will stand by the people in this fight, I want you to remember two things: One, that unless Seth Low is elected mayor of New York the fortunes of this great municipality, its enormous revenue, its vast affairs, its securities, millions per annum, will be collected and spent, will be spent by Tammany Hall, unless the people are bold enough and strong enough to say that the man who has proven himself faithful over the few things of Brooklyn shall be put in command of all that they have to offer him. (Great applause.)

"Well, that isn't all. There is another bill, much more tremendous than that as it does appear to me, and while this government by machines and by bossism seems absolutely destructive of all municipal belief in the right of every man to be heard and considered in this election of the man who shall rule over him—there is one other fact, staring us in the face, and that is the fact that, and to that I wish to call your particular attention now. Contemplate the horrible condition of this great city being handed over to Tammany Hall, the history of which you all know too well, and then, at the same time, also contemplate the position of the legislature of the state of New York, a working majority of its members being literally owned as they have been in the last three years by the machine of the other party. Is there anything more destructive of Republican government than that situation necessarily must be? The legislature owned by one conspirator and the city of New York, with all its vast affairs and resources, in the hands of another conspirator.

"How does this one acquire such power? More stupendous than nonarchy hardly ever exercises. Does anybody doubt how that is done? That is accomplished every year by the aid of many of the most reputable citizens of New York, who are in control of the great corporations, on whom he levies tribute with which to secure the ownership of these legislatures. (Applause.)

JACK SPRATT COMES PAT. "Now, there you are. If Tammany succeeds, and the state legislature goes as it is expected to go, you are in danger, and you have always been in danger in such cases, of being ground between the two mill stones. What will be left for the people of New York? A power of municipal control to exercise for themselves? Why it is the old story, isn't it, of Jack Spratt and his wife in the family boarding house: 'Tom Platt could eat no fat, Croker could eat no lean. Betwixt them both they cleared the cloth, and licked the platter clean.' (Great applause.)

"How are you going to destroy that co-partnership—for it is co-partnership? How are you going to cure it? Let me give you the legal definition of co-partnership: When two men engage in the same business and unite their capital and talents for the accomplishment of some purpose. Now, how are you going to cure it? You may appeal to the president and directors of these corporations in vain. They will still go on; they stand so high; it enters into their religion; it is a religious duty on their part, they say, to protect the millions committed to their care from legislative spoliation. I name no names. I simply ask you if you have any doubts about it? Don't you see them in our leading churches in the broad aisle every Sunday? Aren't many of them actually engaged in passing the plate? Well, now, it will take a good many years and a good many centuries, before, by moral suasion, you can cure that evil. There is one way to cure it, and that is, to elect Seth Low mayor of Greater New York. (Great applause.)

The partnership will starve for want of business and will be compelled to dissolve and retire from the trade. TRACY'S WATERLOO RUN. "If Seth Low had never been born what a sad day that would have been! That is just exactly the way and the only way in which Gen. Tracy is running well. (Laughter.)

"Now, the great reason why I cannot vote for Gen. Tracy—if you are sleepy, I hope you will manifest it in the usual way. (Laughter and applause, and cries of 'Go on!') Another reason why I cannot vote for

Gen. Tracy is that, in spite of the position that has been taken by his party, that honorable position which will confer glory upon it, such as no American party has yet had, he openly declares that he does not believe in non-partisanship in municipal affairs. Now, what does he mean by that? (Laughter.) You know what you mean by non-partisanship. You mean to get the best value on the dollar out of every dollar spent, to select the best man for every office and every place, no matter whether he is a Republican or Democrat. (Prolonged applause.) "Once let it be known throughout the country that the Republican machine of the city of New York, under the inspiration of its omnipotent that leader insists upon handling over this great metropolis to the tender mercies of Tammany Hall, and no harder blow could be struck at the fair fame of the city of New York."
