To Be Changed for the Mitchell Push.

Englewood and Prospect and Other Large Precincts to Be Gerrymandered.

**SOME CHANGES PLANNED.**

It has been talked about for some weeks that an effort would be made to divide Prospect precinct, but until recently it has been difficult to learn the motive and purpose of such division. Now it is also proposed to divide Englewood and North Salem precincts. It is suggested that adjoining portions of Prospect and Englewood be taken for a new precinct, thus making three fair-sized precincts of two.

The further the matter has been traced the more it has become apparent that it is only being urged by professional political "heelers" and those of the Metchan-Mitchell-McBride push. The real purpose of the scheme is without a doubt to give this faction of the Republican party a pull whereby to literally disfranchise the regular Republicans in the coming primaries and conventions. It is an old trick of the gang to get control of all state delegates by apportioning the weaker precincts with the stronger, which they can handle. Most of the smaller country precincts generally send delegation to the county conventions that are opposed to the city gang, but through the manipulations of the latter they are swallowed up by being apportioned with some larger precinct which is controlled by the manipulators. A professional worker of the public primaries, who has always held places under Metchan and McBride, in connection with the World's Fair board, State Fair board and at the same house, is openly working up these changes. Precincts that can't be managed are to be divided, and thus secure delegations for the Mitchell push.

It is well known that about forty men were given places in the state fair pay roll in order to use them to carry precincts for the push. This extravagance was largely responsible for running the fair in debt so deeply.

The bosses are not showing their hands openly, but are saying with assurance that these changes will be made and that big country precincts
