EDITORIAL.

Good evening. We hope you are happy and contented and like this EVENING JOURNAL.

In one of his speeches last week Tracy, Platt's candidate for mayor of Greater New York said: "If there is a candidate elected other than a Republican to the majority of the greater city, it will be the saddest day this nation has ever seen. If the machinery of the next administration of this city falls into the hands of our opponent, we cannot expect to win the battle in 1900. I predict, however, that a great victory awaits the Republican party on election day."

At the elections Tuesday, [November 2, following tickets will be in the field:

In Ohio, six tickets—Democratic, National Democratic, Republican, Populist, Socialist and Negro protection.

In Iowa, five—Fusion, National Democratic, Republican, Middle-of-the-road Populists.

In Kentucky, three—Democratic, National Democratic and Republican.

In Nebraska, five—Democratic, Populist, National Democratic, Republican, Prohibition and Liberty party, (prohibition).

In New York, three—Republican, Democratic and Prohibition.

In Maryland, two—Republican and Democratic.

In Massachusetts, four—Republican, Democratic, National Democratic and Prohibition.

In Pennsylvania, four—Democratic, Republican, Prohibition and Independent Republican.

In Virginia, four—Democratic, Populist, Prohibition and anti-machine Republicans.

The gold standard is a potent force in Oregon politics. In honor of the hopeless mission of the McKinley bimetallic commission (cost \$100,000) McBride and Corbett both have ennobled the single standard.

Many are the readers eager to learn what Dr. Lyman Abbott thinks on important questions of the day. And they are altogether justified in wishing to read what is said on living issues (no longer living) by a man who thinks so carefully and fruitfully, and who has the gift of clear and forcible utterance. There is no better way to promote the development of a town than to make our streets and public buildings beautiful and attractive.

Salem has not been called a good newspaper town. It has had the reputation of being a newspaper graveyard. A more liberal patronage is accorded newspapers than formerly. It may be charity or policy to give away money for advertising on fences or in trees, but the average reader wants information where the newest style of articles, the best makes, or how the closest bargains may be had. Free Rural Delivery has given The JOURNAL circulation a boom at Turner. It is delivered at eight o'clock in the morning to the patrons of Turner postoffice.

The treatment of Henry George's sudden death by the respective political leaders is characteristic of the men. Mr. Crocker sent a sullen but polite note. Platt said: "I am too busy. I have nothing to say." Mr. Low said: "The sudden death of Mr. George under the stress of the campaign, is a great tragedy. No soldier on the battlefield ever gave up his life for his country more sincerely than Mr. George has laid down his life in behalf of the City of New York. Pure in motive, high-minded, absolutely devoted to the services of his fellow-men as he thought they could best be served, he has fallen in the thick of the battle against the tyranny and corruption of one man power, which controls the political machine, and thus deprives the people at once of their rights as free men and of control of the government of the city in the public interest. I would like to avail of this opportunity to express to the family of Mr. George my sincere sympathy in their irreparable loss."

"During the campaign Mr. George repeatedly recognized that fundamentally this is a fight against bossism and all this implies in political degradation and corruption. In view of Mr. George's death, I wish, therefore, to say to the people of the city that I shall give myself to this contest in their behalf with a new and higher resolve, as though I had received it as a last charge from his dying lips."

It will be said that Low wants the George vote. Well he is entitled to it. The evening paper is naturally preferred by workers who go early to their daily task and work all day. It is the paper that is read most in the home circle, by the evening lamp, by the family fire side. It must be newsy, entertaining, dramatic, fit to be read aloud to the children. It must present variety and little that is dull, stupid, heavy. The JOURNAL aspires to be a readable independent evening paper for the common people.

Henry George was one of the world's greatest reform crusaders and an honest man. He died the death of a hero and was a credit and honor to the Jefferson Democracy. He was a member of the newspaper fraternity and received his start in life as a writer, and his first impulse toward becoming an exponent of land and tax reform, from the veteran editor, the late James McClatchy, founder of the Sacramento Bee.

Having bowed down to the gold standard, Senator McBride seems to have got onto the right side of McKinley and Mark Hanna. He will now complete his triumph over the rest of the Oregon politicians by putting his benevolent Patterson and Lottan in charge of the Portland custom house, and his brother-in-law B. F. Giltner into the Salem postoffice.

Our roving bimetallic commission, which has flitted out at the breach, might be advantageously used in urging the co-operation of the European powers in settling the Pacific roads question. In this way the commission could continue its work of knowing to Europe, and at the same time evading responsibility for the McKinley administration, and as this is the object of its existence, it would be useful to the end.

The Examiner is respectfully informed that there is at least one very vulgar word in the above that should not appear on the editorial page of the great monarch of American dailies.

