EDITORIAL

The year 1898 is begun, and all look forward to more favorable conditions for business, industry and enterprise. The dark period of depression the past five years has left its mark. Not many merchants or persons of means embarked in any active undertaking, but what have been seriously and some entirely crippled. The new era will not help all to restore their fortunes, but that there will be opportunities for success we cannot doubt. We believe that fairer business conditions will prevail. Close attention and intelligent methods will win in Salem, and in nearly every town in Oregon, where business is not overdone. To all our business men and to those who give people employment in any manner we wish a prosperous New Year.

No New Year's edition is issued by THE JOURNAL this year. The expense of such an edition is generally borne by business men. While they are feeling better than a year ago, they are barely getting on their feet and can endure no extra burdens of expense. To ask them for donations in the form of extra advertising at such a time was not advisable. They have always met the demands for support of legitimate newspapers in a hearty and wholesome generous manner. If anything the Salem business men are too generous with advertising patronage.

THE JOURNAL has no promises to make except that it will be conducted as a free independent opposition paper in the interests of the people. As a recognized leader in Oregon of the Bryan and Silver forces it will advocate those policies unflinchingly and will hold the McKinley administration to a strict accountability. We shall not hesitate to approve of all we find praiseworthy on the part of Republican officials in state or nation. Wm. McKinley is the president of all the people and whether men belong to his party or not they should uphold his administration as far as they can with justice.

We believe that on the much noted money question, the McKinley administration will be compelled within sixty days to abandon international bimetalism and come out for the gold standard. International bimetalists like Wolcott, Chandler, Hansborough, and other leaders in the senate, and men like Mitchell and Herman in Oregon, will force the President to slow his hand. They will be compelled to abandon the Republican party or it will be forced to abandon bimetalism.

Such a course, is to be hoped for. It will clear the air and define the issue. The party can no longer hold bimetalists and gold monometalists under the same organization and name. Trimmers, straddlers and demagogues may go where they please; the great body of the American people want a clear cut issue, and to know where a man stands on that issue. THE JOURNAL believes in the justice, the feasibility and the necessity for the double standard. The gold standard is the sole measure of values; it is compelling our producers to sell the products of their labor in the open markets of the world in competition with the silver standard countries. That will drive the European farmer to revolution and the American farmer into slavery to the moneyed aristocracy.

Close observers can see that the agriculturalists of Germany, Austria, France and England are being driven more and more into resistance to the gold standard. They are demanding protective tariffs against the cheap means and breadstuffs supplied by the American farmers. The amount of the excessive tariffs are being the consuming classes of those countries suffer and hard times will produce war and anarchy. To tax the stomachs of the poor laborers of Europe and Great Britain to maintain the high purchasing power of gold to the advantage of the creditor class is an outrageous policy that will produce a revolt like the one that resulted in the repeal of the corn laws of England. A smaller lot of hungry stomachs will result in the overthrow of the strongest monarchies. A doer of labor means less compensation for labor and the products of labor. Already the armies in this country are experiencing the evil effects of a dear dollar that cannot get hold of. Thousands of American families are starving and the laboring class is without work, without food and without shelter. The moneyed class will find that it is impossible to tax the stomachs of the poor and the laboring class.

SENATE. Sensation in the Senate.
To Cut Loose From Republicans but Will Not Resign.

The Chicago Chronicle's Washington correspondent sends the following: Shortly before congress adjourned for the holidays Senator Wolcott gave notice that he would take occasion, early in January, to make a speech on the subject of international bimetalism and on the money question in general, in which he would refer to the work of the bimetallic commission of which he is chairman.

I have reliable information to the effect that this promised speech of Wolcott senator, when delivered, will be of the most sensational character. Mr. Wolcott will improve the opportunity presented to formally sever his relations with the Republican party and to announce his purpose hereafter to act with some party which favors the free coinage of silver by independent action on the part of this government. He will say that there is no longer the slightest prospect of restoring silver by international agreement.

Mr. Wolcott, instead of condemning will praise the president for the sincere efforts which Mr. McKinley has made since his inauguration in behalf of international bimetalism. The Colorado senator will deny that he has any quarrel with the president or with the administration. He will simply say that, with the disappearance of the hope of bimetalism, the financial contest in this country henceforth will be a battle between the standards, and that he prefers silver rather than gold as a measure of values in the United States.

President McKinley is fully advised as to Mr. Wolcott's purpose and is sorry that the administration will shortly lose the support of so able a man. The president and the Colorado senator recently had an extended conference on this subject and out of that conference grew the silly report that Mr. Wolcott contemplates resigning his seat in the senate. So far from resigning his seat, Mr. Wolcott is now adopting a course which will assure his occupancy of it for another six years after his present term expires.

He went against public sentiment in his own state during the last presidential campaign, when he supported McKinley and the St. Louis platform. While the people of Colorado have not approved of Mr. Wolcott's position since the money issue caused a sharp division in the Republican ranks they have a high regard for him personally and are proud of him because he has done more than any other man to give Colorado a prominent place in the sisterhood of states. No more popular personality has ever appeared in the centennial state, and while he is not at present in touch with the voters there on the money question, it will be an easy matter for him to be returned to the senate if he will cut loose from the administration.

It is no exaggeration to say that Mr. Wolcott is now facing a crisis in his political career. Undoubtedly the speech will be a sensation.
