THE STATE DEPARTMENTS.

Personals and Information From the
Capitol.

Yesterday's U. S. weather predic-
tion of rain for today did not materi-
alize and the forecast official changed
it today to "Fair" for tomorrow.
State House barometer is also rising
today which is a good indication.

The elevator in the State house has
been closed for an indefinite time some
of the machinery which operates it
having been broken recently.

The state printing office has not
been operating with a very large force
for some months. From four to six
printers are employed only part of
the time.

The state board of equalization
meets early in December. The Gov-
ernor has not yet filled the vacancy
caused by the death of Mr. Gibson but
the appointment is daily expected.
The assessment rolls for the use of the
board when it convenes are coming in
very slowly and only about half a
dozen from the small counties are yet
received. A suit is now pending to
knock out all the work of the last
board because some of the rolls were
not in when the board equalized the
property of the state and it is hoped
that all rolls will come in in time this
year. There seems to be no penalty
on the county clerks for delay in this
matter but the courts would no doubt
decide what is a reasonable time.
Should the case be tested in a man-
damus proceeding. In the suit now
pending the plaintiffs who are en-
deavoring to avoid the work of the
board done at its last session were un-
successful in the lower court and it
will be many months before the case
comes to trial in the supreme court.

James Still, sentenced to one year
for robbery, and William Hinkle, 15
years for manslaughter, were received
at the penitentiary from Grant county.
They were brought by Sheriff Living-
stone and two guards at a cost of \$329.
James Foster was brought to the
asylum from Marshfield, at a cost of
\$161.

The bonds of T. J. Buford, as gov-
ernment agent at the Siletz Indian re-
servation, were attested in the county
clerk's office. I. L. Patterson, R. J.
Hendricks, J. J. Dalrymple and O. E.
Krause are sureties.

J. E. Hyde, of Baker City, was com-
missioned a notary public.

respondents, vs. the Nehalem Mill
Company and Frank Patton, appel-
lants, from Tillamook county.

The case of Emil Waldeman and
Simon Waldeman, respondents vs.
Thomas Connell, appellant, from
Multnomah county, was submitted
counsel for respondents and appellants
being present.

In the case of the Portland Trust
Company et al. respondents, vs. J. C.
Hawley et al. appellants, it was or-
dered on stipulation that the abstract
be dispensed with.

MRS. SIMMONS WINS THE CASE.

Petition of Administrator For Order to
Sell Real Estate Denied

Late Thursday afternoon having
heard the arguments of the respec-
tive counsel in the Simmons estate
case, Judge G. P. Terrell denied the
petition of the administrator of the
estate of Asa B. Simmons for an order
authorizing him to sell 100 acres of the
estate that certain claims against
the estate, among which was his in-
dividual claim for \$1000, might be
paid. This is virtually a victory for
the widow, Mrs. Vina Simmons and
three of the minor heirs who were
represented by Tilton Ford. The
invalidity of the claim of the admin-
istrator was established.

Other Probate Matters.

The will of W. R. Munkers, who
died on the 22nd inst. leaving an es-
tate valued at about \$15,000, has been
admitted to probate. The appoint-
ment of F. M. Munkers and T. F.
Walker as executors was confirmed
and James M. Munkers, H. C. Fletcher
and F. H. Moon were named as ap-
praisers of that part of the estate sit-
uated in Marion county. T. M.
Munkers, Peter Smith and T. C.
Munkers will make an inventory of
that part of the estate in Linn county.
