CONDITION OF CUBANS

The Army of Liberation Well Fed.

THE MEN ARE POORLY CLOTHED

Numerical Strength of the Various Commands

New York, Jan. 7.—A Herald correspondent in Cuba, who has just crossed the island on horseback through the Cuban and Spanish lines from Pinar del Rio to the Júcaro-Morón trocha, for the purpose of observing the actual situation and condition of the insurgent forces today and their ability to continue the war, writes: "When your orders reached me I was with the force of Pedro Diaz, commander-in-chief of the Sixth army corps in Pinar del Rio province. We were encamped near Cuzco. Under Diaz, operating in that province were General Lorente, commanding the second division, of the territory west of Pinar del Rio, and Vidal du Casse, commanding the first division, of the district east of Pinar del Rio. General Lorente has 1800 infantry and 400 cavalry, well armed and well fed, but lacking clothes. Du Casse has 2000 infantry and 3000 cavalry in the same condition. Operating against this force a month ago were only three columns of Spaniards. These never succeeded in reaching the rebel stronghold in the hills until General Parado took the field. The only fighting done was done when the rebels invited it.

"IN MATANZAS AND HAVANA. "From Cuzco I proceeded through the Cuban lines to Havana. I experienced no difficulty in entering the capital. Havana and Matanzas provinces are under the command of General Alejandro Rodriguez, chief of the Fifth army corps. Under General Rodriguez are Juan du Casse, Rafael Betancourt, Colonels Danaberry, Delgado, Alberto Nordasde and Nestor Arangueren. The total force under these leaders is 1000 infantry and 1200 cavalry, all well equipped. In Matanzas, which belongs also to the Fifth army corps, are Brigadier-General Arango, Colonels Danaberry and Valencia, with 1300 infantry and 300 cavalry. Only about 1/4 of this force is armed. This is a difficult province to operate in. The men remain in the hills, cultivating the soil or watching the coast.

"The Western provinces have been familiar to me for the last year, during which time I have been continually with the rebel forces, except what time was necessary to carry dispatches to Havana. I can vouch for these figures.

"On the trip to the Orient I broke new ground, but the figures given are from actual observation. I took the field in Santa Clara from Santo Domingo, riding out in broad daylight with guides, and within an hour with the insurgent forces under General Arango, Chalcventi, I returned with General Arango to a suburban town for supper. Arango had 1000 infantry and cavalry detailed to burn sugarcane.

"The next morning I rode 30 miles and joined Colonel Alvarez, who had 4000 infantry and 1000 cavalry. I met Dr. Joaquin Caneda, the private physician of General Gomez, on his way to join the general. I traveled with him the rest of the way. Seven wounded soldiers in Alvarez, the day previous, had sacked the town of San Juan de los Rios.

THE CENFUEGOS BRIGADE

"The next day I rode 20 miles to Eugenia Esquerro, in the Plantano hills, two leagues north of the town of Manicaragua. Esquerro is chief of the Cenfuegos brigade, and had in camp 4000 infantry and 1200 cavalry. From there I rode three days through the long grass and over the mountains, 50 miles, to the camp of Brigadier-General Nunez, in the Trinidad hills. Nunez has 1000 infantry and 1500 cavalry engaged in raising vegetables. "After leaving Manicaragua I entered what is called the first division of Santa Clara under command of Jose Miguel Gomez. The whole strength of the first division is 2400 infantry and 700 cavalry. I did not meet Jose Gomez, but near El Manzo I struck the camp of General Sanchez, who had 2000 infantry and 400 cavalry.

IN THE CAMP OF GOMEZ

"Near Remedios I entered the camp of General Carillo, chief of the Fourth army corps, or the whole of Santa Clara province. Carillo had in camp 600 men. The strength of his command as shown by previous figures is 5700 men. Two days from Carillo I rode into the camp of General Vela, who is in charge of the outposts of General Gomez' camp, and a day later I had the pleasure of saluting the commander-in-chief General Gomez in his camp 2500 infantry and 1000 cavalry. He seldom has more.

"From official returns shown to me in Gomez' camp, I estimate that in Puerto Principe, where the Cuban government headquarters are established, the rebel force numbers 2000 cavalry, with only an insignificant number of infantry. In Santa Clara there are 2000 cavalry and 10,000 infantry. These figures are conservative.

"It is in two eastern provinces that the main strength of the Cuban insurgents lies, not only in the number of men but in the condition of the country and a plentiful supply of food is easily secured. There are living in the mountains of Puerto Principe and Santiago fully 400 people not actively engaged in warfare, but cultivating the soil as if there was no war, and contributing supplies to the rebels.

"All the cavalry I saw on the trip were mounted well and all fully armed. In two instances the regiments were badly off for clothing.

FOOD SUPPLY OF THE CUBANS.

"With regard to the food supply—a good many of the troops occasionally go hungry for one day, but seldom for a longer time. There is absolutely no chance of starving the rebels out. In Western Santa Clara they subsist chiefly on vegetables and fruit, and a species of animal something like an opossum, the jutí. These animals are found by the thousands in the East. There are plenty of cattle.

"In several instances I saw regular zones of cultivation in the hills, never molested, and supplying a considerable quantity of food. In the small valleys to the mountains I saw many small portable mills at work. I saw numerous tobacco crops, but cigaretes are worth their weight in gold among the soldiers."
