Comparison of Financial Condition of Four Willamette Valley Counties.

ABOUT OREGON PEOPLE.

The past week a business landmark of Salem has changed its location. Removed one door north, the going into new quarters of Strong's restaurant is an event worthy of mention in local history. The men or women who by patient attention and industry build up a business until it becomes an integral part of the community are the real promoters of our material progress. The manager of "Strong's," Mr. W. G. Westcott, has been connected with the bakery and catering trade for a quarter of a century. He learned his trade as a baker in this city 24 years ago, was for two years manager of the restaurant under Mr. Strong, and now for seven years has conducted the business of the firm of Westcott & Irwin.

They also conduct a large dairy farm near the city and are connected with several other business enterprises. One thing we feel it as fast to mention about this firm as duty to mention that it employs labor. This is an example worth emulating.

H. Bell, a G. A. R. veteran, asks the National Tribune to give the Ohio regiment mentioned in the "Ohio fighting regiment" in "Felix's Reminiscences," and the following are cited: 5th, 7th, 8th, 14th, 15th, 21st, 23d, 25th, 29th, 30th, 33d, 34th, 36th, 38th, 41st, 46th, 49th, 55th, 65th, 67th, 73d, 82d, 98th and 129th, Ohio regiments.

Capt. J. Q. Barnes, of this city, was commander of a company in the 73d and was brigaded with several of the other regiments named, in the second battle of Bull Run and other engagements. Capt. Barnes, by the way, after nearly four years' service was mustered out at Savannah with several wounds and seventeen battles on the flag of his regiment. There are no doubt many other veterans on this coast who had hard experiences in this noted army.

Service in any one of these regiments through the greater part of the war meant a great sacrifice and hardships untold—an honor of which any American citizen may feel duly proud.

Many JOURNAL readers will be glad to learn that one of the most genial men ever in the public service at Salem is now permanently settled down here. Hon. Geo. S. Downing, for many years superintendent of the state penitentiary, has lately built a comfortable addition to his State street home and proposes to spend his declining years in the enjoyment of solid comfort. "Uncle George," as he is familiarly known to the people of Salem, has opened a law office, and is enjoying a growing practice, especially among his former friends, who have great confidence in him. It is pleasant to note that after an active career in public and private life, so good a citizen as George Downing is enabled to retire to a quieter life and thoroughly appreciate the good things of this world, for which he has so diligently labored.

Mr. Downing has just returned from Southern Oregon, where he has been looking after his interests. He reports business quite good, especially in the communities where the mines contribute to the general prosperity. He found THE CAPITAL JOURNAL in every town and hamlet, and says it is not only widely circulated, but looked up to by every one.

Salem sustained a great loss when Prof. Winkler was called to Nashville, Tennessee. He was an organizer and instructor of the first class and had been successful in building up a large and profitable school of music or piano conservatory. That a woman should step into his place and carry on his work was quite a surprise and yet a source of pride to the women of Oregon, who have shown a marked interest in her success. Mrs. Etta Anders Willman has been, since years, well known as one of the best piano and pipe organ artists ever in Oregon. Beginning as a child there has been a record of constant application and devotion to musical art under masters of note. Among her teachers was Jacob Gundrum, a renowned native composer of Germany. Prof. Schwing of the Baltimore woman's college of music has been her life instructor, one might say, for he is still her musical correspondent and sends Mrs. Willman all his latest works. Other teachers whom she has helped train Mrs. Willman were Perry Orme and Otto Sutor of Baltimore, where she was organist of St. Stephen's Episcopal church for two years.

Death the past week called away one of the most prominent Oregon women and a pioneer closely connected with the history and development of the state. Mrs. Julia Abraham, of Douglas county, wife of Hon. Sol. Abraham. She died at a mountain summer resort, home of the family at Gleneden, in a tribute to her memory written by Mrs. Mollie Miller of Roseburg, we learn that Mrs. Abraham was the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hinkle, who were early pioneers of Oregon. With them she shared the dangers and privations incident to pioneer life, when the hill tops all around were alight with the signal fires of a savage foe. Her marriage was solemnized at Roseburg, Oregon, January 3, 1861, and was the great social event of that decade. Four children were the offspring of this union, three sons and a daughter.

Mrs. Abraham was a prominent member of the order of Rebekah, of the Eastern Star and Woman's Relief Corps. She loved her home and her friends, her garden and her flowers, and like many other Oregon women carried on successfully large farming and business enterprises. She was truly a typical American.

A Salem business man who has won a considerable business success, and who is selling thousands of copies of his little book recounting his experience among the Rocky mountain Indians, entitled "The Lost Shackle," to Mr. Dabney. Mr. Dabney's better-half is a lady of literary tastes. On the occasion of the recent celebration at Dubuque, of the fortieth anniversary of Prof. Chas. G. Kretschmer's engaging in the public school service of Iowa, she wrote a poem of considerable merit, entitled, "School Memories." It was a labor of love to this remembrance an old school master, a veteran worker in a field where, alas! the most devoted are too often paid in poetry and other in substantial rewards.

STATE NEWS.

A trainload of 17 cars of stock was shipped from The Dalles, Friday.

The warehouses in Elgin are getting so full of grain that a night force has to be used to pile each day's receipts up higher, so as to make room for the next day's business.

The shepherds of Morrow county have made up a fund of \$1000 for the purpose of sending detectives into Grant county to ferret out and prosecute the persons who have been shooting sheep.

The Inland Telephone & Telegraph company intends to build a telephone line from Heppner to Arlington, a distance of 50 miles. The company expects to have the line furnished within 30 days.

Three hundred stands of bees yielded J. L. Cole, of Willow Creek, 100 Malheur county, the following: Sixty-two supers, 24 pounds to the super; 50 gallons of extracted honey, and 180 pounds of bees-wax.

Thursday, a family of the name of Rogers, who had arrived in Albany from Missouri, were unloading at the depot, they had among their possessions three live opossums.

Thos. G. Boelling, born in Astoria 41 years ago, died of paralysis. Mr. Boelling was noted for his remarkable memory, being able to recall any case tried in the circuit court, in 15 years in all their particulars.

Homor Griffin of Hillsboro, aged 55, was buried in the Masonic cemetery Saturday. He died at Arlington, Wash., October 27. The aged father, nearly 90 years old, is the only one that remains of the early pioneer family of Griffin.

J. K. Bott, of Helix, Oregon harvested 12,500 bushels of wheat from 400 acres, and sold the same for 75 and 80 cents. Encouraged by his success during the past year and the bright outlook for the future, Mr. Bott will sow 500 acres in wheat next year.

The syndicate which has under consideration the building of a railroad from Elgin, Cal., to Southern Oregon, has submitted a proposition to the citizens of Josephine county for the construction of the road to Grant's Pass. They want the people to guarantee bonds to the amount of \$7500 for each mile constructed in that county. At the completion of each 10 miles the company will draw the sum pledged, and turn over bonds in a like amount. The first mortgage bonds will be limited to \$20,000 to the mile, which is the estimated cost of building and equipping.
