### EDITORIAL.

A number of state papers have copied our item about Senator McBride, that he "does work for Oregon." The La Grande Daily Observer says: "Don't delude us with generalities, but specify just what work Senator McBride has done for Oregon. The people in this part of the state are hungry for information on that line. What, if anything he has done for Oregon, must be a profound state secret, known only to a few beneficiaries, and the people not being beneficiaries, know nothing about it. A splash-like silence made him senator, but it will require some noise to re-elect him." Well he is only serving his first year. To give him a little time.

It has been suggested that charity begins at home and that Senator McBride would better be exerting his energies to get reasonable appropriations for the harbors and rivers of Oregon than for the Alaskan miners who are not really suffering and who, if suffering at all, are not what they must expect when they entered the Klondike country. There is a certainty that the reports of suffering and danger of starvation in the Klondike are greatly padded and exaggerated by sensational writers for the newspapers. Foreign missionary business is greatly overdone in America and this business of selling the government into it is too much.

The people are not interested in the ancient and bitter quarrel between Sylvester Penney and Harry Lane. The war on Penney comes too late to benefit the public except as an example of how much can be said against a man by another who hates him and not hurt him a particle.

Prof David S. Jordan, president of Stanford university, who was the leading expert for the United States government in the seal negotiations at Washington last autumn, has given his verdict strongly against any such proposition as that presented in the bill introduced by Representative Johnson of North Dakota, looking to the immediate killing of all of the seals on the seal islands as the readyest manner in which to prevent further friction between the United States and Canada. The report of Mr Jordan, showing in a preliminary way the results of his investigations in Behring sea during the past season, will soon be published, and mean time the following extract shows his opinion:

"The fur seal is the noblest of all the animals of the sea. Though they are sadly reduced in numbers, a nucleus of the fur seal herd is still left. Under favorable conditions it can be restored. The Prydzloff herd has yielded 10,000 skins annually, worth \$2,000,000 or more, and without injury to itself this would represent a cash value of \$5,000,000. If properly protected, it will again reach this value. To slaughter the herd ourselves because its preservation is beset with diplomatic difficulties in which the fault has not at been on one side, would be a confession of impotence unworthy of a civilized nation. It would transfer to the United States alone and for all time the odium for the destruction of the fur seal herd."

After all that has been published of the cruelties practiced in capturing the seal, it is hard to understand how a Christian man or woman can wear sealskin.

A Methodist church congress was

held in Pittsburg last month. The moving spirit was Bishop Vincent. He long ago transformed the Sunday schools, and later inaugurated the Chautauquo movement. Now it is claimed that he has by the unity of feeling manifest at this church congress committed many leading men to the progress of religious thought, to the doctrine of evolution and of Bible based on what is termed the higher criticism. The congress is regarded as serving notice to the church that evolutionists and higher critics are to be tolerated within its fold and unopposed in holding and disseminating their opinions. This is the phase put upon the proceedings of the congress by one of the faculty of the Baldwin university. He says: "In view of what not only went unchallenged, elicited earnest and general approval, unless the conservative elements of the church begin at once to call these men to account and to punish them for holding and disseminating doctrines of evolution, and of the bible, based on the results of higher criticism, it is safe to conclude that no man in the Methodist Episcopal church can ever be brought to account for believing and teaching evolution and higher criticism."

This means a new movement within the church, by means of which freedom seems to have been won a day and with no disturbance. The congress was attended by the faculties of Boston and Northwestern universities, ministers and college presidents and professors from different sections. It was unofficial. Besides the larger question referred to, there was discussion of the esthetic problems of modern church buildings, music and ritual and the practical problems presented by evangelizing work in the cities. The rank and file of the ministers of the church are held to be unresponsive to the teachings of modern learning, and this congress of selected spirits took a long step in advance of them.

Geo. W. Trefern was named in the Republican city convention at Ashland as candidate for mayor. Asked where he stood, Mr. Trefern said he was a Silver Republican at the last election. By a vote of 36 to 25 it was decided his name could not properly come before the convention.