Salem should have a business men's organization; not to spend money, start a boom, or scatter literature broadly to attract a large immigration here that we are not ready to assimilate. But a helpful, harmonious, progressive body of men who have their all in our city, who are prepared to stay and make their fortune here by legitimate industry and enterprise—such a society Salem needs.

The purpose should not be to see how much money can be raised and squandered, but the prime object should be to see what can be legitimately undertaken by the organization after it is formed, and then let it be accomplished without beating of drums and as economically and businesslike as possible. There is a field for co-operative effort to push Salem ahead but no one has money to throw away on windy propositions.

DISAGREED.

JOURNAL "X-RAYS."

Clatsop's Defaulting Treasurer Escapes Conviction.

VERDICT CAUSES SENSATION.

Prominent Citizens Are Greatly Excited Much Commenting.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 1.—The greatest sensation ever known in this county culminated, when the jury in the case of B. L. Ward, ex-county treasurer, on trial for the defalcation of \$12,000, reported a disagreement, and was discharged by the court Saturday.

Ward was indicted in September and the trial of the case commenced last Monday. Among the evidence introduced was a mortgage given by Ward, which states that it is "for the purpose of reimbursing his official bondsmen for his defalcation," and which admits the \$12,000 was converted by him as such treasure. Ward throws the blame on his business partner, W. G. Howell, who acted as his deputy, and attended to the county treasurer's business, drawing checks, etc. He says he took \$500 himself, before the three years fixed by the statute of limitation, forced by a settlement with a defunct bank, that he learned of other amounts short from Howell.

In charging the jury, the court instructed them that the statute of limitation must be observed, but that if they found Ward had taken any sum from 10 cents to \$12,000, during the three years, or had knowledge of his partner's doing, it would constitute ground for conviction.

The case went to the jury at 10 o'clock Friday. Late at night it was stated the jury stood 7 to 5 on the first ballot for conviction. In the morning the jury asked for further instructions, and were brought into court. The foreman said that all but two had agreed, and they wanted further instructions. Jurymen Gossin said there was but one man standing out. John Vollmer, a German, who did not thoroughly understand the case through his ignorance of English, and asked that he be instructed in German.

Vollmer rose, and explained why he was for conviction, and the court said he needed no further instructions. Gossin said the jury was satisfied the county had sustained a loss, but could not fix the amount taken by Ward. The court sent them back to the jury room to figure it out. At 4 o'clock the jury reported that they could not agree, were called into court, and discharged. Ward and Howell were given until Wednesday to file new bonds, and Ward's case was set for retrial six days after Howell's trial, at the February term.

Men gathered on the streets to discuss the matter.

Several jurymen have stated that they were guided by the advice of one man, who seemed determined to force an acquittal.

A prominent physician of the city, in indignation at the action of the jury, shook his fist in the face of one of the jurymen, supposed to be the one who was the guiding spirit, and told him he should be ashamed of himself.

In another group, another leading citizen almost came to blows with another jurymen upon the same question, the man acknowledging they were led to a certain extent after the others had been brought over.

All kinds of schemes, it is said, were worked upon Vollmer, who stood out for conviction, to change his vote. The 11 even went so far as to vote with him for conviction, but fixed no amount, while the German had decided that Ward was personally responsible for at least \$4000 within the limit of time.

Nothing, it is said, could change the German's opinion that Ward, ex-treasurer, was responsible for the losses in the office within the time limit fixed by law, and so came to an end, with the discharge of the jury, one of the most notable trials in this county.

There has been much public sympathy for Ward, whose family stands high in the community, and who himself has borne an excellent reputation; but many citizens say that he is responsible for the conversion of the county funds, which it is claimed by friends of both men was never done, even by his partner, with any real intent to commit fraud or crime.

Mr. G. W. Combs of Cresco, Iowa, passed up the valley looking over the country. He is very much pleased with Oregon. Mr. Combs thinks that Oregon has a great future and especially so in its mining interests and fruit. Upon inquiry Mr. Combs said Iowa farmers are enjoying the returns of one of the largest corn crops harvested in many years.

St. Louis, Nov. 1.—Counterfeit dollars, of greater weight and fineness than those turned out from Uncle Sam's mint, are the latest in the counterfeiters' art. For the last week St. Louis bank tellers have been accepting the counterfeits in question without hesitation. It was only when they reached the St. Louis treasury that their spurious character was detected. United States Treasurer Small sent one to the director of the mint for assay. According to Colonel Small the coin weighs 13½ grains more than the genuine, which weighs 41½ grains. Its fineness is 94 per cent, while that of the genuine is but 90 per cent.