The San Francisco News-Letter (Gold Standard McKinley paper) has this on the unsettled state of the financial problem:

It is pretty clearly appears that no currency reform or other financial legislation is to be expected from this congress. Secretary Gage's proposals with all the backing the president could give them has fallen flat. No body care to father them, the senate finance committee is utterly opposed to them, and few members in either house care to promise them their support. All of which, of course, means that there will be no currency reform as long as the state of parties in the senate remains as it is. For good or evil, our foreign customers have got it into their heads that our finances are not safe, that the immense stock of silver in the treasury is liable any day to be paid out in full payment of all debts, public and private, and that government bonds and other public securities may possibly be redeemed in that way. Of course, we know at home how unlikely is this to occur. But we have chosen to say that our bonds are to be repaid in United States coin, which may mean either silver or gold, as may suit our convenience, and we have backed this up by a close national campaign in which the use of the white metal at the ratio of 16 to 1 was the principal issue. That issue went under, but it still holds its head wonderfully high, and the late elections rather tend to the belief that it will in the near future come out ahead.

How satisfactory this may be at home, it does not reconcile the foreigner to dealing in our bonds. To cap all, the president's very moderate

### CURRY COUNTY VENDETTA.

Other Side of the Coolidge Shooting Affair.

The JOURNAL prints below some statements giving "the other side" of the Coolidge-Van Pelt vendetta in Curry county. It is from Langdon, Curry county, Oregon, and is a fair and just account of the accused that has been done.

"THE VENDETTA IN CURRY." The vendetta in Curry county, Or., has ended as such vendettas usually end—"Curry" Coolidge has been carried out of the county a corpse. Van Pelt, who had been fighting with Coolidge, seem to belong to the Tennessee mountains, or some part of the same, and is a more vicious man than Oregon.—Roseburg Review.

The reporter copies the above for the purpose of showing Curry county readers the other side of the vendetta, ignorance which prevails concerning the situation here. The facts in brief are, that there is not now and has not been any vendetta in Curry, and that there is positively no evidence that the Van Pelt had anything whatever to do with the killing of Curry Coolidge. The members of full seven families besides the Van Pelt had all the provocations for assaulting Coolidge and his imported bully, Smith, but the Van Pelt could have had them had they been fired upon from ambush by Coolidge and his band, many of these being the Van Pelt's own relatives, while they were peacefully fishing in a public river. And the story attempted to be peddled off upon the Sheriff is a gross and deliberate lie, inasmuch as the authorities, has been falsified pure and simple. These people came forward and surrendered to the Sheriff upon the arrival of that official at Cheto. They are all in custody now, without being confined, and give the authorities no trouble whatever. The Binkers, Stogras, Hughes, and other people down there who had twice been murderously assaulted and shot out of the river with Winchester rifles, are all, with the Van Pelt, law-abiding people, and all every one of them, gentlemen of the highest standing in the county, and of constituting a "vendetta" in Curry.

The only "vendetta in Curry" was composed of a miscellaneous group of men of good, bad and indifferent people, who, assuming to be "deputy sheriffs," went upon the rampage, and shot and killed Curry Coolidge, a man of all degrees and conditions, not sparing those of the weaker sex. They even forced across the line into California and held up the girl on her way home with some fish in a sack which she had been sent by her parents to purchase. They assaulted and committed acts of violence on both sides of the line. They pretended to be hunting for the Van Pelt, but took precious good care not to find them. And finally this statement of the case is true, is evidenced by the fact that, after Sheriff Turner arrived upon the scene, he soon had them all in custody.

Salem papers have been furnished cooked up accounts of the Cheto troubles by the Coolidges of Silverton, and by the Coolidges of the truth, besides vouchsafing statements which are absolutely and notoriously false. For instance, the DAILY CAPITAL JOURNAL is said to say:

The coroner was sent for and the jury was out all night.
